

Moncton Man Made Master C.N.R. Mechanic For P.E.I.

Robert Lyall Steeves, Moncton, has been appointed Master Mechanic of the C.N.R. Prince Edward Island Division. He succeeds George Edward MacCallum who retired this month after a 44-year CNR career.

A native of Moncton, Mr. Steeves brings a wide knowledge and long experience in railroading to his new position. Having joined the C.N.R. service in 1914 as a fireman in the operating department at Moncton. Was promoted to locomotive engineer in 1943, a rating made permanent in 1949. He has been road foreman of engines since 1956. Mr. Steeves and his wife, the former Anne Bates of Riverside, near Moncton, are enthusiastic golfers. In addition, Mr. Steeves is a curler. For many years he was well known in Moncton softball circles as a proficient catcher and coach.

Mr. MacCallum, also a native of New Brunswick, was born in Moncton, in Albert County near Moncton. He joined the C.N.R. at

Moncton in 1916 as a locomotive wiper and fireman. He saw war service in the first world war from 1916 to 1919, when he returned to the railway as fireman. He was promoted to locomotive engineer in 1935 and in 1938 was appointed travelling fireman (fireman's instructor). In 1942 he was appointed master mechanic of the C.N.R.'s Edmundston Division and in 1955 transferred in the same position to Prince Edward Island.

Mr. MacCallum was presented with a purse of money from his associates by G. R. Greenough, C.N.R. superintendent of the Island Division at an informal ceremony. Mrs. MacCallum, the former Eitel Bradley of Rothesay, N.B., also received a gift presented by Miss Jean MacLean of the C.N.R. offices here. Mr. and Mrs. MacCallum plan to retire to Mrs. MacCallum's birthplace near Rothesay.

The MacCallums have five daughters, all of whom are married, except Pat, who is attending school.
