THE PATRIOT VS. THE TEACHERS.

The Patriot sees no evidence of dissatisfaction among the teachers of this Province. "There are none so blind as those who will not see." The Patriot's supposition that the teachers as a body are not dissatisfied, because the teachers of the towns only are the chief sufferers from the Government's impolicy, is evidently false. Are we to suppose that there is no sympathy in the hearts of teachers in the country for their city confreres—no esprit de corps in the teaching fraternity in this Province? The Patriot's insinuation is not only false—it is injurious and insulting. Almost equally wrong is the suggestion that teachers ought not to grumble at their usage by the Government because "wages in every branch of business have gone down." This statement is untrue. Wages in many callings have in the past few years gone up. Men and women servants, dressmakers and milliners, laborers and operators in our factories, etc., all receive considerably higher payment, upon the average, than they did fifteen or twenty years ago; and this in the face of a considerable reduction in the cost of imported and manufactured goods! It may, on the other hand, be true that clerks do not receive quite so much. Why? Because the tendency of our educational system has been to render an increased number of our young men and women fit for employment as clerks, and unfit (or at least unwilling) to work on the farm. Young people nowadays are apparently impressed with the idea that positions in stores are easy and honorable, while farm and household duties are laborious and not honorable. The consequence has been a wave of migration from the farms to the towns—the wave extending to Canada and the United States—and an excess of the supply of clerks, etc., over the demand so that an extent that clerks have not participated in the advance that has been made in the wages of other employes.

While setting forth false and flimsy statements and excuses in behalf of a Government that has injured and insulted the teaching profession of the Province, the Patriot does not venture an opinion upon the question whether or not it is just to the whole people of the Province that the taxpayers at large should pay for the higher education of the sons of the comparatively wealthy, destined for professional careers?

THE RAILWAY AND THE EXHIBITIONS.

It may be said that hundreds of more or less drunken men left Summerside last evening on the trains going east and west. The good tact and good temper of the conductors and their assistants were severely taxed. Shortly after leaving Summerside it became necessary to stop the train going east and separate the lighters and remove from one of the cars several of the women, one of whom swooned on entering the baggage car. It is greatly to the credit of the railway men that, by the exercise of patience and a skilful disposition of the quarrelsome elements, they succeeded in carrying all to their destinations without accident. Indeed, the safe carriage, in the past fortnight, of so many thousands, is highly creditable to the present management of the P. E. Island Railway. We have not, in this regard, heard a single complaint on the part of the public.

WHERE STANDS "THE GUARDIAN"?

BECAUSE THE EXAMINER dared to set forth, editorially, the truth concerning drunkenness at Charlottetown in Exhibition week, and to direct the attention of temperance workers to the evident violation of the law, the Guardian, on Wednesday last, declared that THE EXAMINER "seeks to brand the Scott Act a failure." On that same day we promptly repudiated this slander. Then, on Thursday last, the Guardian demanded in black letters, "Where Stands THE EXAMINER?" This morning the local column of the Guardian contained the following paragraph: "Seldom has more drinking been seen at an exhibition in Summerside than was visible there yesterday. Young men, found whom letter might well be expected venturing staggering along the streets. The special train to Charlottetown was at first, after leaving Summerside, the scene of wild confusion. The howls and catcalls of would-be smart ones were deafening, and several stiletto encounters took place. These, however, the officials of the train quickly yet gallantly put an end to."

This is the truth mildly stated in the news column of the Guardian in respect to drinking at Summerside as it was in the editorial columns of THE EXAMINER in respect to drinking at Charlottetown. Are we, then, to conclude that the Guardian "seeks to brand the Scott Act a failure?" According to the logic of the Guardian as applied to THE EXAMINER, this conclusion would be reasonable and just. But the Guardian may, perhaps, plead that it has not, editorially, said anything about the drunkenness. In that case its position in respect to the Scott Act is very much like that of one of the many drunken men on the train last evening. Having raised a row in one of the cars, and lost his hat, and been throttled and dragged in to the baggage van, the man shouted, "I'm not drunk, I'm all right. I'll fight any man that says that I'm drunk." So in case of indubitable evidence to the contrary, the Guardian would have the public believe that the Scott Act is all right in Charlottetown, and is ready to fight THE EXAMINER for daring to call public attention to the truth concerning it.

The position of THE EXAMINER in respect to the Scott Act is readily defined. So long as the Scott Act is in force, we are for respecting it and enforcing it; and we shall not fall in the duty of calling attention, from time to time, to the drunkenness which proves that it is being violated, and to the inconsistency and hypocrisy of those who having spoken and worked for it, and induced a majority to accept it, are yet content to fold their hands and do nothing, though they know that it is daily and hourly violated.

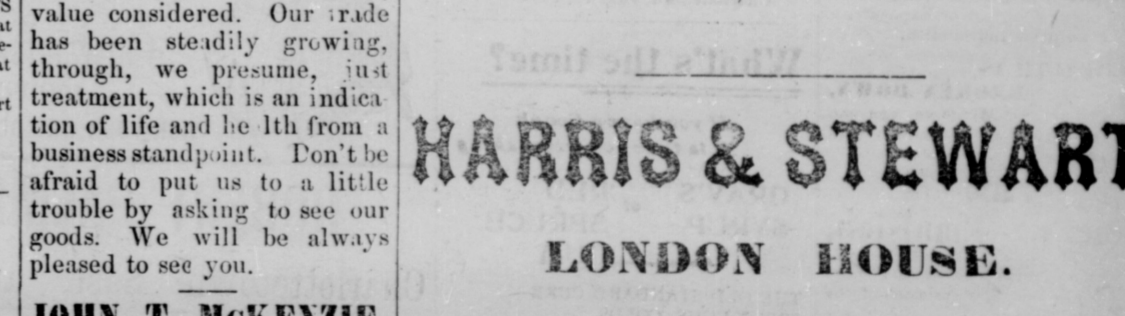
