

Dodgers Blast Phillies; Cardinals Nip Braves

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Embitting by six straight losses to Philadelphia, Brooklyn Dodgers turned on the Phillies with fury Wednesday night, clubbing them 13-0 on 14 hits, including a three-run homer by Gil Hodges.

A parade of six Philadelphia pitchers was unable to halt the Brooklyn attack, which included a seven-run, five-hit eighth inning.

CHICAGO (AP)—Lefty Joe Nuxhall pitched Cincinnati to a second game victory over Chicago Cubs, 7-2, Wednesday after bonus pitcher Moe Drabowsky blanked the Redlegs 1-0 on two hits in the one hour and 37 minute opener.

The first game was the fastest in the National League since Sept. 14, 1952, when Boston Braves beat the Cubs in a 1-0 match at Boston.

Feeling Strong Talks Cannot Solve Riddle Of The Bomb

Despite fervent hopes, the feeling is strong that the London disarmament conference cannot solve—even temporarily—the riddle of "the bomb."

Russian moves make it likely that the nuclear weapons problem will move into a sphere of even wider debate, with greater confusion and propaganda.

Prime Minister Macmillan of Britain hit the nail smack on the head when in a letter to Soviet Premier Bulganin he challenged the Kremlin:

"You have but to say the word and real progress is assured."

The disarmament talks—including the United States, Russia, Britain, France and Canada—prove anew that man must learn to crawl before he can walk, with many falls and bruises, in his search for peace. There is no short cut.

SOME ACHIEVEMENTS

But the disarmament delegates, who have held 154 meetings since the conference began March 18, definitely achieved some things. Russia did at least bargain, despite Red outbursts scoring the motives and good intentions of the West.

Canada played its part by offering, along with the U.S., to throw open all its territory if Russia would do the same.

Compromises were made at the conference, even if agreement has not been reached. It wasn't quite a case of an irresistible force colliding with an immovable object.

The thunder of thermonuclear bomb tests on both sides provided an ironic background for the conference. Then last week Russia showed well-recognized Communist tactics with a propaganda double-play.

NEW YORK (AP)—Illness and injuries have combined to put a damper on the American and National League races for the batting titles. Three of the featured performers—Ted Williams, Mickey Mantle and Stan Musial—are out of the shell or in bad condition to play. The only one who is hale, hearty and raring to go is Willie (the indistinguishable) Mays.

An expected duel between Williams and Mantle in Yankee Stadium in the present series, was cancelled when doctors refused to allow the Boston slugger to accompany the Red Sox. Ted is bedded at home with a chest cold.

Williams, who was 39 last Friday, leads the 25-year-old Mantle by six points, 376 to 370. He has been out of the lineup—except for one appearance as a pinch hitter—since Saturday.

Williams should be ready to play Friday in Boston.

Mantle played Tuesday despite severe skin ailments. He has dropped six points while Ted has been on the sidelines. The New York Yankee clown missed a couple of games himself but went hitless in four times at bat against Baltimore's Billy O'Dell Tuesday.

Yankees Recall Eight Farmhands White Sox Try New Pitcher

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Yankees Wednesday recalled eight minor league farmhands, a majority of whom probably won't be able to report until next spring.

"All eight are on first division clubs," a spokesman said. "That means all will be participating in playoffs, which may not finish in time for them to report this season."

The players include pitcher Jim Coates, shortstop Tom Carroll and third baseman-outfielder Dick Sanders from Richmond.

Coates is 12-11 in the International League; Carroll is hitting .223 with 13 home runs and Sanders is batting .252.

White Sox Try New Pitcher

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago White Sox, in desperate pursuit of the first-place New York Yankees Wednesday bought a 21-year-old right handed pitcher, Barry Latman, from their Indianapolis club in the American Association.

Latman, strictly a Sox farm system product, currently has a 12-13 record with Indianapolis and has struck out 143 in 214 innings. He had a 14-14 mark with Memphis of the Southern Association in 1956 and had an 18-5 record for Waterloo of the Three-I League in 1955.

Latman will report to the White Sox immediately.

Rain Hampers Prairie Harvest

OTTAWA (CP)—Prairie crop harvesting has been hampered by frequent rain, the bureau of statistics said Wednesday in another of a series of telegraphic reports on Canadian crop conditions.

Progress in the last two weeks has been "only fair," the bureau said.

Manitoba has already reported some losses in yields and qualities. At least a week of dry weather is needed before combining can be resumed. More than half the crop is still to be threshed.

Saskatchewan hopes to resume operations this week. About 65 per cent of the crop has been cut; about 30 per cent threshed. Alberta has fared better. Good progress is reported in many parts of the province.

Maglie Would Have Quit

NEW YORK (AP)—Sal Maglie, whose clutch relief pitching Tuesday helped New York Yankees defeat Baltimore, said Wednesday he would have quit baseball had Chicago White Sox instead of the Yankees purchased him from Brooklyn.

"It would have been Cleveland all over again," said the 40-year-old righthander, "one club buying you just so that you won't be able to pitch for another."

Charles Comiskey, White Sox vice-president, announced last week he would outbid the Yankees for Maglie, presumably in order to block the American League transfer to the American League leaders. Comiskey changed his mind, however.

In July of 1955, Cleveland grabbed Maglie on waivers from the New York Giants to prevent the Yankees from getting him. He stayed with the Indians the balance of the year but was waived out of the American League the following May and sold to the Dodgers.

Maglie said he is delighted to be with the Yankees even if he is not eligible to pitch in the world series.
