

# Case Of Vanishing Vicar Poses Legal Conundrum

LONDON (CP)—The case of Woodford's "vanishing vicar" has posed a tricky legal conundrum for British lawyers and church authorities.

Can a man, who is believed to be alive, be presumed to be dead?

"It is a bit of a mess," admits Eric H. Dodson, solicitor to the family of Rev. Philip St. John Ross, 52-year-old vicar of Woodford, Cheshire.

"Despite a lot of sensational publicity, we have no legal proof that Mr. Ross is alive."

It was 14 months ago that handsome, silver-haired Philip Ross left Woodford with his wife, Ellen, and daughter, Sheila, for a holiday at a West resort with the unclerical name of Hell's Mouth.

Three days later the vicar vanished while taking his customary morning swim. Searchers found his clothes neatly folded on the beach and footprints leading into the water. A body was never found.

In due course a court order was issued giving executors permission to "presume" the vicar's death in order to settle his estate. Life insurance was paid to the

vicar's family and church authorities gave a pension to the widow.

Then at the beginning of October came a report that Philip Ross had "faked" his death in order to start a new and secret life with Mrs. Kathleen Ryall, a wealthy parishioner and childhood friend of the vicar.

**FAKE SAYS DAUGHTER**

Neighbors recalled that Ross had been a frequent visitor at the home of Mrs. Ryall since the death of her husband four years ago. Finally Mrs. Ryall's 23-year-old daughter, Wendy, told reporters: "The death was a fake. The day he 'died' he telephoned my mother."

Newspapers quickly tracked down the story and found Ross and Mrs. Ryall were holidaying in Switzerland under the name of Mr. and Mrs. Sydney Davies. They also found they had been living together for some time at Bedlow, Buckinghamshire in a cottage, which, ironically, bore the motto: To Live Happily, Let Us Live Hidden.

Now Mrs. Ryall has returned to Britain and tearfully announced that I have left Mr. Ross. And Mrs. Ross has appealed to her husband to come back to her.

But the legal conundrum remains unsolved for Ross, himself.

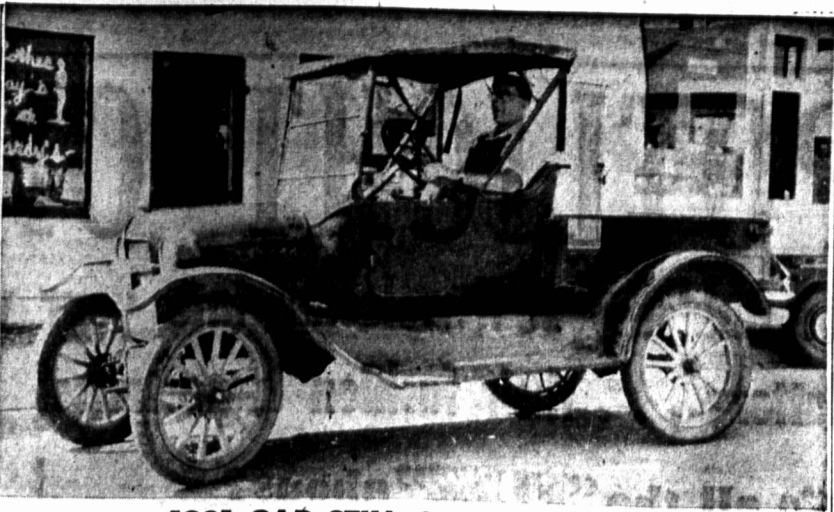
"Officially the court order presuming his death still stands," says Dodson. "It can only be revoked if someone, say a member of the family, can identify this man in Switzerland as Ross."

Philip Bradburn, the vicar's 25-year-old son-in-law, says the life-insurance money "is still in the bank and we won't touch it until the insurance company makes a decision."

A spokesman for the bishop of Chester says the Ross case "is under constant review. We can't say anything more than that."

And at the suburban village of Woodford, near Manchester, where mourning parishioners had held a memorial service after their vicar's "death" and raised £200 to build a home for his widow, a parish spokesman said:

"We've decided to hold the fund in abeyance until this business has been straightened out. But goodness knows how long that will take."

