**TURKEY COOKS**

For a tender juicy (not dry) turkey, cook in a slow oven, (repeat slow). First cover with a greased white cotton or cheesecloth, a piece large enough so that edges are in the bottom of roasting pan. This cloth will act as a wick and draw flavourful juices back over the turkey.

Twenty minutes before turkey is done remove cloth, to brown skin. Do not at any time pierce the skin. Baste turkey during cooking with your favorite barbecue sauce.

Use fresh killed turkeys if available. Frozen turkeys are better than none, but you pay a high price for water absorbed during the chilling before freezing. Most stores offer fresh local grown milked turkeys.

If you are sold on a frozen turkey, buy the large size. The price is much better and if it is too large have your butcher split it and keep half in your freezer until you again desire turkey for dinner. Cook a half turkey the same as a whole turkey, placing the desired stuffing in the body cavity and a greased brown paper against the open side. Place paper down in pan.

**Wheat Exports Climb Slightly**

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's wheat exports in the first three months of the current crop year rose slightly to 75,500,000 bushels from 73,000,000 a year ago.

United States shipments in the same August-October period increased to 108,900,000 bushels from 100,700,000 while those of Argentina slipped to 2,400,000 from 21,800,000 and Australia to 16,200,000 from 24,900,000, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday.

Thus, while Canada had 33 per cent of the world wheat market, the same as a year ago, the United States, with huge crops on her banks, boosted her share to 50 per cent from 46.

This was mostly at the expense of Australia, whose share dropped to seven per cent from 11. Argentina's share remained at 10 per cent, unchanged from last year.

While agriculture as an industry it is not covered by Unemployment Insurance generally, there are some exceptions to this rule. Section 58 of the regulations reads as follows, "A person's employment shall be insurable although otherwise excepted as being in agriculture, if it is in connection with any of the following undertakings: (a) Breeding or raising poultry, (b) Chick hatching,

(c) Preparation and marketing of eggs, (d) Egg grading, or (e) breeding or raising of horses, saddle horses or light business horses. Unless the undertaking is carried on as an incident of farming operations."

Hog prices during the month of October in the last five years have varied roughly \$5 per head with a low of \$24.42 per hundred in 1955 to a high of \$30.50 in 1957. The 1957 price being \$28.10, that of 1958 being \$26.65.

Weekly marketing for all grades in that month increased to over a 107 thousand in 1958 over 134 thousand in 1957.

While there has been no snow storms, December has been less produced a continuous colder than average weather. Generally the travelling has been good, a factor which is of greater importance in this than does the severity of the weather. Whatever may be said in way of criticism of the month it has certainly been a month sparing the farmer and his land a great deal of exposure that is part of travelling in the winter era of horse and sleigh.

**One In Seven Treated In Hospitals**

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's hospitals lost ground during the effort to provide accommodation for the country's growing population. But in the year general hospitals treated one out of every seven Canadians.

These facts were reported Thursday in a report on hospital care by the bureau of statistics.

Capacity of all types of hospitals rose to 175,949 from 175,000 during the year. But population growth rose more rapidly than year's end there were 88 Canadians for every hospital bed compared with 93 at the start of the year.

Public general hospital beds totalled 2,294,514 adults and children for treatment in 1957 and 2,294,514 in 1958. They had an average 9.8 days of treatment. The year before 192,799 persons went to hospital, staying an average 10 days.

Public mental hospitals reported reduced capacity in 1958. Capacity of mental hospitals declined to 54,367 from 55,000 in 1957. From 1957 to 1958, tuberculosis sanatoria and other specialized hospitals reported a decline from 13,381 and general sanatoria from 12,552 to 12,794.
