## Prices Are Satisfactory In Cattle Sale At Grounds

More than 100 head of cattle sold yesterday afternoon at barn N. 10 at the Provincial Exhibition grounds. Prices were satisfactory to the many farmers who entered the animals for sale. There were 102 animals sold in all.

A small beef-cross calf brought \$35 for the first sale of the afternoon. This one was purchased by Cecil Godfrey, New Wiltshire. The calves ran from a week to 10 days old for the most part and they sold at \$25 to \$35 each.

Plain dairy type feeders sold for 14 to 17 1/2 cents per pound. Good dairy type feeders sold for \$16 to \$18.75 per hundred-weight.

Beef type feeders sold for \$15.50 to \$22.00 per hundred pounds.

**PRETTY PLAIN**  
The feeders ran from 500 pounds to 750, it was stated by a sale spokesman. There were some pretty plain cattle among the ones listed above, a department of agriculture spokesman added.

Heavy vealer calves sold for 21 to 25 cents a pound. Grassers brought 12 to 14 cents.

Medium cows sold at \$16 to \$17.25 per hundred pounds. Canner cattle sold at \$12 to \$15.50.

Plain and commercial steers sold at \$20.75 to \$21.25 per hundredweight. Yearling bulls sold at \$17 to \$18.50 and heavy bulls brought \$20.25.

It was the first really big sale of the series and the cattle barn was filled with interested onlookers, many of whom came to see and hear what was being done.

The weekly sales are under the management of George Lacey, Truro, Auctioneer in Frank Bertclair, also of Truro. Mr. Lacey is a former Truro P.E.I. man.

**HEATED ARGUMENT**  
A heated argument arose in council last night when Councilor Louis Johnson voiced objection to a move by the council's police committee to have an additional 300 parking meters installed in the city.

Councilor Johnson told council that he had understood that only 50 new meters were to be installed this year and that he was disturbed to find that this figure now jumped to 300. He said that residents of Charlottetown who were already paying taxes were being forced to park

blocks and blocks away from their places of employment to escape paying considerable additional monies. The Councilor added that he was perfectly in agreement with meters in the uptown business area where parking should be made available for shoppers and so on; but that he objected to metered parking in areas far removed from the business district.

Councilor Johnson and his sole supporters in the argument, Councilor Arthur Wright faced a healthy opposition led by Police Committee Chairman, Art Gormley, who argued that by metering areas close to the business district they eliminated "all-day" parkers from the area and opened up more parking space for people shopping and doing business in the uptown area.

Councilor Frank Zakem commenting on the matter said that too much had been said about parking meters as a means of collecting additional revenue for the city. He said that the first job done by parking meters was to solve a problem that was facing the city — that of uptown parking.

Councilor Johnson and Councilor Gormley crossed swords again last night over a resolution that two junior constables of the Charlottetown Police Force, Roy Biggar and Robert Maye be employed with the Force until December 31, 1966.

Councilor Johnson noted that these two men had been originally hired for the summer months and questioned Councilor Gormley as to why this employment period had been extended.

Councilor Gormley informed Council that under the new union agreement four additional members would have to be taken on before the first of the year to keep the force up to the required complement and enable working hours to be cut back to 40. He said that these men had proved very satisfactory and it was the recommendation of the police committee that they be kept on staff until December, when the question of whether they could be two of the four additional men could be considered.

Police Chief Sterns Webster commenting on the discussion noted that in his opinion a force

of 28 men was required to give the citizens of Charlottetown proper protection.

Charles Moffatt, secretary — manager of the Charlottetown Board of Trade in his monthly report to council told them of the progress that had been made by the Maritime Transportation Commission regarding the construction of the proposed corridor road from the Maritimes through Maine to Quebec and Ontario.

Mr. Moffatt also outlined the progress being made with the Atlantic Development Board regarding a proposed survey to be conducted in the Charlottetown area relative to establishing an industrial park. Mr. Moffatt said that an official announcement

regarding the proposed survey was expected shortly.

**PROPOSAL**  
Another matter in the Board of Trade report dealt with a brief that the Charlottetown Board of Trade is to present to the Board of Broadcast Governors on October 25 concerning the re-allocation of the now vacant channel 8 to Amherst, N.S. an area where the most complete coverage to P.E.I. would be available from.

The city council passed a resolution endorsing the Board of Trade's proposals concerning this channel reading "whereas various sections of P.E.I., including Charlottetown are presently provided with more limited TV service than other sections of the Maritimes. Be it therefore resolved that City Council go on record as requesting the BBG to give every favorable consideration to re-allocating Channel 8 so as to give the best and broadest coverage to the maximum number of residents of P.E.I."