## TIMELY NOTES ON FUR TOPICS

The first sale of pearl mink will be held at the Hudson's Bay Company, New York, on January 31st by the Mutation Mink Breeders Association. Alma Erickson, chairman of the EMBA pearl committee at a recent board of directors meeting in Milwaukee, said there will be a sufficient number of pearl pelts to warrant a promotion this year. A new trade mark will be established for the apparel and will be announced at a later date.

Pastel mink sales made up the bulk of the fur fashions at Detroit Michigan, last month as stores saw a business equal to or surpassing a year ago. The popularity of the stole as a fashion was remarkable. Volume price for mink pelts was from \$560 to \$600 and up to \$1,000.

A despatch from Tokyo, Japan, has the following: Exports of fur skins to the United States in August included 64,394 undressed mink and 35,500 rabbits. Shipments in July had included 20,200 mink and 28,500 rabbit. This will show our mink breeders that Japan is becoming quite a source of mink pelts.

The forecast of Canadian pelt production from ranch-raised fox and mink in Canada during the 1956-1957 season is 4,000 fox and 649,000 mink pelts, the Statistics Bureau states. These estimates are based on an ample survey in which fur farmers report pelting intentions. Fox peltings, still declining, are expected to consist of 2,000 silver and 2,000 new-type, more than a third below the preliminary estimate of 6,200 in total last year.

**PELTING TRENDS**

The mink pelting indication is an 8 per cent increase on the preliminary estimate of 784,900 for last year. Standard mink peltings are expected to decrease 3 per cent and silverblue by 22 per cent, while 22 and 39 per cent increases are expected in the take of pastel this year are estimated at 261,700 compared with 269,500 in 1955. In the mutation section, silverblue peltings will be 100,400 compared with 140,000 pastel 295,700 against 243,400 and others 182,300 against 131,600 pelts.

At the Montreal sale in 1951 three-quarter silvers brought a top of \$120 and half silvers \$100. The average price realized for all pelts including a large percentage of low grades was \$34.49 a skin. Cross and the Bowery Boys also compared quality and true value and desist from featuring "prices alone" without regard to quality.

New York City's first live mink show will be held Jan. 11-13 under the sponsorship of the Eastern Education Association of Fur Farmers, a group set up by a number of State mink breeders' organizations from New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and the Northeast. The show is scheduled at the 165th Regiment Armory Lexington Avenue and 26th Street, and will present more than 1,000 mink with a minimum of 30 different color types. According to Ralph Spore, association president, a mink promotion in conjunction with the show will be worked out with local retailers.

**IS MODERATION SAFE**

"Come on; one drink won't hurt you. Be a good sport."

How many times in colleges, and even in high schools, is this challenge flung at young people! In a few short words, it advances two main arguments of social drinkers: 1. "Moderate drinking does no harm." 2. "Drinking enhances popularity." Most persons, young or old, want to be liked, but only a few realize early that one frequently has to decide with which groups he will be popular. It should be obvious that true and lasting popularity cannot be built on shallowness; it depends on our agreeableness, thoughtfulness, and service to others.

"One drink won't hurt you." A person has to admit that there are people who apparently can take one drink and leave it alone, and that there are moderate drinkers in every city who carry on reputable businesses in an acceptable manner. However, every day in any large metropolitan newspaper there are reports of murders, traffic deaths and innumerable other tragedies caused by those "moderate drinkers." Nearly every large city hospital now has a ward for chronic drinkers. Every jail has its share of people who once thought they could drink in moderation.

Nearly every state now has a rehabilitation program for alcoholics, every one of whom thought he could "control" his drinking.

As a brain surgeon I have yet to meet a moderate-drinking colleague who would like to have me operate on his son after I "have had a few." No one does his best work after drinking. He may think he does, but his judgment is defective.

If a person never takes the first drink, he never becomes a problem drinker. In America today there are some 5,000,000 alcoholics. I have heard many of them say, "Now I wish I had never taken that first drink!" This proves that moderation is a terrible fallacy. These millions of ruined lives, with their moral degeneracy, wasted product
