usually held every five years and now meeting in Ottawa for the first time since 1935. The conference, informal and closed to the public, has drawn delegates from 16 Commonwealth countries and observers from the Republic of Ireland, the United Nations and the Commonwealth secretariat in London.

Walter E. Duffett, head of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and Canadian chairman of the conference, said in an interview Monday the shortage of trained personnel is universal. Governments everywhere are embarking on programs requiring more statisticians and economists at a faster rate than they are graduating from universities.

SUBSIDIZE STUDENTS

The United Kingdom and Australia are trying to meet the problem by subsidizing university undergraduates. K. M. Archer, Australia's Commonwealth statistician, said promising students are selected in their junior university years and put on the government payroll at a starting salary which pays their living, tuition and book expenses and leaves them about \$15 a week pocket money. The students work for the Australian statistics bureau during their university vacations and are expected to join it full-time on graduation.

Sharp Says Full Provision Not Made For Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (CP) — Evidence makes it clear that Canada and other industrial countries "have not in fact made adequate provision or (foreign) aid," Canadian Finance Minister Sharp said here. He also said the rate of advance toward agreement on expanding supplies of international credit and reserves—for more

so-called international liquidity—has been disappointing and he called for more progress in the next year.

Sharp, heading the Canadian delegation at the annual meeting of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund, dealt with the two main issues before the conference. These are signs that aid from the industrial countries to the poorer ones is lagging and when there are problems in getting agreement on supplements to the American dollar, pound sterling and gold as the grease for international trade and aid.

"In spite of the striking achievements in the developing countries... in spite of the phenomenal increases in real production in the industrialized countries, we have allowed demand to run ahead of our productive capabilities," Sharp said.

SAYS AIMS TOO HIGH
"Many of us are trying to do too much too quickly," he said. He agrees with the criticism Monday by Director-General Pierre Paul Schweitzer of the fund that the industrial countries should mix up their solutions for current inflation.

Schweitzer, complaining about mounting interest rates as a drag on foreign aid, said in effect the better-off countries are relying too much on tight money and not enough on higher taxes to cool off their economies.

Sharp said, however, that Canada's aid program has been expanding steadily, up \$50,000,000 in the last year, toward the recommended international goal of one per cent of national income annually. He reviewed Canadian steps which have eliminated or reduced interest charges on loans to needy countries, depending on their economic status.

He said there seems to be agreement within the Commonwealth as well as outside that the monetary fund should maintain a close relationship with any arrangements for expanding the supply of foreign-exchange reserves.

This deal was played in the 1963 World Olympiad par event. West was instructed to open the bidding with five clubs, after which South was eventually required to play (but not necessarily expected to bid) Seven No-trump. The required opening lead was the king of clubs.

Some of the problems posed in par contests are rather far fetched, but this does not mean that they cannot be highly instructive at the same time.

For example, take this hand where South is in seven no-trump. He does not see the opponents' cards, but he does acquire highly pertinent information when he wins the club lead with the ace and East shows out, discarding a heart.

He now knows nine of West's 13 cards and has to plan his

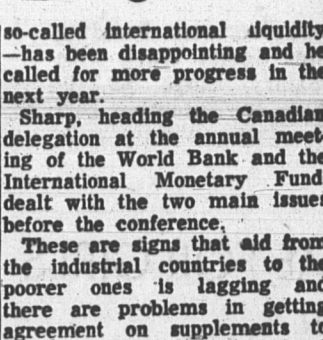
Old Coal-Burning Engine Scheduled For Special Run
