Alberton Approves Memorial Arena Plan

The construction of a "Jacques Cartier" memorial arena housing a skating rink, museum, facilities for Alberton Prince County Exhibition Association and year-round recreation was given unanimous approval last night at a well attended meeting in Alberton Regional High School.

Rev. Gerald Steele chaired the meeting, held immediately following the annual regional high school meeting, and outlined the advantages of the proposed arena for the future welfare of the community and the young people. He expressed appreciation for the wonderful spirit of co-operation received from all sides and gave some of the plans for the financing of the project.

Tentative plans are to locate the arena on the exhibition grounds across the street from the high school.

The incorporation of the historical background of West Prince, where Jacques Cartier landed in 1534, was suggested by Rev. David MacDonald, a member of the project committee. The all-purpose building could contain a French-Canadian museum featuring the history of the French people in Canada, Mr. MacDonald said, while noting that there are more French-speaking people in Prince County than in the other two counties combined.

Herbert Matthews, Alberton and Elvin Boulter, Cleary, directors of Alberton Prince County Association, offered full support in the building project.

On motion the present committee was given power to set up two committees, one a building committee and the second a finance committee.

Members of the project committee appointed two months ago to investigate the project are: Father Steele, chairman, Mr. MacDonald, Jack Profit, Mr. Matthews and Gerald Hardy.

Firemen Are Busy In West Prince

ALBERTON - A small barn at Alberton, owned by E. E. Lanter, was damaged by fire yesterday morning. Alberton fire brigade quickly brought the blaze under control and prevented the flames from spreading to another nearby barn and the dwelling also located fairly close to the burning building.

Loss was of a minor nature. Late Monday night, Alberton firemen were called to Conway where a section of bush lanes was burning. The department of industry fire prevention truck was taken to the scene in the event of the blaze burning out of control but its assistance wasn't required.

On Monday morning the firemen were called to St. Lawrence where a fire destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Burns.

The blaze was far advanced by the time the fire truck reached the scene, about 10 miles from Alberton, but the firemen assisted in keeping the fire from spreading to other buildings.

A small amount of furniture was saved from the ground floor.

Blackout Cause Still Mystery

Plant superintendent Jack Boomhower last night reported that Maritime Electric Company line crews yesterday made a section of bush lanes and transmission lines west of Summerside, but were unable to come up with any indication as to what caused Monday night's blackout of the west end of the province.

The blackout which lasted for several hours, in the same manner that it went off, came back on the same way at about 11:15 Tuesday morning, with the aid of a known man named Mr. Boomhower said he was at a loss to explain the cause, but did have an idea about a possible clue. At the time of the blackout, he said that the Town of Summerside was being fed from Maritime Electric transmission lines, and there is a possibility that a fault on the town's system could have been feeding back into the company circuits.

N.S. Firm Bids For U.K. Market

An agency has been set up in the United Kingdom to promote the sale of work and sports clothes made by the Halifax firm of J. and M. Murphy, which has a branch office in Charlottetown.

Company president E.J. Murphy, who was among the Nova Scotia businessmen who recently returned from a \$750,000 sales promotion visit to Europe, said samples of the complete range of garments made by his firm are being sent to England to supplement examples already there.

"There is definitely a market for our type of product," said Mr. Murphy. "We are competing," he said, "with the existing Commonwealth preference, we are hopeful of breaking into this new field."

Mr. Murphy believes the Canadian system of retailing men's working clothes has a lot to offer the British working man. He said that the quality of material clothing is superior, certainly an improvement on the mass-produced clothing which is still worn by many men in Britain.

"The company is also hoping to find orders through its new agency for sports pants and jeans. The English team sport is the object of its export drive."

Lamps Hastily Resurrected
