THE GOVERNMENT CONDEMNED

Resolutions Against the Farquharson License Law.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by Ref. ge Division, St. T. Fredericton, at its weekly meeting a few evenings ago:

"Whereas the Government of P. E. Island has enacted a License Law by virtue of which the sale of intoxicating liquors becomes a legal business in the city of Charlottetown in consideration of the payment of the sum of two hundred dollars per annum;

And whereas, such legislation revives the old license system and accrues to the Government a large amount of revenue;

And whereas, we believe such a measure to be entirely contrary to the true temperance sentiment of the Province and feel confident will do absolutely nothing for the suppressing of the liquor traffic;

Therefore resolved that we, members of Refuge Division, in weekly session do hereby express most emphatically, our disapproval of the action of the Government in deriving revenue from the sale of intoxicating liquors."
