Caribbean Boat Loads Cod, Food

GEORGETOWN — The Icelandic motor vessel, Langjokull, under command of Captain Thor Tordarson, arrived here Wednesday, and on Thursday commenced taking on board a cargo of 600 tons of frozen mink food and 25 tons of salted cod from the Gulf Garden Foods Limited plant for Norway.

LABOR SHORTAGE
Some difficulty is being experienced in securing sufficient laborers to load the cargo, but it is anticipated that some additional 200 tons of produce will be loaded here by Langley Fruit Packers Limited of Montserrat and Seabrook Farms Frozen Foods Limited of New Ann, and will include frozen peas, frozen vegetables and french fried potatoes.

The ship sailed from the Caribbean area and called at Tampa, Florida; Halifax, N.S., en route to Georgetown. At Tampa, she loaded canned orange juice and at Halifax took on frozen lobsters and fillets.

DEPARTURE
The ship is expected to complete loading here on Saturday and sail for Breveik in Norway where a portion of her cargo will be discharged. She will then sail to Denmark and England.

The Langjokull is of modern design having been built in Denmark in 1959 and is refrigerated throughout. She is 290 feet long and has a net registered tonnage of 1,096 tons. She carries a crew of 23 and is capable of a speed of 13 knots.

Five Years Given Accused

SUMMERSIDE — A term of five years was handed down to Sterling Joseph Bernard of Lennox Island who will serve the sentence in Dorchester Penitentiary.

The accused, who appeared before Mr. Justice R.R. Bell here yesterday, was convicted in Supreme Court last week of causing bodily harm with intent to wound. The charge arose from the September 26 stabbing death of Roger Frank LaBobe, Lennox Island.

In addressing the accused, Mr. Justice Bell reminded him that he was convicted of a very serious offence which resulted in the death of a fellow man. "You were lucky you have not been convicted of manslaughter. This case is far too serious for me to give any thought to giving you a suspended sentence or a jail term. By being sentenced to penitentiary you will have an opportunity to learn a trade and on your release you will be able to lead a better life than you had here before."

Mr. Justice Bell stated that he had taken into account in considering sentence the nine months the accused had spent in jail while awaiting trial.

Crown prosecutor George R. McMahon had asked for the maximum penalty of 14 years for the offence. Defence counsel was J. Melville Campbell.
