Shop Aids Quebec Women Earn Money At Hand-Looms

QUEBEC (CP)—A shop in the heart of old Quebec is helping farm women earn money at their hand-operated looms.

The co-operative store, founded nine years ago, sells the woven and knitted goods produced by country wives during the winter months when farming chores are light.

Some 175 women from this district produce the colorful garments, draperies, bedspreads and table linens which attract the tourist's eye.

Florence Lanthier, a 25-year-old employee, said visitors to the shop "look on their handicrafts as answers to their prayers. The Americans, particularly, are impressed with our woollens."

40,000 Attend

"He was a man who gave unstintingly of his time and energy" in making the causeway "one of the great engineering undertakings of the country," said Trade Minister C. D. Howe.

Mr. Howe severed a Nova Scotia tartan ribbon with a two-edged broadsword, a ceremony witnessed by a supporter of Scotland's Bonnie Prince Charlie at the Battle of Culloden in 1746, to open formally the causeway.

President Donald Gordon of the Canadian National Railways said: "The voice we miss is that eloquent voice of Angus L. Macdonald. Here is the moment that properly belongs to him."

ROAD OF HAPPINESS
Mrs. MacLeod, dressed simply in a charcoal grey suit and wearing a stole of the blue Nova Scotia Tartan, asked that "the Road to the Isles" be ever a happy highway.

"This Road to the Isles" was a man's hope and dream for many years," she said. "He saw his dream beginning to take shape but it was the engineers who made this dream a reality."

"May it carry travellers in peace, in contentment and friendship."

Mrs. Macdonald killed Lieutenant-Governor Alistair Fraser of Nova Scotia, his wife and Mr. Gordon carried crook-shaped Scots cromaks as they led the dignitaries across the causeway.

The place Angus L. hoped he would some day take at the head of the procession was empty as 25 lines of marching four abreast sang across the dream of a half-century.

Scattered Cap. Por upine, which yielded 10,000,000 tons of granite to block the strait that reaches a depth of 200 feet, formed a grey backdrop to the colorful tartans of the Macdonald, MacPherson, MacLeod and MacNeill.

Special trains from Sydney and Halifax carried almost 2,000 picnickers to the site and at least 1,000 more were turned away.

Construction of the causeway began three years ago. It was opened to vehicular, train and pedestrian traffic several weeks ago after fire destroyed a strait ferry and accident disabled a second.

The Strait of Canso, which forms a link between the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the North Atlantic, had always separated the 150,000 inhabitants of highly industrialized Cape Breton from the rest of Canada.

Former Resident Of Charlottetown Dies In Vancouver

Word has been received here of the death of William Chesterton Knight who passed away in Vancouver, B. C. July 23 in his 103rd year.

Mr. Knight who was born in England came to Canada at the age of four and with his parents settled in Charlottetown, P. E. I. He was married to Annie Vickerson on April 15, 1879, and they moved to Moncton in 1887 where Mr. Knight operated a bakery.

For 75 years he sang in church choirs, first in Charlottetown and later in St. John's church Moncton. About twelve years ago he moved to Vancouver to be with his daughter.

Mr. Knight's wife died in February 14, 1949. He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Charles G. Moore (Winifred) of Racine, Wis., Mrs. Jane Campbell of Denver, Col., and Mrs. Hazel Smith of Vancouver; another daughter Kathleen predeceased him some nine years ago; one son, G. Fred Knight of Fort Smith, Arkansas.

The funeral was held in Moncton on August 1st, from St. John's United Church.

philosophy of the University of Toronto, told the convention that men and women would not be attracted to the profession without better salaries. Industry was attracting potential teachers by offering better salaries and working conditions and more chance for research.

He said this is particularly true in the case of science graduates from Canadian universities. The reason for this is the teaching profession was disastrous.

"By diverting science graduates to industry we are depriving the competent scientists for tomorrow," he said.

"Unfortunately industry is sometimes hindered and we cannot solve the problem by appealing to the science graduate alone. The problem can be solved only by offering the graduates good salaries and working conditions."

ROOM FOR BOTH
Dr. L. P. Gagnon, of Montreal, president of the 74,000-member federation, said national educational standards could be raised in Canada without interfering with provincial control of the field.

