TICKETS FOR PINAROF.—At 10 o'clock this morning the sale commenced. In one hour four hundred seats had been taken. There are still some good ones left. You would do well to secure yours immediately. Some of the boxes are not sold yet. They are selling for two dollars apiece, with seats for four. HE GOT DAGES.—A man named Williams, a ship carpenter, of Halifax, lost a leg by the falling of a boom while at work on the schooner Topaz, two years ago, and sued the owners, Messrs. Bartling, of Liverpool, N. S., for \$5,000 damages. The case has long been before the courts. The jury on Wednesday, on a second trial, awarded Williams \$2,500. POLICE COURT.—This forenoon the Scott Act summons against Angus Darrach was dismissed. One drunk was fined \$2 or 10 days, and a citizen charged with violating a sanitary law was fined \$1 or five days. The charge of liquor stealing preferred against Frank McAtee and Donald McPherson was further adjourned for one week. Mr. Stewart O. C. is in court. McPherson, Mr. H. Palmer is watching the case. FIVE CATTLE.—Mr. W. Black had three of his Hereford herd down town today and weighed. Lady Wilton tipped the beam at 1800 pounds and is probably the heaviest cow in the Maritime Provinces. Barabara, 2d, weighed 1310 pounds, and the Sutton, the one year and ten months bull, weighed 1350. The cattle were admired greatly by those who saw them.—Amherst Press. DIDN'T AGREE WITH HIM.—A city dentist, who was administering gas to a Salisbury man yesterday, had a rather narrow escape from receiving injury at the hands of the patient. After a quantity of gas had been administered the man jumped from the chair and grasped the inhaler, with which he attempted to strike the doctor. As this instrument was not inclined to be disconnected from the tubes, etc., he seized a chair, but by this time the D. D. S. had escaped from the room and held the door till his patient had quieted down.—Moncton Times. THE EXAMER NOW.—A Boston paper says: "Provincials arriving by steamer from Nova Scotia, Cape Breton and P. E. Island are not experiencing the annoyances this spring which were complained of last season. The immigration officials were new at their work then and had not learned that the class of people arriving from the Maritime Provinces were in no way to be compared with those coming from Europe, and that the alien law was in all probability not meant to apply to them at all. Acting on this assumption, the officials are now co-operating with the steamship lines to make the passage of new arrivals as pleasant as possible, and the only persons who refuse to answer the necessary questions and undertake to check Uncle Sam's representatives."

LATEST SUMMERSIDE NEWS.

Special Correspondence of The Examiner. OPENING OF NAVIGATION.—A few minutes after Capt. Walsh touched his match to the lamps last night a schooner of about 50 tons burden rounded the light. This is the first of the season. In 1892 the harbor was clear of ice on April 4th, steamer arrived on the 8th; in '93 the ice cleared on the 18th, steamer entered on the 20th; in '94 the ice broke on the 20th and steamer arrived on the 21st. The steamer Northumberland made her first appearance here this season at nine o'clock this morning. She left for Point du Chene about twenty minutes later, taking no freight. The schr. Azof, of Baie Verte, arrived here last night with the crew of the Candor. Captain Dann tried to run the tug to Bedouque to-day, but had to return on account of the ice. BASEBALL on the Ice.—Yesterday a number of impatient small boys were playing baseball on the strip of ice which still clings to the shore.
