ADVICES from St. John's, Nfld., of the 28th ult., says the steamship "Aurora," the first arrival from the sealing grounds, has just arrived with 28,000 prime seals, valued at from \$60,000 to \$65,000. The whole voyage occupied less than three weeks. The steamers "Neptune" and "Hector," follow with full cargoes. The former has \$35,000 prime harps and the latter 25,000. The schooner "Laudamia," with a cargo of cod, eels and herring, bound from Harbor Grace for Boston, was cut through with ice and sank in Trepassy Bay this evening. The crew were saved.

CANADIAN CONSULAR AGENTS.—An Ottawa telegram of March 24th, to the Boston Herald says:—With a view to extending the commercial relations of the Dominion more generally with foreign countries, it is stated that at an early date the Canadian Government will endeavor to obtain the permission of the Imperial Government to be allowed to send representatives to such of the British Consulates to which it may be in the interests of the country to have an agent attached. While such an arrangement would afford all the advantages Canada might require, it would not be attended by any great cost to the country.

BUSINESS TRUBLES.—The Pictou News announces, with regret, the suspension of R. W. Oliver, dry goods merchant. "He has made an assignment, bearing date the 18th, to A. C. McDonald and Henry G. Ives, for the benefit of creditors who execute within thirty days. His total liabilities are about \$3,000, and assets exceed that amount by some \$4,000. Preferences are made amounting to \$5,839.82. It is likely that all creditors will be paid in full, unless there be an unusually great shrinkage in the value of the assets. Mr. Oliver's business career has been a thoroughly honorable one, and we trust soon to see him resume business. He is now selling for the assignee."

The Cincinnati Riots.

NEW YORK, March 31.

The latest from Cincinnati, dated 3 a. m. to-day says one half of the militia on guard at the jail have been relieved. Since the firing at 8 o'clock last night no one has been shot. The volleys since that time have been merely blind to clear the streets. It has been ascertained no one was killed by firing at 8 o'clock last night, but three persons were wounded. By order of the Secretary of War, a detachment of the United States regulars are held in readiness to protect United States property if necessary.

Everything Quiet.

CINCINNATI, March 31, 9 a. m.

Everything quiet this morning. Very few people are about the Court House, and these are merely from curiosity. Barricades are still in position around the jail, but they will be removed to-day. The feeling is that the trouble is over.

War Notes.

SUAKIN, March 31.

All British troops are embarking for home except the Sixteenth Rifles, who remain to garrison the town until relieved by the Egyptian troops from Cairo.

CAIRO, March 31.

Advices from Gen. Gordon, under date 23rd, confirm the reported execution of the two Black Pashas.

LONDON March 31.

A despatch to the Times, from Khartoum, dated 23rd, says the rebels are still encamped opposite the town, but their numbers are decreasing.

Court-Martialed and Shot.

CAIRO, March 31.

It is reported here that the two black Pashas, whose treachery caused the defeat of Gen. Gordon's troops, have been court-martialed and shot.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

MONDAY, March 31.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Sullivan the following Law Bills were severally read the second time, put through Committee and reported agreed to, namely:—

The Bill relating to Law Students.
The Bill respecting the Execution of Deeds by married women.
An Act respecting affidavits and affirmations.

The bill relating to Law students authorizes the Law Society of this Island to make rules and regulations permitting Law students, while articled to any Attorney in this Province, and the time spent at such schools may be taken and considered as part of the apprenticeship of such scholars.

The bill relating to Affidavits provides that affidavits or affirmations, made before a Notary Public outside this Province, may be used for all lawful purposes, as if made or sworn to before the proper officers in this Province.

The bill relating to the Execution of Deeds by married women relates to the execution of deeds for lands, whereof married women may be entitled in their own right, and points out the mode by which the rights of dower in such cases may be released.

The Bill to incorporate the Charlottetown Water Works Company, was considered in Committee, and progress reported thereon.

Hon. Mr. SULLIVAN delivered to Mr. Speaker a message from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, transmitting the Estimates for the current year to the House. They are as follow:—

"Elfin", 1,200.00; Provincial Building, 2,225.00; Printing and Stationery, etc., 550.00; Office of Registrar of Deeds, 3,850.00; Importation of Stock, 2,000.00; Total, \$249,379.94

On motion of Hon. Mr. Sullivan, seconded by Hon. Mr. McLeod, Resolved, That the House will to-morrow resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole House to consider of the supply granted to Her Majesty.

The Bill to incorporate The Island Publishing Company was considered in Committee of the Whole House.

A debate arose on the name of the Bill, and a motion was made to amend the title thereof by inserting the word "Patriot" instead of the word "Island." This motion gave rise to a considerable debate, and after some time spent in committee, progress was reported on the Bill.

It being then after 12 o'clock, midnight, the House adjourned until to-day at 10 o'clock, a. m.
