THE price of Manitoba wheat has been advanced to seventy-one cents a bushel and sales at Winnipeg, Man., are consequently brisk.

TWO hardware houses—Thomas Phillips, Montreal, and J. L. Desmarceaux, Quebec—have assigned. The former's liabilities are \$50,000.

BOSTON'S official vote on the license question was for license, 24,593; against, 11,214. The Bostonians do not intend to be abstemious for this year.

IN company with nearly all the agents-general, Sir Charles Tupper has just been admitted a member of the London Chamber of Commerce.

THE Northern Light left this morning and arrived at Pictou Landing at 11.30 this forenoon. She will remain there until daylight to-morrow morning.

SENATOR MILLER, speaker of the Senate will be sworn in a member of the privy council without portfolio on his arrival to attend the session. —Halifax papers.

ON Friday evening next, before the Y. M. C. A. Literary and Scientific Society, a paper will be read by Mr. William A. Weeks, B. A., on "The Relation of the Planets."

THE Minister of Justice has refused the liquidators of the Exchange Bank permission to pay the shareholders 20 per cent. till the Government claims are paid in full.

INSTALLATION of officers in Prince Edward Division will take place this evening at 8 o'clock. After the installation the Rev. Mr. Whitman will address the Division.

ADDITION TO A COLLEGE—A wing, 70 feet long, 40 wide and four stories high, is to be built on St. Joseph's R. C. college at Memramook. The contract price is \$5,500.

I. O. O. F.—A complimentary dinner to the Grand Master and District Deputy Grand Master will be given at the Osborne House this evening, at 9 o'clock, by the Oddfellows of the city.

It is understood that Her Majesty and the Princess Louise have presented some engravings for the use of the Parliament library in Quebec to replace those that were damaged by the late fire.

SAD ACCIDENT—A lad aged eighteen and a girl of twenty-one ran away from Kingston, Ont., on Saturday, it is supposed to get married. While crossing the ice they broke through and were drowned.

It is proposed at Arichat to form a company for the prosecution of the Bank fishery, with a capital of \$20,000 in 1,000 shares of \$20 each. Capt. Dominic Laundry is one of the chief promoters of the enterprise.

SHERIFF CHAPLEAU, of the North-West territories, states that horse thieves from the United States are committing great depredations in Canadian settlements near the boundary line. Over \$4,000 worth of stock was stolen last summer.

THE members of the Salvage Corps are requested to meet at their Room, Grafton Street (next to Hook & Ladder Room), this (Wednesday) evening, 7th inst., at 8 o'clock, to appoint a 2nd Lieutenant and other business. A full attendance is requested.

It was notified after the great earthquake in the vicinity of Granada, Spain, that numerous sulphur springs ceased to flow when the first shocks were felt, but burst forth again on the following day, with loud subterranean explosions and volumes of hot vapor. They have since flowed as before.

THE trade of Moncton, according to the customs' returns, shows a gratifying increase over 1883, the exports for last year being the largest in the history of the port. The customs duties collected at Moncton, says the Times, are now in excess of those collected at any port in the Maritime Provinces outside of St. John and Halifax.

CANDIDATES FOR DORCHESTER—Marshall Thibodeau on Saturday evening took a male and female prisoner to Dorchester, where they will spend the next few months in the County jail. They were John McKinnon and Annie Guro. McKinnon had been disorderly at the railway station, and when remonstrated with by officer O'Rourke assaulted him striking him with a box. Stipendiary Wortman gave him three months. McKinnon who is a shoemaker by trade and claims to belong to Prince Edward Island, has spent two years in the penitentiary for stealing freight from the Moncton station. The Guro girl was up some days ago on a charge of vagrancy, and given till the New Year to get out of town. She failed to do so and was consequently re-arrested. —Moncton Times.

