Rural Building Permit Values Setting Record

The greatest amount of rural construction in the history of the province is underway this year (Clayton Smith, director of town planning, said yesterday).

Since April 1 this year, the value of building permits issued has soared to \$3,793,500. For the entire 12 months, ending March 31 this year, the value of such permits was \$4,621,161.

SCHOOLS BOOST TOTAL

The biggest single cause of the tremendous increase was the building of the Monastery of the Precious Blood just outside the city. Other im-

portant factors in the boom were the several new schools being built in the province.

This construction does not necessarily take into account all parts of Prince Edward Island, since it covers only that portion of the province which comes within Town Planning regulations. This includes the immediate area of the Trans-Canada Highway as well as incorporated villages.

It does not take into consideration building in the rural areas of the province, or the potential of the land there.

Lunenburg Plant To Get Rail Spur

MONCTON (CP) — The CNR announced Thursday it has authorized Modern Construction of Moncton the contract for construction of two and a half miles of subgrade which will carry a rail spur to the site of Lunenburg Sea Products planned \$8,000,000 plant at Lunenburg.

The spur will provide the fish plant with rail transportation and CNR officials say the line would open up the "back harbor" area and improve the industrial potential of the land there.

The contract awarded calls for clearing, grading, ditching, fencing, construction of pipe culverts and all other work needed for the spur subgrade.

The line will enable the railway to carry out the plant's produce, and carry in supplies needed to keep it operating.

Mr. Albert said the line will handle about 80,000 pounds of fish annually, and issue a yearly payroll of \$4,000,000.

Corner Brook City Council Gets Warning

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Municipal Affairs Minister B. J. Abbott said today he is sending Mayor Allison Bugden of Corner Brook of his department's warning to discontinue the Corner Brook city council and appoint an administrator to oversee the affairs of the city.

Mr. Abbott said the Municipal Affairs Act gives him the power to discontinue councils which he feels are not being operated in the best interests of the people.

The minister commented on a dispute in a volving Corner Brook's city manager and works superintendent which has kept council members in disagreement since early spring.

The argument was developed last week when the city manager, Owen Elliott for what he called "insubordination" arising out of a request that Elliott visit Galsworthy's office to explain alleged irregularities in his department.

Council has split over a city bylaw which forbids the mayor and councillors to interfere in the hiring and firing of town employees.

In the latest developments Galsworthy has taken court action against the council for interference.

Mr. Abbott said that he has received letters from people and organizations at Corner Brook concerned over the future of the town and requesting official action. He said he hoped it could be settled without government intervention.

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New CBC Hookup To Operate Oct. 1

OTTAWA (CP) — The CBC Radio Network, a new nationwide English-Language hookup consolidating the CBC's Dominion and Trans-Canada radio networks, will begin operating Oct. 1, CBC president Alphonse Ouimet said Thursday.

Details of the new network were released earlier.

In a statement Mr. Ouimet said the network will consist of 70 stations—24 CBC-owned and 55 privately owned—which together will make available a guaranteed weekly minimum of 26 hours and seven minutes of national radio service to an expected 90 per cent of Canada's English-speaking population.

Car Theft Brings 4-Mos. Sentence

SUMMERSIDE — Robert Joseph DesRoches of Seven Mile Bay, formerly of Tignish was sentenced to four months in the Prince County jail yesterday by Magistrate Richard S. Hinton QC after being convicted Wednesday on a charge of joy-riding.

DesRoches was found guilty of taking a 1959 Ford Fairlane from its parking spot near the Legion home on Sept. 18. The vehicle which was owned by Albert Hamull of Middleton, was eventually ditched at Traveller's Rest after a chase by the RCMP at speeds of up to 100 miles an hour.

DesRoches' record revealed by police officer S.D.A. Wamsamster yesterday showed several convictions in 1953 which included obstruction, creating a disturbance, impaired driving and theft. DesRoches was only 15 years old at that time.

The police chief stated, before sentence was a passing that stealing cars is becoming much more common adding that in this case "it's about the same as stealing \$300 from a man."

Joseph Arthur Melanson, Summerside, Albert S. Arsenault, Albert's Village and Thomas Perry Jr., Summerside, were each fined \$10 and costs on charges of speeding.

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Ship-Building Subsidies Reach \$169 Million

COLLINGWOOD, Ont. (CP) — Transport Minister Leon Balcer said Thursday the federal government has given or pledged ship-building subsidies valued at \$169,000,000.

Speaking at a luncheon following launching of the lake freighter Black Bay at Collingwood Shipyards, Mr. Balcer said the new subsidized program now under way in Canada means work for about 14,000 Canadians for 18 months.

The minister made the speech after Mrs. Balcer christened the new 735-foot bulk carrier of Canada Steamship Lines, the largest broadside launching in the history of the shipyard here.

Mr. Balcer said the government subsidy program, launched 18 months ago, has brought benefits to Canadian shipyards, the lake shipping industry, small cargo carriers and commercial fishermen.

GIVES \$15,500,000

So far the government has committed \$15,500,000 for subsidies on ships built in Canada for operation under the Canadian flag.

The minister said that in addition to the \$169,000,000 worth of ship construction for which federal aid has been assured applications for subsidies covering another \$23,000,000 worth of ships are under study.

He said the subsidy has helped the Canadian lake fleet hold about 50 per cent of the St. Lawrence seaway traffic. This industry, he added, includes 7,500 officers and seamen, an annual payroll of \$5,000,000, and earnings of \$120,000,000 a year.

To duplicate this service with foreign shipping would mean an outlay of \$250,000,000 in "invisible exports."

COASTAL VESSEL IS TOTAL LOSS

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — The 120-ton coastal vessel Merilyn Clair, which ran aground Monday at Port on Chouinot on the west coast of Newfoundland, was reported by insurance underwriters to be a total loss.

The vessel, owned by Buffalo Fisheries Limited of Grand Bank, is on its beam ends with a section of the hull gone.

Seven crew members of the Merilyn Clair escaped unhurt when the vessel ran ashore. The Merilyn Clair is a former Lunenburg, N.S., fishing vessel which has been used recently for carrying freight between Nova Scotia and Newfoundland.