Mayor Walter Cox, who chaired last night's meeting, told members of council that through the efforts of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities, CNR property, which was formerly tax-exempt, could now be taxed or pay a grant in lieu of taxes.

Mayor Cox noted that this would mean an approximately \$15,000 in additional revenue to Charlottetown and added that this was just one of a number of ways in which the CFMM was serving its members.

Mayor Cox also noted that Governor General Georges P. Vanier and Mrs. Vanier would be visiting this province on October 31, Nov. 1, 2, 3 and 4. He said that while the scheduled still had not received final approval, it was expected that the Vaniers would spend November 2 in Charlottetown, opening the new government office building in the morning, as guests of the City of Charlottetown at a noon reception and luncheon and meeting the school children in the afternoon.

## Local YMCA Directors Make Request To Council

Members of the Board of Directors of the Charlottetown YMCA appeared before the Charlottetown City Council last night with the request that council give consideration to eliminating the city taxes on the bowling alley and canteen facilities in the "Y", which under the present city tax structure system are termed as being commercial ventures.

The brief was presented to the council by Ian Rankin, chairman of the Board of Directors of the "Y". Other members attending included Ralph Manning, F. Walter Hyndman, John Evans, general secretary of the "Y", and Frederic Large, QC, counsel for the board. The presentation was made at the regular October meeting of the council.

In the brief Mr. Rankin pointed out that in the original incorporation act granted the YMCA freedom was guaranteed from taxation and he further pointed out that the directors of the YMCA were not notified in 1965 when the city applied to the provincial legislature for a change in the status of the organization that would permit taxation in certain areas.

Mr. Rankin went on to explain to members of council that the revenue from these enterprises averaged only slightly over \$2,000 per year, all of which was turned back against the operating costs of the YMCA and pointed out that if required taxes were paid they would absorb all of this \$2000 thus leaving the YMCA's annual operating budget some \$2000 short. Mr. Rankin added that when the assessment was made the "Y" board presented a provision for this amount to the United Fund in their annual budget submission and had the item rejected. He also pointed out that if membership rates and so on were raised by a sufficient amount to come up with this money, the cost of memberships would then be such as to prevent many, many youngsters from joining the "Y".

Mayor Cox commenting on the matter told those attending that the matter would be handed over to the council's finance committee for study and would come up for discussion at a regular meeting of the council when the finance committee's decision on the matter had been made.

Members of the council asked several questions of YMCA board members pertaining to the operation of the bowling alley and canteen.

dragged or carried to the bush where it was found by an RCMP search party.

**TERMED USELESS**  
Dr. F. A. Jaffe of Toronto, who is a regional pathologist for the provincial police, said a test of stomach contents "is almost a useless method" in determining when a person died.

He also referred to lack of decomposition of the body as a reason for placing the girl's death hours later than the Crown doctors.

Donald Scott, Crown prosecutor for Welland County who is conducting the case for the Crown, drew agreement from Dr. Charles Petty of Baltimore, when he said food normally leaves the human stomach about two hours after a meal. Dr. Petty is assistant medical examiner for Maryland.

But Dr. Petty said circumstances were not normal in the death of Lynne Harper.

Emotions were in digestion and "we don't know how long this girl lived in fear."

Mr. Scott said Dr. Petty was referring to conjecture not backed up by evidence.

Both Dr. Jaffe and Dr. Petty

also agreed when Mr. Scott said that Dr. Peniston, who saw the body, was in a better position than they were in giving opinions based on court testimony and police pictures taken of the body.

**ARTHUR L. RENNIE DIES IN HOSPITAL**

ALBERTON — Arthur L. Rennie, a well known Prince County businessman, died in the West-erna Hospital Tuesday morning following a long illness. He was eighty-four years of age and was the last surviving member of the family of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Rennie. He was a lifelong resident of Elmdale where, until his retirement, he owned and operated a general store.

Since 1905 he has been a member of Zetland Lodge AF and AM. In 1942 he was honored with a life membership in the lodge and in 1955 was presented with a fifty year jewel.

He had a great interest in the work of the British and foreign bible society and for many years assumed responsibility for the annual canvass for funds in his home community.

Mr. Rennie was married first to Lulu Wells and after her death to Ida Wells, who also predeceased him. A little daughter of his first marriage died in 1914 at the age of five years. He is survived by his wife, the for-

mer Mary Harris, and a daughter, Betty Rennie.

The funeral will be at Elm-dale United Church on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock.
