Grand Division.

THE GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH'S ADDRESS.

CHARLOTTETOWN, April 29, 1880.

Representatives of the Sons of Temperance of
Prince Edward Island.

Again it becomes my pleasing duty to
welcome you in quarterly session, for the
transaction of business and the propagation
of our principles.

During the quarter just passed many
matters of interest to us as temperance ad-
vocates have transpired, which should en-
courage us to still persevere in the cause
we have undertaken.

Our Local Legislature feeling the in-
fluence of the temperance sentiment—which
has happily now become so general—have
seen fit to continue the office of Inspector
of Licenses, and have so amended the Act
as to provide one Inspector for each
County, instead of, as formerly, having the
whole Island under the supervision of one
man. They have also given the Inspectors
increased powers, enabling them to enter
into and search houses suspected of keeping
liquors for illicit sale, and of dealing with
offenders in a more expeditious and sum-
mary manner. We trust these appoint-
ments will shortly be made and competent
officers secured.

We hail, with pleasure, the decision of
the Supreme Court of Canada, in affirming
the constitutionality of the "Canada Tem-
perance Act of 1878," and rejoice that we
can control such an efficient weapon. Yet,
while we rejoice in having gained this ad-
vantage, we should remain unshaken in our
convictions of the desirability of complete
prohibition.

As you are aware, Prince and King's
County, and this city, have already ad-
opted this Act by large majorities. The
necessary steps are also being taken to test
Queen's County, and with a result such as
we anticipate, we shall in a few months
have the traffic controlled by the iron hand
of the law throughout the whole Island. It
will then become the duty of all true tem-
perance men to assist in enforcing the law
and maintaining it inviolate, ever looking
forward to the time when we can exult in the
entire freedom from this scourge for our
Island home.

The Grand Scribe's report will inform
you more particularly of the state of the
Order on the Island. I regret that my
absence from the Province for two months
during the past quarter has prevented me
from visiting those Divisions which I
otherwise should have, but am pleased to
learn through reports received from Depu-
ties that most of the Divisions are doing
well.

During my absence, and acting under a
Provincial Deputy's commission, P. G. W.
P. J. J. Chappell received and answered
all my official correspondence. The follow-
ing decisions, which are presented for your
approval, were given by him. Bro. J. C. Mc-
Donald, D. G. W. P., of Union Division,
asks:

1. When a member has been found guilty
of violating his pledge, and after the usual
course, been retained by the Division, is he
entitled to the full privilege of a member,
without being re-obligated?

Ans. No. See amendment to sec. 2,
chap. 6, code of laws.

2. When a charge has been preferred
against a W. P. should he leave the chair
and allow the W. A. to appoint the com-
mittee of investigation?

Ans. There is no legal objection to a
W. P. appointing the committee to investi-
gate the charge against himself, any more
than for him to put a motion of a vote of
thanks to himself. It is customary for the
W. A. to act in such cases.

3rd. If a W. P. forfeits his honors or
is expelled, should the W. A. ask for the
balance of the term, or can the Division
appoint another W. P.

Ans.—A vacancy occurring in any office
can be filled at any time by election and
installation. (See chap. 4, sec. 4, code
of laws.)

In answer to Bro. Cash, D. G. W. P. of
Forest Home Division, is the initiation of
an expelled member valid in a Division
other than his own within six months? I
have decided that, as in Art. 3, Sec. 1, ex-
pelled members are classed with persons
having been initiated under 14 years of
age, and as, by decision No. 310, such
initiations are decided void, so is that of
expelled members within 6 months.

We are pleased to report that one new
Division has been added to the roll during
the past quarter. On the 5th of February,
I attended a public meeting at New Argyle,
and at its close, assisted by P. G. W. P.
Chappell and D. G. W. P., J. C. Mc-
Kenzie, organized New-Argyle Division,
No. 119, with 21 charter members.