THE Silver Record, of Gothic City, Col., Dec. 28th, says:—"By a private letter from Prince Edward Island, we learn that the great, low-priced contractor of the Rocky Mountains, Malcolm McLeod, who skipped out last fall, between two days, leaving a host of sorrowing creditors, has returned to his home on Prince Edward Island, and is putting on a big splurge with his dishonestly obtained money. Besides this, we learn he is circulating false, lying reports about one of our most honest and respected townsmen, Capt. Archibald McLeod. It is true that Capt. Archy was blamed by some of the people who Malcolm victimized, as the smooth scoundrel made them believe that he was a brother of the Captain, but luckily there was a number of Prince Edward Islanders that gave the lie to the report. We would advise the good people of the Island to look out for Malcolm McLeod, for he is one of the smoothest deadbeats that ever got away with our people, and if he should return here he would get no amount of justice." Who is this Malcolm McLeod, anyway?

Local and Other Items.

MASSACHUSETTS contains, according to the last estimate of the Bureau of Education, nearly 100,000 persons who cannot write.

SIR RICHARD TEMPLE, who figured so prominently in all the proceedings of the British Association in Canada, and on several occasions expressed so strongly the favorable estimate he had formed of the country, has since his return to England been interviewed, and expressed himself in most sanguine terms of Canada and the Canadians.

THE Bermudian Sailor whose feet were frozen on board the brigantine Canadian, a vessel at Georgetown a short time ago, has been removed to the City Hospital. The unfortunate fellow will be compelled to suffer the amputation of both feet near the ankles, as they are now in a state of gangrene. The captain of the vessel who would allow such a terrible misfortune to happen to an innocent unsophisticated foreigner on board his ship is deserving of the severest censure.

STEAMER York City left St. John, N. B., for London via Halifax on Friday last. She did not take either timber or deals from St. John this time, owing to the present lowness of freights, and there being sufficient general cargo offering there and at Halifax. The export list shows a large assortment of other goods shipped by her, such as fish, butter, canned meat, vinegar, nails, carriages, woodenware, &c., for which markets are evidently being found in England, and it is to be hoped that the trade will increase. The Globe says:—With regular steam communication between the two countries, shippers now have good facilities for the business, and any information required about markets in England can be obtained through the agents of the line free of charge.

A YOUNG HERO.—On New Year's Day two boys, each 13 or 14 years of age, broke through the ice on Flax Pond in Lynn, Mass., and found themselves struggling in the deepest part. The only person near was a little boy named Elmer Dwyer, who was about 13 years of age. Hearing the cries of the drowning lads, Elmer ran for help, and finding no one at hand, took a ladder from a yard and hastened back to the pond. The brave little fellow succeeded after several heroic attempts in placing the ladder on the treacherous ice and in crawling out over it to the boys on the ladder and then to the shore, though the lad is of very slight strength and not in very good health. He himself was wet through. The only grown persons in the neighborhood were women, and but for the prompt assistance of little Elmer the boys must have drowned.

The Trouble in Newfoundland.

AN ORANGE FLAG BARS THE WAY—BISHOP MACDONALD REFUSES TO PASS UNDER IT.

(Special despatch to the Halifax Herald.)

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 5.—An orange flag was hoisted across a street in Bay Roberts yesterday. The Roman Catholic people passed under it on their way to chapel, but Bishop Macdonald of Harbor Grace, and his friends refused to do so, and claimed that the authorities should remove the flag, which he declared an obstruction. The Government despatched a posse of police as keep order, and, fearing trouble, the warship Tenedos was also sent to Bay Roberts. There was no disturbance of any kind, nor will there be, unless an attempt is made to take down the flag, and whether that could legally be done or not is a difficult question to answer. The people of Bay Roberts, to the number of a thousand, held a meeting to-day and condemned the despatch of an armed force to a place they declared peaceable and law-abiding, and which to this moment has always been so. Bay Roberts is inhabited by a stalwart, hard-working and peaceable people, largely protestant. The general feeling among moderate Protestants is that the flag flying is a childish thing of which its promoters would soon be sorry, and that Bishop Macdonald has been injudicious in taking offense at it. Any accounts materially differing from this are contrary to fact.
