## Kings County Hospital Has Annual Meeting

MONTAGUE — Douglas Dennis, Charlottetown, a Prince Edward Island Hospital Commission official was the guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Kings County Memorial Hospital held last evening at the Beaver Club. Mr. Dennis was introduced by the chairman, Neil Hooley.

In his interesting address he gave a comprehensive explanation of the Hospital Plan which goes into effect in Prince Edward Island Oct. 1st.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by the secretary, G. Arnold Wightman. The financial reports were presented by the hospital secretary and the auxiliary organizations as follows: Beaver Club, Mrs. A. C. MacKay; Ladies Auxiliary, Mrs. E. H. Stewart; Nursery Club, Miss Florrie Beaton.

In his report, Mr. Hooley gave a splendid resume of the activities of the board. He said 38 combination windows, a cardiograph, x-ray machine, furniture for the de luxe room and two propane ranges were among the many equipment purchases.

A new parking lot to accommodate 30 cars is being built and an emergency room is to be equipped in the basement of the hospital. He paid tribute to the board members, medical staff, office staff and the secretary for their co-operation during the year.

Dr. Preston McIntyre reported for the medical board and Mrs. R. G. MacDonald, matron, reported that 1,196 patients received care at the hospital with a total of 9,512 patient days. There were 135 major operations, 374 minor operations and 542 x-rays taken. The present medical board was re-appointed, and the board of trustees was also re-appointed. Judge J.S. DesRoches, Leslie Hunter, and Silas Mackay were appointed for three years. Also on the board are Dr. McIntyre, Neil Hooley, James Cain, Richard MacLean, Mrs. B.H. Yeo, Mrs. B.N. Stewart and Mrs. Becher Hickox.

Prior to the adjournment a vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Dennis for his informative address on a subject of keen interest to all residents throughout the province.
