Angling And Hunting Licenses To Be Made Available On Monday

Resident angling and hunting licenses and non-resident angling licenses for 1951 will go on sale in Prince Edward Island on Monday next, it was announced here yesterday by the Department of Industry and Natural Resources.

Resident license will sell at one dollar each and non-resident permits at three dollars. The season on speckled trout opens April 16 and closes on September 15.

Persons under 16 years of age, resident farmers, rural laborers and commercial fishermen do not have to possess a license to fish. Licenses are procurable at the Department of Industry and Natural Resources, and Travel Bureau, Charlottetown.
