

Another New Light.

THROW AWAY YOUR OLD KEROSENE BURNERS.

Mr. H. Clay Scott, of Minneapolis, has gotten hold of a good thing, which he is going to make money of while the general public, who will be called on to assist him to his wealth, won't begrudge him a cent of it when they come to realize the value of his invention. Mr. Scott used to be a heavy dealer in Chicago, in lamps, crockery, etc., and during the time conceived the idea of an improvement in the common kerosene burner. His plan was the substitution of a porous wick of some hard substance in place of the common cotton one, by means of which the continual trimming which is necessary might be done away with. After a long series of experiments he found his substance at last, the base of which was Asbestos, which, prepared in a way known only to himself, could be moulded into shape and burned, and, being porous, would readily draw the oil through it by capillary attraction. Next he prepared an ingenious plan by which it could be inserted in the tube and joined to a permanent wick below, and the light graduated at pleasure. Then he had it! No more trimming of lamps, but a clear, steady, even flame which would burn evening after evening and month after month without needing any attention whatever. The patent took Chicago by storm, and thousands were sold in a few weeks. Unfortunately, at this time, he was obliged to suspend the manufacture of the patent, owing to the failure of Eastern parties with whom he had contracts for the Asbestos tips, and it has only been recently that he has been at liberty to place it once more on sale. In the meantime he has removed to Minneapolis, from which point he will begin an active campaign.

DESCRIPTION OF THE BURNER.

A Pioneer Press reporter called on Mr. Scott and obtained a full description of this important invention. The Asbestos is formed into a small tip, which is inserted into the burner tube 3-16 of an inch, connecting with an under stationary wick, which conducts the oil to the tip. The tips, being very porous, are a great absorbent of oil, which ignites readily, generating pure gas, producing a very large, white and steady flame, which by actual photometric test is 27 1/2 per cent. stronger light than any cotton wick burner will give for size flame.

Unlike a cotton wick burner, a full-sized flame is produced until the last drop of oil is consumed. The burner is constructed upon an entirely new principle, owing to the necessity of a stationary wick. The under wick, being out of the reach of the flame, will last for many years as a conductor of oil. To regulate or extinguish the flame, we use an outside tube or sleeve, which is raised or lowered by means of a ratchet in the ordinary way.

For a low night light it is perfection, as no odor arises from a burning wick.

The question invariably raised is, how long will a tip last? In answer would say they vary from six to twelve months. When tips begin to burn poorly it is better to remove them and replace them with a new tip, as it takes but a moment, and the expense of a tip is but trifling. Old tips may be sometimes improved by carefully scraping off the sediment which has accumulated from the impurities of the oil, without removing the tip. The burner fits all lamps, and is the only one made that will accommodate two kinds of chimneys known as the sun and the sun hinge chimneys. The flat sun hinge chimney, on any burner, however, always produce a larger and steadier light, and breaks less frequently, and we recommend by all means its use, or the flat sun chimney, instead of the round sun chimney. It is absolutely impossible to explode a lamp while using the Asbestos burner, as the tube being tightly fitted with Asbestos wick there is no space through which the flame can communicate with the oil, as in the case with loose cotton wicks.

To a Cold-Footed Lady.

Madam, allow me to prescribe for you. I have had a long experience in the management of delicate women, and believe I can give you some important advice. For the present I prescribe only for your feet.

1st. Procure a quantity of woolen stockings—not such as you buy at the stores under the name of lambs' wool, that you can read a news paper through—the kind that your Aunt Jerusha in the country knits for you, that will keep your feet dry and warm in spite of wind and weather.

2d. If you want to be thorough, change them every morning, hanging the fresh ones by the fire during the night.

3d. Procure thick calf-skin boots, double uppers and treble soles, and wear them from the first of October till the first of May. Make frequent application of some good oil blacking.

4. Avoid rubbers altogether, except a pair of large rubber boots, which may be worn for a little time through snow-drifts or a flood of water.

5th. Hold the bottoms of your feet in cold water a quarter of an inch deep, just before going to bed, two or three minutes, and then rub them hard with rough towels and your naked hand.

6th. Now, madam, go out freely in all weathers, and, believe me, not only will

your feet enjoy a good circulation, but as a consequence of the good circulation in the lower extremities, your head will be relieved of all its fullness, and your heart of its palpitations. Your complexion will be greatly improved, and your health made better in every respect.—Dio Lewis' Monthly.

McDermott, the Informer is said to be in Canada.

The London General News says:—We learn that James McDermott, alias the Chevalier McDermott, who was arrested at Liverpool in connection with the recent Fenian plot and subsequently released, has returned to Canada. It will be recollected that McDermott was suspected of being a spy and was watched in this country and was shot at in New York and Canada by Fenians, on the ground that he had turned informer. On his liberation at Liverpool, although, it is said, he was closely dogged, he managed to elude his quondam friends and retired for a time to a quiet retreat that had been secured for him about two months ago. McDermott, in company with eight detectives, took passage upon the National Line steamer Canada, for New York. McDermott went to Cape Breton and thence to Quebec or Montreal, but the Detectives remained in New York to watch suspected characters. It is understood that there is now an English detective in New York, near the City Hall, in one of the large insurance buildings, and that in connection therewith a system of surveillance over the now extreme section of the Irish-American Revolutionary party has been organized.
