### Attempted Stick-Up Ends In 3-Year Term

Yesterday Magistrate A. J. Haslam sentenced Roy Fall to three years in Dorchester Penitentiary.

Ten days before, on the evening of Dec. 13 Fall entered the office of the Sidney T. Green Co. and stuck a gun in the back of Mel MacFadyen and told him to give him the cash-box.

It was a toy gun.

Sidney E. Green, a gun collector, was in the office when Fall entered. He recognized the gun as an imitation, grabbed Fall and held him until the police arrived.

The accused entered a plea of guilty last week and was remanded to yesterday for sentencing.

Crown prosecutor Alan K. Seales told the court society was entitled to protection from criminals and any sentence passed should be great enough to not only grant that protection but also to deter others from attempting the same act. He pointed out it could have had serious repercussions if the intended victim had been an older man who might have taken a heart attack as a result of seeing the supposed gun pointed at him.

The Magistrate agreed and said when a gun was used under such circumstances the holder was in effect saying "your money or your life". He then passed sentence.

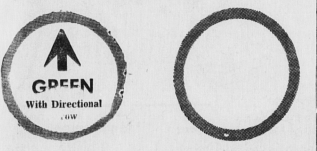

## FOLLOW THE ARROW!

When the traffic light is GREEN with an ARROW showing all traffic may move only in the direction shown by the pointing arrow.

When the GREEN circle light is showing, turns — right or left — may be made.

**PLEASE NOTE:** Only one of the above lights will be showing at any one time. If the arrow light is on you may drive only in the direction pointed by the arrow. When the green circle light is on you may proceed straight ahead or make a turn in either direction.
