Both teams came up with a fast skating, wide-open style of play that made the game crowd pleasing to watch. The pace was very fast at times in the second and third periods with plenty of smart passing and bumping tossed in.

Goalies Don Lockhart and Al Millar had their great moments with Lockhart being the busiest man on the ice. Don had 45 stops fired his way and he turned aside 38 of them. Millar made 18 stops but 10 of them came in the second period and many of them were of the spectacular variety.

Game Cleanly Played

The game was very cleanly played as referee Charlie Good had only two minor penalties to hand out. Both went to the Islanders for minor offenses.

The smallest crowd of the season was on hand for the contest. They saw the Islanders carry the play in the first period but in the second period especially and again in the third the Miners came back to give the Islanders a battle.

Gordie Millar of the Miners tested the Islanders Al Millar with a hard shot 25 seconds after the game got underway and the Winnipeg-born netminder made a good save for the game's first serious action.

The opening goal came with amazing suddenness at the 2:10 mark with Marcel Clements being the marksman. Bob Gray fired a 30 foot shot that Lockhart stopped but Clements tore in from left wing, picked up the rebound and batted it home.

Whitlock made it 2-0 about eleven minutes later when he slapped the puck from behind the net. The puck hit Lockhart's pads and bounded into the cage. Jimmy MacKenzie and Larry Travis drew assists.

About four minutes later Ronnie Hurst ran the score to 3-0 by converting Don Bellingher's goal mouth pass.

Marcel Clements was sitting out the first penalty of the game when Bob Cooper opened the scoring for the Miners. Cooper, who played forward throughout the game, fired a blazing shot from the corner that caught the twines on the far side of the cage.

Buck Whitlock scored his second goal from 20 feet in front of the net after Don Lockhart turned aside a hard drive by Bob Gray. The puck bounded out front as Whitlock along with a Miners defenseman feel to the ice. Buck grabbed the puck, jumped to his feet and fired the puck between Lockhart's feet to make the score 4-1.

Gordie Miller scored from a scramble after a determined Miners power play to reduce the Islanders lead to two goals. Four minutes later Whitlock got this one back by slapping home Gray's pass-out.

Best Action of Game

Marcel Clements and Lou Kiley, who played a standout game after returning to the Islanders following a four day lay-off, came up with the first good play of the third period but Lockhart spoiled their efforts.

The Islanders poured on the pressure around the five-minute mark but again it was no go as Lockhart rose to the occasion with a great stop off George McLagan. The hockey was very fast at this part of the game.

Outside Work On New School Nears Completion

Workers at the new Montague school have completed most of the outside work and are already beginning on the inside. During the past month great progress has been made. The built-up roof, which required so much work, has been completed, and almost all the insul stone siding has been placed on the walls. Modern style windows have been set in each room so that already the school presents a fine exterior appearance. Inside considerable work has been completed in placing the insulation, together with the insul board on several ceilings and walls.

After the completion of all the outside work, it is expected that grading will be started and completed before the winter season. Work will continue on completing the inside of the building as rapidly as possible so that it may be ready for occupancy early in the new year.

Experimental Farm Station At Amherst Is.

A definite decision to establish a second experimental station in the Magdalen Islands has been reached by the Federal Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, it was announced last night by Mr. R. C. Parent, superintendent of the Experimental Farm here.

Site of the new illustration station was previously selected by Mr. Parent during one of his several trips to Amherst Island. The other station in the Magdalen is on Grindstone Island.

The new station will be under the supervision of the Experimental Farm here which means that frequent trips there will have to be made by Mr. Parent and Mr. Norman Black as they will carry on a long series of tests involving soils, field crop manures and fertilizers and pasture work.

Amherst Island station will be under the charge of Mr. Alderic Lapierre, Portage du Cap, Amherst Island, who has been in charge of the Grindstone station.

Dredge Completes Operations In Montague River

Dredge 115 has completed operations in the Montague River and is being dismantled for the winter. The tug boats Pugwash, Glen Livet, and Canso have taken out the scows and some equipment, but it is not known definitely whether or not the dredge will be taken to Nova Scotia.

During the three seasons in which the dredge has been in Montague it has completed a 14-foot deep channel throughout the course of the river from Montague bridge to Shaw's Point, and in the process has removed the sharp points in the river channel. It has also completed dredging a much needed dock area, and a turning space for larger ships.

That this work has been of value is evidenced by the number of ships which have docked here this year, including large pulpwood boats which have been unable to come here in the past due to the heavy silt fill-in which considerably reduced the channel depth. It is over 15 years since the river was last dredged, and at that time was also considerably filled in. With the present deep channel, it is expected that large vessels will be able to dock at Montague for many years which will have a great effect on the amount of produce moved from this area.
