Canadian Press Elects Officers

TORONTO (CP)—D. B. Rogers, editor of the Regina Leader-Post, Wednesday was elected president of The Canadian Press, Canada's co-operative news service. He succeeds R. J. Rankin of the Halifax Chronicle-Herald and Mail-Star, president of the last two years. Roy Thomson of the Thomson newspapers was re-elected honorary president. Charles H. Peters of the Montreal Gazette was elected first vice-president and John E. Mott of the Kitchener-Waterloo Record second vice-president. MEMBER SINCE 1940 Mr. Rogers succeeds to the CP presidency after terms as first and second vice-president. He has been a member of CP since 1940. A native of Amherst, N.S., he broke into newspaper work with The News there in 1921 after service with the signals section, Royal Canadian Engineers, in the First World War.

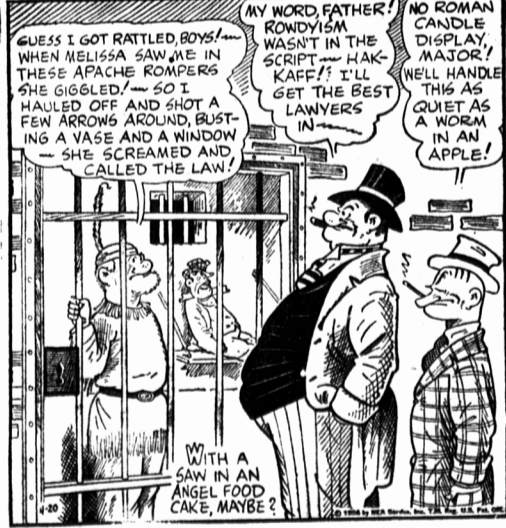

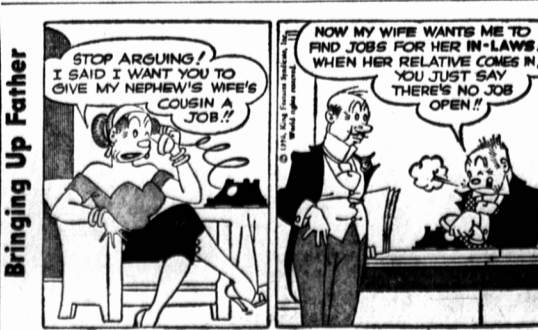

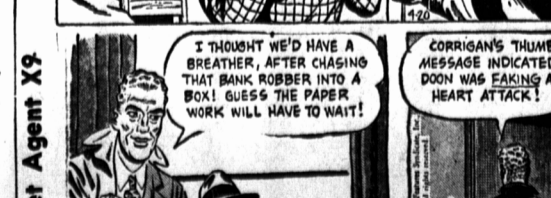
