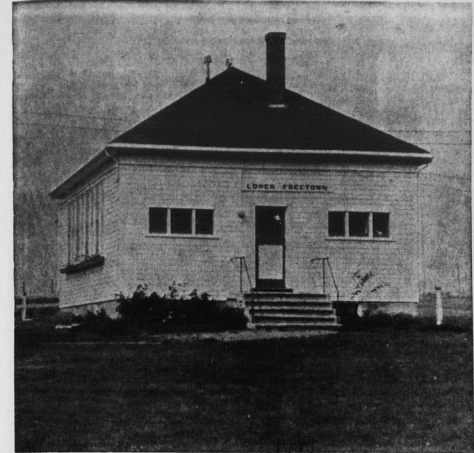
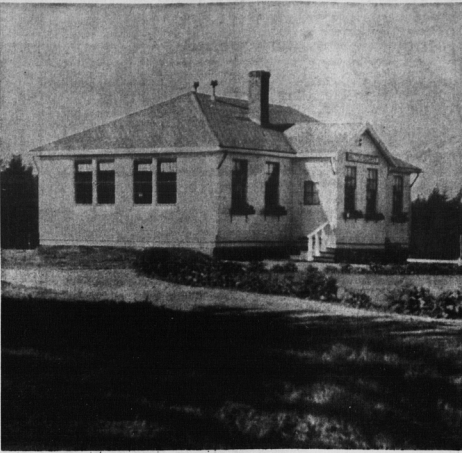


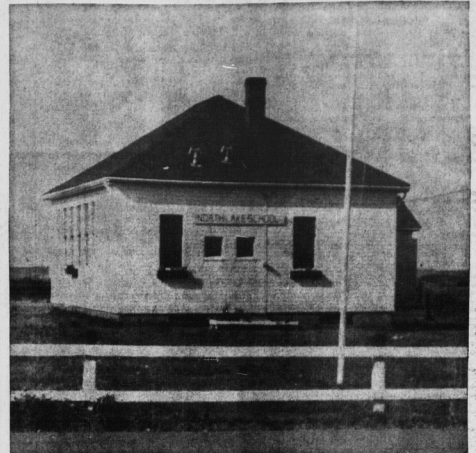
Rural School Competition Winners In Rural Beautification Society's Contest

Northumberland Dist. Y's Men Discuss Goals

Changes in faith in a changing world was the theme used by Rev. Malcolm Harlow in addressing the district conference of Y's Men held at the Charlottetown YMCA, Sunday.

Mr. Harlow challenged the Y's Men to take part in the new interest in biblical theology, to take advantage of the new spirit of unity which is bringing Christians together and to go out into the community acknowledging the Christian's responsibility in society, and taking risks to strengthen those things in which they believe.

The conference was attended by 90 Y's Men from clubs in Moncton, Amherst, Summerside and Charlottetown. It was opened with a business meeting presided over by George Wright, Charlottetown, the governor for the Northumberland district.

IS ELECTED

Austin Blandford, Amherst, was named district governor or elect.

Goals announced for the region included increased membership and more clubs and a new, enlarged quota for collecting used postage stamps for the organization's Y's Men fund.

The first forum presented by the Summerside club and chaired by Edgar Ramsay dealt with the factors contributing to interesting club meetings. In another forum presented by the Moncton club and chaired by Fred Smith, the system of brother clubs in Y'sdom was explained.

Suggested work outlook projects included the establishment of brother clubs and the supply-

ing of subscriptions to the Y's Men's World, the organization's official magazine, to more Y's Men outside this continent. The value of the YMCA's official organ was 14 Cents.

COURSE OF VALUE

James Nicholson, Amherst, dealt with the newest department of the Y's Men, the Y's Men's Postage Stamp Club, which is held annually at Holland Cove, P.E.I. This course, sponsored by the Maritime Y's Men, aims to provide leadership for Maritime YMCA's. The value of the course to the individual as well as to the organization was stressed.

A period of recreational activity followed. The convention delegates assembled in the First Baptist Church for a devotional period conducted by Lester Keizer of Charlottetown. The Alpha Y's Men's Chorus of Charlottetown with soloist, Lorán McNeil, contributed to the worship period.

At the closing banquet held at the Y's, tribute was paid to Ernest V. Bell, Charlottetown, holder of the international organization's highest honor, the Palladium Award, for his work in founding and developing the Bishop's Fund, whereby used postage stamps are converted to funds which bring delegates from all over the world to the international convention.

Items of fun and fellowship, including skits, songs and presentation concluded a successful convention.

October Weather Records Show Warm, Sunny Month

Warren Burns, weather observer at the Experiment Station, has revealed that temperatures in 1963, the Island experienced higher temperatures and more sun during the month of October this year.

The mean temperature of 49.7 degrees compares favourably with last year's 47.2 degrees. Only 2.14 inches of rain fell this

year giving the Island about half of last October's 4.07 inches. The 17.3 hours of sun enjoyed this year beats last year's 10.5 hours.

The average figures for October on P.E.I. are 48.2 degrees temperature; 4.02 inches of rain; and 139.8 hours of sun.

There were 9 days of rain in this October compared to 12 days in the same month last year, with the coldest days being the 10th and 11th showing 28 degrees. The warmest day was Oct. 19, with a temperature of 72 degrees.

The all-time records for October list the coldest month as occurring in 1925, with a mean temperature of 32.1 degrees compared to 1913's warmest month of 54.3 degrees mean temperature.

The brightest month on record was Oct. 1947, with 183.9 hours of sun. The darkest October lists only 66.3 hours of sun in 1915.

The driest month occurred in 1931 with a mere 39 inches of rain compared to the really damp October in 1944 when 6.53 inches of rain fell on P.E.I.

Revolutionary Junta Works On New S. Viet Nam Gov't

SAIGON (AP) - The revolutionary junta that destroyed the military Diem regime in South Viet Nam worked Sunday on the composition of a Buddhist-led government which it expects will win quick recognition from the United States.

The reins of power, however, presumably will be held by the junta itself. The chief of this announcement is Mai Gen-Dinh Van Minh, a 47-year-old Buddhist who engineered the coup.

A Buddhist who served as vice-president under Diem, a report is reported to be heading up the provisional regime as premier. He is Ngai, they who had little power but a reputation as a mediator in the vice-presidency.

There were reports that another Buddhist who was formerly secretary of state and diem minister, Nguyen Dinh Thuan, also would be given a post in the new cabinet.

Friday. Power lines were being restored. The new regime was without an official news agency. Most set fire to the official Viet Nam press building a few hours after the coup ended Saturday. It was destroyed.
