F. is about to be instituted at Fredericton N. B. POTATOES.—The Mail reports that potatoes are retailing at Market Wharf, Halifax, for 55 cents a bushel. SANK.—The Steam yacht Landsdowne was discovered yesterday foundered. The tug F. C. Batt succeeded in towing it to the shore, so that at low water it may be pumped out. DISAPPEARING.—The Agriculturist reports that Summerside harbor is now open for some distance beyond the lighthouse, and the ice is melting very rapidly on both sides of the channel. I. O. O. F.—St. Lawrence Lodge will meet at half past seven this evening in order to confer the Initiatory and third degrees. A final meeting of the Natal Day committee will also be held. CITIZENS' MEETING.—A public meeting of citizens to consider the amendments made by the Legislative Council to the new city bill will be held in the Market Hall to-morrow (Tuesday) afternoon at 4 o'clock. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Death of Hon. Thos. White, After a Brief Illness.

THE BUDGET POSTPONED.

OTTAWA, April 21. Hon. Thomas White, Minister of the Interior, died at 9 o'clock to-night, of inflammation of the lungs. He was ill only one week. Mr. White was conscious until an hour before his death, and took an affectionate farewell of the members of his family. In consequence of the death of Mr. White it is expected that the House of Commons will adjourn on Monday till Tuesday night, and the budget speech will not be delivered until Friday. The body will be taken to Montreal on Tuesday morning and the funeral will take place on Wednesday.

THE EMPEROR FREDERICK.

His General Condition Improved.

BERLIN, April 22, 9 a. m. It is said the Emperor passed a nice quiet night. The fever has moderated and his general condition is better.

BERLIN, April 22 (9 p. m.) A bulletin says the Emperor has passed a pretty good day. There was less fever than in former days, but his temperature began to rise towards evening. The doctors attending the Emperor declare that he suffered no pain whatever to-day, one of the few days since his present illness began. Absolute rest is still imperative. It is impossible to predict whether the improvement will continue.

BISHOP-ELECT COURTNEY

Arrives at Yarmouth.

HE IS WELL RECEIVED.

HALIFAX, April 22. Right Rev. Dr. Courtney, Bishop-elect of Nova Scotia, arrived at Yarmouth from Boston yesterday, and preached his first sermon in his new diocese in Trinity Church in that town to-day. He was welcomed at Yarmouth by Hon. L. E. Baker, Rural Deans Fillue and Gibbons, and Rev. Ambrose Ruggles and others. Bishop Courtney was presented with an address. He held a reception and captivated the people. Trinity Church was thronged at the morning service. Dr. Courtney preached from 1st Peter, 1st 11 and 12. A despatch says the people were charmed by his eloquence. The consecration takes place at St. Luke's Cathedral, Halifax, on Wednesday, the officiating Bishops being the Diocesan of Fredericton, Ontario, Niagara and Maine. Canon DuMoulin, of Toronto, will preach the consecration sermon. The new Bishop will hold a general public reception on Thursday or Friday, at Freemason Hall.

Montreal News.

MONTREAL, April 21.

The water in the river is again rising, and last night the Mill and Commissioner Street pumps were set to work. The Governor-General has accepted an invitation to receive an address on April 30, at a conversation for conferring degrees in the Faculty of Arts. Mr. Legais Liberal candidate in Maskinonge, is suing La Monde for \$10,000 damages for alleged libel. Saturday's Letendard has a bitter article on the Virgin Mary statue in question. After stating how great an ornament the Virgin Mary statue would be to the city, it attacks Nelson's monument, saying, "It is time to purge the city of the presence of the statue which for three quarters of a century has polluted it." A half yearly dividend of five per cent. without bonus, was declared yesterday by the Bank of Montreal. Noonan, Gibbon & Co., clothiers, have assigned. Liabilities \$16,000.

News from Toronto.

TORONTO, April 22.

A meeting of the joint committees of the Carpenters' Union in the city was held last night, and a communication from the Master Carpenters' Association, refusing to enter into an agreement or arbitrate, was taken into consideration. It was unanimously decided to strike this season as soon as an opportunity offers. Meantime the work of organizing will be prosecuted vigorously. This will paralyze building operations. Mrs. Longley, wife of the absconding parson, left yesterday to join her husband at Niagara Falls, N. Y. Before leaving she stated that she had the utmost confidence in her husband. The matter was referred to in several Methodist Church to-day. Rev. E. A. Stafford, in the Metropolitan Church, warmly defended Bro. Longley, declaring his firm belief in his entire innocence of anything more than an indiscretion. No reference was made to it in Mr. Longley's church.

The Revolt Suppressed.

BUCHAREST, April 22.

The revolt of peasants has been suppressed. Wholesale arrests were made. The prisons are overflowing. The majority will be liberated. A quantity of grain is being distributed among the starving peasantry by the militia.
