

# A Feature for Every Friday— Among The Farmers Federation Of Agriculture News

### School District Meetings

Notices have appeared in the Thursday and Friday issues of the newspapers announcing the Federation of Agriculture School District Meetings on the night of November 18th and we refer our readers to those announcements.

We would like to emphasize the point that the Federation is the province throughout the Province and what it can accomplish and its influence and value depends upon the interest of the individual farmer.

It is not the place of the Board of Directors to tell the farmers what they should do, but rather it is up to the farmers to instruct the directors.

At Tuesday night's meeting each district elects two delegates to attend the County Annual Meeting where the directors are appointed and where the delegates can discuss questions which are held to be of importance.

The farmer who is dissatisfied with the organization or doubts its value has the privilege of stating his case in the school district meeting and of instructing the delegates to bring those opinions before the annual meeting.

There are different classes of people who for a variety of reasons are interested in the farmers, but in the final analysis it is the farmer who is interested in his own welfare.

At these school meetings those present will have the opportunity of registering their opinions on the necessity or otherwise of rural electrification, potato growers' licenses, crop accident insurance, and the use of Farm Forum as a means to improve rural life and to increase the farmers understanding of problems which affect his way of life.

Frequently, we hear the complaint that no school district meetings have been held, where this occurs the responsibility lies with the individuals who were not sufficiently interested to spend one night in a year discussing with neighbours what they felt might be done. Every rural school in the Province should be lighted next Tuesday night.

### The Winter Fair

Last week's heavy traffic at Borden was evidence that numerous Islanders took the opportunity of spending time in Amherst where much of the best of Maritime agricultural products was on display.

The exhibits and the program were both interesting and educational and could hardly fail to inspire a sense of pride on the part of Maritime farmers in Maritime achievements.

Possibly one of the most valuable features of the Show lies in the fact that Maritime people work together and meet to make the Fair the outstanding success of the year for better understanding among the Provinces and necessarily for more co-operation and we see the Maritime Winter Fair as a valuable asset in the promotion of understanding and Maritime development.

### A Prime Minister On Co-Operatives

Last week we published the statements of Eisenhower and Stevenson on co-operatives and this week to keep a proper balance we quote the opinion of former Prime Minister, W. L. Mackenzie King:

"Co-operation preserves all the benefits of free enterprise and adds the benefits of social ownership. It removes the evils of capitalism without substituting therefor the evils of political dictatorship."

There appears to be in this Province a certain misunderstanding of the true nature and aims of co-operation and prejudices which is neither justified nor well founded. The prejudice, we submit, is the result, not of what people know about co-operatives, but develops rather from what they do not know, or from unfounded opinions.

### Soil Conservation

The thinking person realizes that the soil is the basis of life and that the soil which we have today must sustain life as far into the future as time extends.

It is entirely natural that the human race should view with concern evidence of depletion of soil fertility and have some fears as to the ultimate result should such depletion continue unchecked in the years to come.

While governments and other bodies can assist in initiating programs to sustain the soil, yet in the final analysis the job must be done by the individual tiller of the soil who calls himself a landowner but who is, in reality, a trustee of the life and future of thousands of people he will never see.

Any economic system which forces farmers to produce at a loss or market soil fertility in order to provide for his family necessities and amenities of life can only result in the development of a problem of staggering proportions.

The obvious road to soil conservation lies in the direction of fair economic returns, this being provided the rank and file of farmers can and will solve the conservation problem.

### County Annual Meetings

At an early date announcements will be made through the press of the County Annual meeting to be held at O'Leary on the 20th; Morrell on the 21st, and Charlottetown on the 25th.

At these meetings fifteen new directors will be appointed and their is the responsibility to give expression to the ideas of the district represented and carry out the will of the members.

These meetings are possibly the only ones held outside of Charlottetown which give a large number of farmers in each County the opportunity of meeting together as farmers to consider agricultural questions.