Thus are we pleased to see the cause ex-
tending, and the principles of our order
more and more permeating the masses. We
hail the dawn of better days, which seems
fast approaching, when "night shall yield to
right," and hope, ere long, to see the flag
of temperance waving unsullied over all the
land, protected by the righteous law of
Prohibition.

GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, May 3.

The Queen held a Council at Windsor
this morning, at which all the members of the
Cabinet were present.

The scheme of laying a cable from Hali-
fax to Bermuda is being agitated by various
members of Parliament as well as by certain
prominent business men here. It is be-
lieved that England ought to have a cable
between those points for the accommoda-
tion of the Naval Department and for the
purpose of trade and private use.

The Mansion House relief fund amounts
to £152,668; £120,306 has been expended.

Mr. Wolvenston has been appointed Pay-
master General, and Mr. Osborne Morgan,
Judge Advocate General, Mr. Greenwood
retiring.

A despatch from Cabul announces the ar-
rival of General Stewart, who has assumed
supreme command.

Mahomed Jan has surrendered.
The Maharajah, of Cashmere is sus-
pected of having made secret overtures to
Russia.

The despatch vessel "Salamis" arrived
from the Azores last night at Castleton,
Ireland. She reports that nothing was
known of the training ship at any of the
Islands, and the belief that the "Atalanta"
foundered in a more northerly latitude is
now almost general, though the Admiralty
profess to still entertain some hope of her
safety.

It is announced that the Midland Rail-
way Company of Ireland, has made ar-
rangements to co-operate with the Galway
Line steamers to America.

In the House of Commons to day the
question of Mr. Charles Bradlaugh's seat
came up for discussion. In a well con-
sidered and temperate speech—Mr. Brad-
laugh claimed that he should be admitted
on making an affirmation instead of taking
the oath. He quoted in support of this
claim the fact that by virtue of the pro-
visions of the evidence amendment Act of
1829, he and all other Atheists were per-
mitted to give evidence in Courts of Jus-
tice, although they did not call on God to
witness their truthfulness, nor say that
they believed God had forbidden them to
take an oath.

The Speaker, Mr. Brand, said he had
grave doubts as to the effect of the Act re-
ferred to, and did not think it applied at
all to the oath required of members of
Parliament. He therefore wished the
House to decide that question.

Lord Cavendish referred to the precedent
in the case of Baron Rothschild, who was
elected before the passage of the law per-
mitting the House to dispense at its plea-
sure with the provision requiring members
to swear "by the faith of a Christian," and
moved for the appointment of a Select Com-
mittee to consider the appointment.

Sir Stafford Northcote seconded the mo-
tion and the House voted to appoint the
Committee.

DUBLIN, May 3.

Mr. Parnell has finally decided to sit for
Cork. A. M. Sullivan will contest the seat
for Meath.

BERLIN, May 3.

Prince Bismarck's physicians have again
imperatively ordered his retirement.

PARIS, May 3.

In a lecture yesterday on the Panama
Canal, M. DeLesseps said the project had
no longer to fear opposition from the
United States.

UNITED STATES.

NEWARK, N. J., May 3.

Proposition has been made that gasworks
here be constructed as crematories. It is
claimed that the furnaces and cradels used
for running coal into the retort are perfect-
ly adapted for consuming bodies, and pre-
serving the ashes. Besides, on the theory
that a human body will yield in burning
three hundred and fifty feet of gas, it would
enable the Gas Company to incinerate
without charge.

SULPHUR FOR ANIMALS.—If taken in-
ternally with their food, sulphur will al-
most invariably keep all kinds of animals
free from lice. We have made practice for
years past, of giving heaping teaspoonfuls
once a week to each of our cows, and the
same quantity to about every ten hens in
our flock, and they have never been
troubled with lice in them. It may be
given in the same proportion as to size
when required in the food of poultry, pigs,
and sheep. Sulphur is a mild cathartic
when desired for this purpose, and in
small doses seems to have a general bene-
ficial effect on the animal system, some-
thing like salt, though, of course, not of
that nature.
