

Gallant Rink Cops Trophy

Dr. J.C. Gallant's Charlottetown rink continued undefeated in curling competition at Alberton Rink on Saturday to capture the Prince Edward Island Physical Fitness trophy and the right to represent the Province in a Maritime play-down scheduled to take place in Charlottetown this week.

A Summerside team skipped by Bert Hunter was runner-up in the two day bonspiel.

In the final round on Saturday afternoon a tension packed contest developed between Montague and Charlottetown with a three-way tie in prospect in the event of a Montague victory.

Trailing 7-3 at the half way mark in the game the Gallant rink came through with some excellent curling to win the game 13-9 and the competition in four straight wins.

The runner up rink, skipped by Bert Hunter, had three wins and one loss; R.C.A.F. and Montague were equal at two wins and two losses and Alberton trailed with three losses and a single victory.

Dr. O.H. Phillips, president of the P.E.I. Curling Association, presented the trophy to the victorious rink and complimented them on their achievement. He also extended congratulations to the runner-up rink and made reference to the fine spirit of sportsmanship evidenced by all five participating rinks.

Andy Bathgate Paces Rangers To 3-2 Victory Over Boston

Boston (AP)—New York Rangers, powered by the magic scoring touch of Andy Bathgate, edged Boston Bruins 3-2 Saturday in a National Hockey League game at the Garden.

Bathgate, the Rangers' veteran right wing, assisted on the three first-period goals which enabled New York to post its fourth triumph in five nationally-televised contests.

The game, played in three distinct phases, concluded with New York displaying smart, deft ice hockey during the final period to break up from Boston bids for the tie score. In the opening period, the Rangers were in command when the middle 20 minutes saw the Bruins fall short in an all-out rally.

A major share of the credit belonged to New York goalie Lorne (Gump) Worsley, making his first appearance since receiving a public blasting from his coach, Phil Watson. Worsley made 31 saves, many of them extremely difficult.

Rangers won their sixth game in their last seven starts and prevented Boston from gaining any ground on league-leading Detroit and runner-up Montreal.

Larry Poppen, Roy Murphy and Larry Cahan scored for the Rangers, all within the first 12 minutes of the game. Fleming Mackell and Larry Regan tallied for Boston in the second period.

NEW YORK (AP)—Gordie Howe's 39th goal of the National Hockey League season enabled Detroit to earn a 1-1 tie with New York Rangers before a capacity turnout of 15,925 at Madison Square Garden Sunday night.

Habs Score Three In Third To Wallop Detroit Wings 5-1

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens broke loose with a three-goal spurge late in the third period Saturday to trounce Detroit Red Wings 5-1 and pull almost even with the National Hockey League leaders.

It was the fourth straight loss for the faltering Red Wings, who were blanked 3-0 by Canadiens in Detroit Thursday.

Bert Olmstead, Dollard St. Laurent, Rocket Richard, Jean Beliveau and Dickie Moore scored for Montreal and Billy Dea for Detroit. It was the 29th goal of the season for Richard, bringing his all-time total to 489 in regular-season play. Moore and Beliveau also scored their 29th goals and St. Laurent's goal was the first of the season for the Montreal defenceman.

The Wings looked sluggish in the first two periods, when the work of both teams fell short of the spectacular play that usually marks their meetings. Detroit struck back with an effective but short-lived offensive in the third period to cut Montreal's lead to 2-1 but failed. Canadiens went on to win in a romp, piling in three goals in little more than five minutes.

Curling Ch'ships Begins Today

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—On the basis of past play either Manitoba or Saskatchewan should be installed as the favorite when the Dominion single - rink curling championships open here today.

Manitoba's entries have a winning habit—15 times in the competition's 27-year history a rink from that province has gone all the way in the round-robin play and twice it was a rink from the Winnipeg Granite Club skipped by Howard Wood.

This year again Howard Wood brings a Granite rink to the championships, but this year it is Howard Wood Jr., both times a member of the rink his father won with in 1939 and 1940.

The Saskatchewan entry is once again the formidable Avonlea, Sask. rink skipped by Garnet Campbell and composed entirely of Campbell brothers. The Campbells were 1955 winners and could repeat this year.

The second round begins at 8 p.m. At a meeting Sunday, Victoria was chosen as the site of the 1958 championships. Senator John Haig, chairman of the board of trustees, announced the decision and eight minutes later was presented with a special supplement of the Curling News containing the announcement.

Play today will be in the 2,300 seat Kingston Community Centre. There will be two rounds today, Tuesday and Wednesday, three on Thursday and two more Friday, the final day, morning and afternoon.

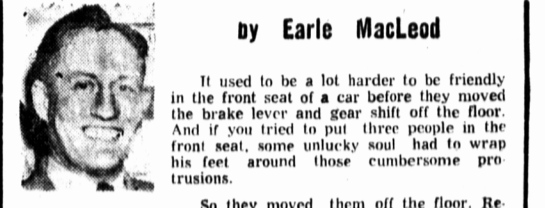
