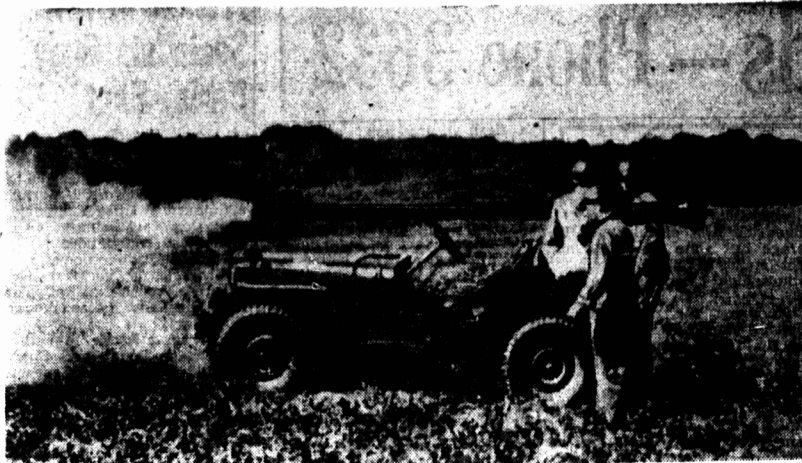

Infantry Weapon



Mounted on a jeep in the U. S. army's new battalion anti-tank weapon (BAT), a 106-mm recoilless rifle, designed for greater and more destructible power than any other weapon now available on the battalion level. It is being tested at Aberdeen proving ground, Md.



Weighing less than 500 pounds, the BAT can be lifted by its three-man crew, as shown in the photo. It has double the effective range and double the penetrating power of any weapon previously available to the infantryman. It can be fired from a jeep, then taken off in one minute and fired or hauled around on a wheelbarrow-type base. According to the army, the weapon is capable of knocking out the largest known tanks.
