

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

LONDON, Oct. 20.

The steamer "Harworth," from Montreal, has arrived at Queestown. All the cattle carried by her were washed overboard.

OTTAWA, Oct. 20.

Information has been received here that the Brazilian Parliament has voted the subsidy of \$50,000 to a line of steamers to trade between the ports of that country and Canada. It is also stated that the vessels will be placed on the line at once and will probably run during the winter months between Halifax, St. John, Pernambuco and Rio Janeiro.

The Pacific Railway Syndicate representatives had another interview with the Government to-day.

The Local Government of Ontario insists on its right to appoint Queen's Counsel in spite of the decision of the Judges of the Supreme Court and the action of the Dominion Government based thereon. Hon. Mr. Mowat has appealed the case to the Privy Council.

Hon. W. Macdougall was presented with a four hundred dollar silver service, yesterday, by a number of friends, on the occasion of his taking up his residence in the city. Mayor Mackintosh made the presentation.

MONTREAL, Oct. 20.

About one hundred and fifty locomotive engineers, from all parts of the continent, arrived in this city this morning to attend the Convention which opens to-day. The engineers were formally welcomed by members of Parliament and others.

EUROPEAN.

DUBLIN, Oct. 20.

The friends of the Land League advise them to offer £1,000 reward for the capture of the murderer of Mr. Hutchins' driver, as fresh murders are very inopportune for agitators at a time when prosecution is pending.

PARIS, Oct. 20.

The Bishop of Montpelier will be prosecuted for an abusive exercise of power in excommunicating the Prefect while the latter was executing decrees against the religious orders.

UNITED STATES.

HOLLAND, Mich., Oct. 30.

Along the beach for five miles are large quantities of freight, portions of the upper deck, etc., of the steamer "Alpena." The body of a lady came ashore on Tuesday, and was recognized as Mrs. Bradley, who, with her two daughters, were on the "Alpena."

SANDWICH, Mass., Oct. 20.

A mob of 300 Italian laborers on the Cape Cod Ship Canal, on learning that the money promised to be paid them did not arrive, gathered around the Central Hotel where the contractor, Mr. Dreisback, stops, demanding their money due. Not finding Dreisback, his son was taken by them, they proposing to lock him up in their shanty until the money was paid. Special policemen were sworn in and for a time the mob was quelled. Chief Wade with a detective force arrived, and a larger force is expected to-day from Boston.

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 20.

A collision on the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton R. R., at Jones Station this morning, injured fifteen passengers. The train was taking the siding when train No. 13 ran into the rear car, smashing the engine's upper works and filling the car with steam.

A fire broke out this morning in Ben-Hey's shoddy factory, cutting off all means of escape from the third floor, where women were at work. Ineffectual attempts were made to rescue them. The dead are: Rachael Daggett, 55 years old; Margaret Walsh, 60; Mary Tyner, 49; Catherine Jackson, 55; Mrs. E. Barret jumped from a window and escaped. No one is to blame for the loss of life. Damage to property, \$25,000. The building was not burned down.

SENATOR MUIRHEAD is about building a Mill on the site of the old one which was recently destroyed by fire. It will be the largest two-gang saw mill in New Brunswick. Its sawing capacity will be 120,000 feet per day of ten hours.

THE races at Summerside, yesterday, were unsuccessful. All the classes failed to fill, and were it not that the Charlottetown horses trotted for a small purse, our friends in Prince County would have had to return home without seeing a race at all. Mr. Westcott's "Zulu" was the winner of the purse.

VALUABLE CARGO.—The brigantine Parnell, owned by Michael Foley, Esq., Alberton, cleared for Barbadoes to-day with a cargo of produce and live stock valued at \$14,610. The schr. Emma also cleared to-day, for Newfoundland, with a good cargo, shipped by Messrs. Fowle & Darrach.

THE steamer "Edgar Stewart" sailed for Halifax on Thursday evening, with a cargo consisting of 325 bags potatoes, shipped by D. McCallum; 100 bbls potatoes, by Montague Stephens; 100 do do, by Henry Coombs; 175 bbls herring to Mr. Forsythe, and sundry other articles of produce. She had also several passengers.

FIVE cases at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon—three drunks, one vagrant, and a boy named Newton McDonald, who stole \$6 (in cents) from the confectionery wagon of Mr. John Livingston. The boy was remanded until Monday. As he is too young to know the gravity of his offence it is thought he will be dismissed. The money was recovered.

THE Brig. "Plymouth," Capt. L. J. Westaway, Jr., arrived at Georgetown on the 18th inst., 23 days from Greenock. This vessel left that port on the 19th August, went to Bay Verte, discharged ballast, and loaded a cargo of deals for Greenock, discharged cargo, took in ballast and returned to port, —making the round trip in two months.—Advertiser.

HON. MR. ANGERS has received from the Department of Railways and Canals, a letter informing him that the exploration, which he and Mr. Landry have solicited, along the North Shore of the St. Lawrence River, has been granted and will be commenced without delay. This scheme, when completed, will shorten the distance between Halifax and Ottawa some eighty miles.
