

# Burns Anniversary Marked By Scots Around World

LONDON (Reuters)—Far-flung Scots and poetry lovers ate and drank their way through a weekend celebration of the 200th anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns.

Steaming bowls of haggis and Scotch whisky laced banquet tables in capitals around the world, but the heart of the birthday eve celebration Saturday night was in a Scottish town, Kilmarnock, hard by Burns' birthplace of Alloway.

There the Burns Federation held its main dinner and acted as host for Commonwealth and overseas visitors. Although the birthday anniversary was Sunday, the celebration was held Saturday night because of Scotland's Sunday closing laws.

They toasted the poet's memory with John Barleycorn—his pet name for whisky—and tackled servings of haggis, a succulent dish composed of oatmeal, suet, onions and spices.

The haggis was played in a

draw-killed pipe in keeping with Burns' own respectful attitude toward the dish.

"The groaning trencher there we fill, your hurdies (haunches) like a distant hill, while through your pores the dewy distil, like amber bead."

Because the liquor laws of Scotland and the calendar aspired to dry out the Sunday celebrations, socially-minded Burnsians were reported mostly content with a quiet reading of the works of the bard, such as: "O whisky! Soul of plays an' pranks, accept a bardies grat' thanks; when wanting thee, what tuneless cranks are my poor verses."

Sunday, however, was a busy day for the tiny post office in Alloway village. It was specially opened so that devotees and philatelists could send off officially stamped bicentenary mail to enthusiasts throughout the world.

This is an anniversary concession by the British post office. Alloway mail normally is stamped from Ayr.

At Ayr meanwhile, Russia of-

ficially joined in the ceremonies honoring Scotland's favorite son, Grigorie Ionisyan, a first secretary at the Russian Embassy in London, placed a wreath with a Burns quotation in Russian at the foot of the poet's statue there.

(Moscow radio reported that a bicentenary exhibition of Burns works has opened in the Soviet capital.) An article in a Soviet newspaper said his "true democracy lay in his determination to fight with the art of poetry as his weapon for the emancipation of the people."

A Scotland-wide series of pageants, plays and memorial services for the poet this year will reach a climax in the Burns Federation bicentenary conference at Ayr Sept. 11 to 13.

Amid all the celebrations, however, the Glasgow Herald says in an editorial that Burns "has ceased, or is ceasing, to be a symbol; 200 years after his birth it is quite possible (though, it may yet cause resentment) to study him as a writer of extraordinary, but not unlimited talent."

# Full Military Funeral Today For Late Dr. J. A. MacPhee

SUMMERSIDE—A full military funeral will be held in Summerside this morning for the late Lt. Col. Dr. J. A. MacPhee, Summerside physician, who died in Prince County Hospital on Friday at the age of 75 years.

The order of procession will be firing party, escort, band, fourth degree Knight of Columbus flower carriage, funeral director, gun carriage with pall, pallbearers, (eight Lieutenant-Colonels in uniform), bearers, insignia bearer, honorary pallbearers, immediate family, officers in uniform, Canadian Legion, Knights of Columbus main party, Sea Cadets, medical association, and other organizations.

The legion and all other groups will form on Fitzroy Street between Central and Spring Streets about 9.30, and move along Fitzroy Street to arrive opposite the MacPhee home at 9.40 a.m., with the procession leaving at 9.45 a.m. Enroute to St. Paul's Church in slow march, where a Requiem High Mass and a Knights of Columbus service will commence at 10 a.m.

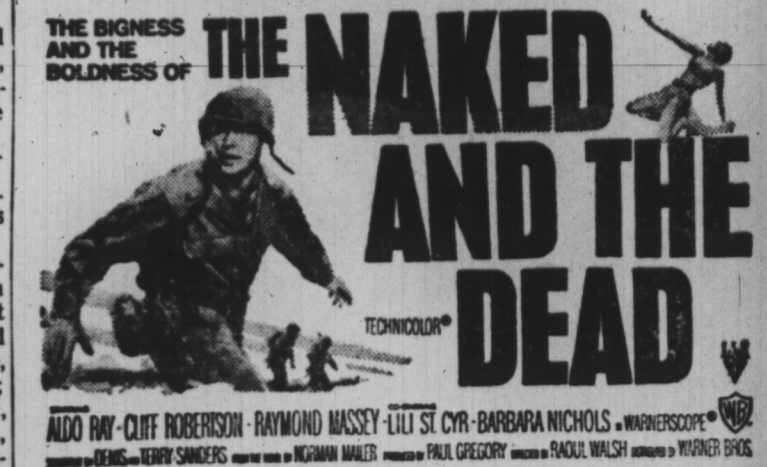
