

CITY ELECTORS—ATTENTION!

ALL of you who have not your names registered upon the voters' lists—which you may see in the Post Office, the Court House and other places—will be DISFRANCHISED, unless you go to the office of the County Court—or appear before the County Court—between this day and Thursday next. Each of you should go immediately. The County Clerk, in the old Province Building, will ask you all necessary questions and give you all the information you may require.

You should not be satisfied until your names are all placed upon the lists. For, remember, this is your last chance for a whole year. If you do not apply to the County Court, and attend at the County Court this week, as the law requires you to do, you will be unable—no matter how much you desire it—to record your votes when the help of every man who loves his country will be required to overthrow the ORGANIZED HYPOCRISY, and to hurl from their high places the political charlatans who are every year raising your taxes and plunging the country deeper into debt.

It is a significant fact that you have not been warned, as you should have been, by the Patriot newspaper. This juncture is just as important to you as the day of the election. Yet, the organ of the McKenzie Cauchon Combination utters never a note to warn you that you are in danger of losing your right to vote when that day comes. It is evident that the wirepullers who manipulated the Act which requires the registration of votes count upon your supineness and apathy now, to defeat Mr. Pope and to win, by a disreputable stratagem, the Queen's County Election. But, be warned in time. Go one—go all—and have your names registered.

"UTILIZED."

THE object which the members of the present Government had in view when running the last election has been gained. They banded themselves together in an unholy union to hound down Messrs. Pope and Brecken, because they had dared to say that schools, which had been already erected, might be "utilized" by the Government. The very word "utilized" which Mr. Brecken had used in his address to the electors, was seized upon as embodying an exceptionally dangerous principle. Reverend agitators, and agitators far otherwise than reverend, denounced the idea, and passed resolutions in which the unhappy word was set forth in all the dignity of italics and inverted commas. If private schools, they declared, were "utilized," ruin and destruction would soon overspread the land, and we should lose all chance of sitting beneath the branches of Mr. Davies' now celebrated "Upas Tree." The Trustees of the Wesleyan Academy pointed with pride and with much self-laudation to their resolutions, by which they had vowed never to receive Government money. Stewart, Robertson and McGill "came down handsomely." One institution, at all events, was not to be "utilized." Perish the Government that would so insult them and perish their money with them. And because the men who said this, and much more than this, with loud-voiced energy and much fury, seemed to be in earnest, people began to believe them and to think that they might be trusted.

They were trusted; and before two months elapsed these very men "utilized" the school that they bound themselves never should be "utilized." Their ill-sounding denunciations against their opponents for advocating such a principle have died away upon their lips.

But this is not all. A portion of the Trustees of the Wesleyan Academy constitute a majority of the Charlottetown School Board, and this treacherous abandonment of their principles, this "utilizing" of their school, has been with flagrant indecency, compassed by these very men. It is the nearest approach we have ever known to that perfection of unblushing impudence—Satan rebuking sin.

We do not wonder at the secrecy in which the whole matter is attempted to be shrouded, for shameless acts shun the light of day and escape observation when possible. But we do wonder that the Hon. John Longworth should have permitted

himself to be a passive instrument in these men's hands. It is no secret that when matters had been so manipulated that he was left to stand alone, a helpless minority of one, on the School Board, that he went to the Attorney General and begged to be permitted to resign. It is also no secret that he was threatened with the loss of all patronage, from Queen's Counsel fees for the prosecution of criminals to the shadowy expectancy of a County Court Judgeship, if he refused to sanction with his presence the completion of the pending job—which we admit he has been powerless to avert. It is all very well to have the School Board graced by a gentleman distinguished for his courteous manner and his affable demeanor. But the taxpayers of Charlottetown think that this privilege is too dearly purchased at the rate of sixteen hundred and fifty dollars per annum, payable monthly.

WAR DISPATCHES. A Long War Anticipated

(Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.) LONDON, Aug. 18. The Russians are making every preparation for a long war. It is announced that the Servian Ministers have tendered their resignations. At Berlin, it is reported that Germany is remonstrating against the erection, by France, of fortifications on the Swiss frontier. At Madrid, thirty persons have been arrested for Republican conspiracy.

WAR NEWS. LONDON, Aug. 17. The Russians have evacuated Elena and Beboana, and nearly all the country up to Timava. Suleiman Pasha's advance guard is close to Gabrova. He received heavy reinforcement from Constantinople.

GORNY, Aug. 17. The Czar has joined the Grand Duke Nicholas here. The Prince of Montenegro will be obliged to raise the siege of Niscas to march against the Turkish troops who are endeavoring to enter Montenegro. The Russians officially acknowledge the loss of 14,450 killed and wounded to August 9th.

ATHENS, August 17th. Turkish massacres awaken horror and indignation here.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 17. It is reported that fever is epidemic in the Russian army in Bulgaria, and is increasing. The troops are also in want of food, and refuse pay unless they receive it in the coin of their country. They threaten to surrender to the Turks unless they are paid in the coin demanded. The present state of affairs in the army is very alarming.

GENERAL NEWS. LONDON, Aug. 17. A despatch from the Viceroy of India, August 15th, states that there is a general improvement in the crop prospects in Madras, Mysore, Bombay and the North-west, which has maintained the past week. Rain is still much needed in the Punjab, Bagpootab and the Western part of the North-west Provinces. The prices for grain continue exceedingly high through the famine districts, but in Madras they are slightly easier and still are lower in every part of that presidency than in the worst parts of Bombay and Mysore. The question of grain stocks and supplies continues to cause anxiety. The grain trade at Calcutta is exceedingly active, ninety thousand tons of shipping being engaged.

PARIS, Aug. 17. President MacMahon, who is making a tour in Normandy, replying to an address of the President of the Court of Appeals at Caen, said he did not seek the triumph of any particular party, but of those principles which were the foundation of society, which were in serious jeopardy.

BELGRADE, Aug. 17. It is announced that all the Ministers have tendered their resignations. Prince Milan accepted only those of Stutch, President of the Council, and M. Meloiikovitch. M. Restics was appointed President of the Council.

THE condition of Mysore continues critical. The Governor of Bengal telegraphs concerning the condition of Bombay. The prices of grain are slightly easier, but still very high. Improvement of the situation is retarded by the want of rain. People are feeling still more the high prices. The difficulty in Bombay is aggravated by the state of Madras and Nizari, and by the inability of the railway to bring forward grain sufficient for the great demand. In Madras the numbers relieved have increased 189,000, making 385,000 increase in the last fortnight. In Mysore the laborers on the works are decreasing and the charitably relieved increasing. In Bombay the reverse is occurring, but there is a slight general increase in the totals relieved. In Madras there are 983,000 laborers on the works, and 100,000 charitably relieved. In Mysore there are 45,000 on the works and 164,000 charitably relieved, and in Bombay 265,000 on the works and 119,000 charitably relieved.
