# Revolt In Congo Is Said Queued

BANKWANG, The Congo (AP) — Central government troops have beaten down a separatist revolt by the Mpuke tribe, the "rat people" of South Kasai, but violence remains a constant threat in this diamond-rich province.

The rebellion led in its wake a string of burned villages, roadside graves, ruined crops and stories of rebel cannibalism.
