THE BRAZILIAN LINE.—The steamship "Comte d'Eu," the first of the Brazilian line, which sailed from this port last evening, had a cargo for Brazil, consisting of 3,650 drums of dry fish, 250 cases of preserved lobsters, and other goods, consisting of oats, flour, potatoes, deals, etc., the value of which is \$26,990. She also took a large quantity of pickled and dry fish, etc., to St. Thomas, valued at \$3,178. The total cargo was about 900 tons weight, and in value \$30,168.—Herald Chronicler.

We like to keep the world informed of the progress of American inventions. The latest comes to us from the far West. Some enterprising "capitalists" and "financial" gentlemen moved into Dakota Territory, formed themselves into a "county," passed laws and regulations, and gave themselves a standing in the eyes of the financial world. FIVE PER CENT BONDS.

TENDERS will be received at the Union Bank, Charlottetown, until TUESDAY, the 31st day of January, at noon, for Bonds to the sum of \$10,000, issued by the Minister and Trustees of St. James Church in Charlottetown, pursuant to an Act of Assembly passed in 1877.
