**Really Big Codfish Stay Under Cold Water Current**

OTTAWA (CP)—Longliners as a fishing term now is associated with a rich reserve of fish recently discovered off the east coast of Newfoundland.

The discovery could mean new life in the area's fishing industry, and new prosperity for Newfoundland's east coast.

The development is related in a report issued by the fisheries research board, telling of the results of three years of experiments in the Bonavista area by Dr. Wilfred Templeman, director of the board's biological station at St. John's, and A. M. Fleming of the same station.

**FISH AT BOTTOM**

They found at the bottom of the ocean in this area, prevented from swimming to the surface by a barrier of frigid water, a vast reservoir of big, fat cod, waiting for the fishermen who would venture offshore into deeper waters.

To get at them, fishermen must use long lines. Hence the term "longliners."

The waters off this coast are like an immense ice-cream brick. Top and bottom are warm-water layers, and sandwiched in between is the cold water of the Labrador current.

The Labrador layer extends some 20 miles along the slope of the continental shelf and is an unhealthy zone for codfish that would attempt to swim along it.

But it can be crashed by swimming quickly straight up, or by going far out to sea where the layer loses its coldness. The cod are wise to these escape routes, as proven by the large schools that swarm to the province's inshore waters to feed on teeming capelin. It is on these inshore waters that fishermen for centuries have carried out their trade.

the lower depths. The researchers found that only the young cod attempt to crash the cold barrier. The older fish are content to remain in the warm lower layer, constituting an untapped supply of the real big fellows.

To take advantage of the discovery, the Newfoundland east coast fishery would have to switch from traditional use of small boats and net traps, handlines and linetrawls, to larger boats and better, longline equipment.

The researchers, in their article, say that such an innovation would make the catch more uniform from month to month.

Also, if fishing with larger boats proved profitable, their greater mobility would facilitate centralization of east coast communities. The result would be better establishments for handling the catch and better community services for the fishermen.

**Will Paddle Some 2,000 Miles**

BELLEVILLE, Ont. (CP)—It's a little more than 500 miles due north as the crew flies from Wauabashene, Ont., on the southern tip of Georgian Bay, to Fort Albany on the western shore of James Bay.

But if you plan to paddle your

own canoe, as Ron Vandervelde of Belleville does, the distance is more like 2,000 miles.

The 18-year-old outdoors enthusiast plans to paddle through Georgian Bay and Lake Superior into the lakes and rivers of far Northern Ontario. He hopes to reach Fort Albany by the end of summer, and plans a winter stay at Fort Albany, with work there if he can find it.

His 16-foot, 85-pound canoe is equipped with a small sail, and will carry a month's supplies at a time. He gained experience on a similar trip through the Northwest Territories.

He's travelling alone, he said, because he couldn't find anyone

else interested in making the trip.
