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HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Cream of tartar rubbed upon soiled white kid gloves cleanses them nicely. To prevent the Creaking of Doors.-Apply a little soap to the hinges, or, take lard, soap and black lead, equal parts, and apply liberally.

To cure Children's - Anoint the places affected by them with soft soap, such as Eucerin. To remove the Starch or Rust from Flat Irons. - To remove the starch or rust from flat irons, have a piece of yellow beeswax tied in a coarse cloth. When the iron is almost hot enough to use, but not quite, rub it quickly with the beeswax, and then with a clean coarse cloth.

To Bake a Spare Rib - Dip it in water; then rub on a little salt and pepper and flour. If not too thick, it will bake in an hour or a little more in a hot oven. If done, it will be done by all means, but don't roast it to a crisp, unless you wish to dream of your great-grandmother after eating it.

Bed Bugs - Are said to be most readily destroyed by ars vomica in the form of dust, combined with liquor ammonia, which liquid is to be freely applied to the joints and cracks of the bedstead. It is equally efficacious against cockroaches, waterbugs, and other insects which annoy the human race.

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PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL. Tuesday, March 15. The session was opened by Sir Robert Hodgson, Lieutenant Governor, at three o'clock.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Strong, it was resolved that the sum of \$12 be allowed to each member of the Council, in respect of the contingent expenses, for the purpose of providing stationery and paying postage.

Hon. Mr. Strong remarked that he would like to elicit the opinion of the House in regard to the usual practice of having the members of the House supplied with copies of the various newspapers published in the Province.

Hon. Mr. Dadd remarked that one or two of the papers would be sufficient to supply the members with the current news, but as the expense would be trifling, and as newspapers publishers expected encouragement from the Legislature, he thought it would be advisable to continue the usual practice.

Hon. Mr. Wightman said it would be advisable to ascertain what the expense would be, but he was disposed to take all the papers on.

Hon. Mr. Balderston remarked that while the members of the country were in Charlottetown, he thought it would be desirable to supply them with the papers. As the expense of supplying the members with the various papers during the session would be trifling, and as it was desirable that they should have facts and figures at their command, he thought it would be well to follow the usual practice.

Hon. Mr. Strong said the expense would probably be between \$50 and \$70, but if printers would charge at the rate per annum, instead of charging a certain amount for each copy, it would be very much less.

Hon. Mr. Balderston said it was only through the press that the people had an opportunity of expressing their views upon public questions, and if the members of the Legislature deprived themselves of an opportunity of perusing the papers, they would be certain to be shut themselves up in ignorance of the wants of the people.

Hon. Mr. Strong said the appointment of Sir Robert was one of the advantages of Confederation. One of the arguments of Sir Robert in the government of the Province was a source of gratification to them all, more especially as he was a native of the island, and had worked himself up from the lowest position to the highest.

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
