Aunt Cora's Tomato Bisque: Scald 1 qt. milk with 1 slice onion. Simmer 2 c. canned tomato 10 min. with 2 tsp sugar.

Meantime, melt 2 tbsp. butter, stir in 3 tbsp. flour, gradually stir in milk.

Boil up once and keep hot. Now rub tomato through food mill or fine sieve. Keep hot.

When ready to serve, add to it 1/4 tsp. baking soda.

Stir tomato into milk. Add 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper.

Steve immediately.

Grandma's Potato Salad: Combine 1 qt. small-diced hot, boiled, peeled new potatoes with 3 tbsp. cider vinegar, 1 tsp. water, 1/4 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Chill.

Add 1/2 c. chopped young onions, 1/2 c. thin-sliced small red radishes, 1 tsp. minced parsley and 2 sliced hard-cooked eggs. Moisten with 1/2 c. well-seasoned mayonnaise and 1/4 c. dairy sour cream.

covered in cold beef spread with mayonnaise. Garnish with additional hard-cooked egg, sliced and thin-sliced radishes.

Edge with lettuce.

TEA ON THE ROCKS

Tea on the Rocks is modern Canada's new name for iced tea. It is made this way! Pour a half pint of fresh bubbly water over six teaspoons (or four tea-bags) of tea. Brew for at least five minutes, stir and pour into a 1-quart container and fill the container

to the top with fresh, cold water. To prevent clouding don't refrigerate. If clouding does occur, just add a little hot water.

Attach a wedge of lemon to the rim of each glass—perhaps add a gay sprig of mint—and let everyone add sugar to taste!
