This we would include in our "happiness collection" of the week: the silence and the serenity wide and deep, the peace which is, we fancy, akin to that which, as is written, "passeth understanding" - this same we note at weeks' ends. Surely the farmers, hoes put aside, "weeding suspended until the new week allows it, homing in the little truck toward dusk, were aware of this peace on their fields.

The familiar sights and sounds of the season so lovely - we would count those in the loved steps of the family, the chuckle and laughter of the children, and the obvious content of the farm-life: Lambkins and summer skies, Queen Anne's Lace, and the stream's happy song. Clovers in the pastures, roses by the lane. Friends at our door, strangers, who become friends, their names, faces, words, lingering in our thoughts. Day mornings and moonlight. Blue hazes and the magic of purpling shadows, touching the hill-tops. And the witchery of the green "cat's light". A work to do and a place to keep. So much there is to count in our "happiness collection" these times, so much that is good.

A something new, the white kitten brought to our door this morning, dropping it a moment to meow for admission. It was a tiny thing - a little shiny black kitten with a gold stripe on its nose. Her one and only, it would seem. "We'll keep it!" Peter beamed. We may not however keep the week. Nor our thoughts they wander off in the moonlight to places near and far. And a prayer comes to mind, one of James Whitcomb Riley's whose verses are mostly of country folks and country living. His "Prayer Perfect" it is: "Dear Lord! Kind Lord! Gracious Lord, I pray, Thou wilt look on all I love, Tenderly today! Weed their hearts of bitterness; Scatter every care Down a wake of angel-wings, Winnowing the air.

Bring out the sorrowing All release from pain, Let the lips of laughter Overflow again; And with all the needy O divide, I pray This vast treasure of content, That is mine today!"

W.I. District Convention Held In Stanhope-Covehead Hall

The annual district convention of the North Shore Queens No. 2 Women's Institute was held at Stanhope-Covehead Community Hall on June 23, with Stanhope being the entertaining institute. The hall was attractively decorated for the occasion with baskets of flowers and numerous interesting exhibits were on display.

After the singing of the Institute Ode, the president, Mrs. Alvin MacLauchlan, extended a warm welcome to the ladies and commented briefly on the theme "Health, Safety and Success" with emphasis on "Success".

After the secretary, Mrs. Harry Kielly, had read the minutes of the previous convention, Mrs. Harry Birt of Covehead Road WI read the combined report which indicated that all nine institutes had had a busy and successful year.

An interesting feature of the programme was a talk on plaids by Gail MacLauchlan, a 4H member from West Covehead. She described the origin of plaids and how they are designed. She also gave an apt description of the Scottish kilt. Towards the end of her talk she showed samples of the plaids of several different clans as well as our own Island tartan.

Mrs. Bertha Blanchard, brought greetings from the provincial executive and urged the institutes to enter some phase of the Tweedsmuir Competitions. She mentioned that she had attended the 4H National Club Week in Toronto and commented on the value of 4H clubs everywhere.

After a lively sing-song Mrs. Cecil Waits of Pleasant Grove WI introduced Mrs. Phillip Matheson, the guest speaker. She pointed out how great an honor it was to have Mrs. Matheson, president of FWIC at the convention. Mrs. Matheson gave a

brief outline of the history of FWIC and gave the names of the national presidents from the beginning of the organization in 1919 up to the present time. Commenting on the theme with emphasis on "Success", Mrs. Matheson mentioned the Adelaide Hoodless homestead in Ontario and told of the ambitions and wonderful work of Mrs. Hoodless. She stressed that in order to have a successful Institute group, each member must be willing to do her part.

As a climax to her interesting talk, Mrs. Matheson showed colored slides of her trip to the British Isles. These proved to be extremely interesting and informative and were much enjoyed by everyone present. Mrs. Matheson was thanked by Mrs. Mallett of York WI and presented with a small token of appreciation.

Nora MacDonald then brought greetings from the Institutes office. She also gave a talk on how a person may flatter her appearance by choosing the outfit or material that will best suit her particular figure type. 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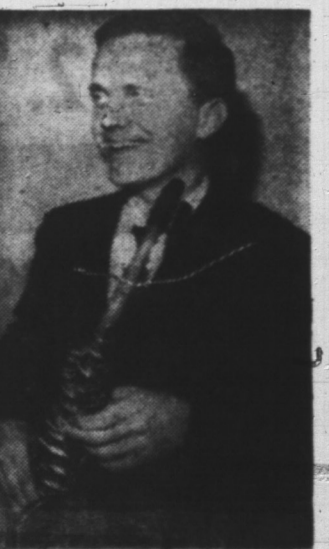