There was no need for conflict between efforts to raise Canadian standards of education and educational activities in the province field.

"There is room for great accomplishment in both areas for there is no shortage of important work in either case," he said.

"Our national provincial interests both challenge our best efforts and what we accomplish in one will only serve to emphasize the stature of the other, not only in our own minds but in the minds of the general public."

"Let us then make small and petty irritations and differences and work together for the welfare of our children who not only live in villages, towns, cities and provinces but who, like us, are also Canadian citizens."

Cattle Exhibits Indicate High Health Standard

Not a reactor or questionable animal was entered for the Provincial Exhibition reports Dr. R. S. MacDonald of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. Brucellosis testing of all entries has been completed and as there will be over 800 cattle exhibited from the three counties of the Province, it would indicate that the incidence of Brucellosis, commonly known as Bang's Disease, is practically negligible in this Province.

With the adoption of the policy of culling vaccination, he stated, the Province should continue to enjoy the enviable reputation it has had in the past.

All these cattle, of course, come from an accredited disease free area for Tuberculosis. Those from outside the Province come from accredited herds and are accompanied by health certificates.

Takes Position As Organist At Trinity Church

At a meeting of the official board of Trinity Church held over the week-end Mr. Royston F. Mugford, A.R.C.O. was chosen as organist for the church with duties commencing September 4. He succeeds Mr. George Thompson, F.R.C.O. (H.M.), A.R.C.M. who retired from the position at the end of June. Mr. Paul Cadmore is acting as supply organist.

Mr. Mugford, who is a native of England, first came to St. Paul's Anglican Church in May, 1946. He left St. Paul's in 1952 to become organist of the Charlottetown Baptist Church from which he recently resigned with the intention of accepting a position in Stratford, Ontario.

Trinity's new organist is well known in Charlottetown musical circles. He is at present band master of the Prince Edward Island Regiment (RECC) but is perhaps better known for his choral work among the pupils of School Unit No. 1 when his singing groups placed high in the Prince Edward Island Musical Festival and on many occasions received high commendation from the adjudicators.

Mr. Mugford served in the R.A.F. from 1940 until 1945. He is a graduate of the Royal College of Organists in London, England. He is married with a family of five and lives on the St. Peters Road.

Representative Of India Here On Brief Visit

At present visiting the Province is Dr. S. Gupta, of Ottawa, 1st secretary to the High Commissioner for India. He participated last week in the summer institute conferences at Mount Allison University. Dr. Gupta was greatly impressed by the address delivered at the Conference by a former Prince Edward Islander, Mr. Edgar McInnis, President of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs, from whom "so he learned something about the Island and its summer attractions. Other prominent speakers at the conference proceedings in Sackville were Dean Longley, of Acadia University, Trevor Pyman, 1st secretary to the High Commissioner for Australia, and Professors Lockwood and Campbell of Mount Allison.

He plans to pay a courtesy call upon the Lieutenant Governor and Premier before leaving by plane for Halifax today. He states that the High Commissioner for India, Dr. M. A. Rauf, is looking forward to visiting Maritime Provinces next summer. The High Commissioner is at present on a tour of the Western Provinces.

Three Children, Woman Die In Mimico Fire

TORONTO, (CP)—Three children and a woman died early Saturday morning when a fire on the second floor of a home in suburban Mimico.

The three-alarm fire which started on the ground-floor spread to a neighboring home where the aged but all occupants there were evacuated safely.

The children were the three daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon MacDougall.

The fourth victim was Margaret Osmond, 33, identified as a housekeeper.

Police said the MacDougalls are separated and that Mrs. MacDougall and two other children were living at another address.

Mr. MacDougall was in the home when the fire started, police said, but was unable to get through to the children, identified as Janet, 3, Ivy Jean, 18 months, and Ronnie, eight months.

An unoccupied home next door was destroyed but the other home described as the residence of a number of elderly women, was not damaged severely.

Fire Destroys Farmers Co-op

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP)—A fire Sunday destroyed the Farmer's Co-Operative store at nearby Baker Brook causing an estimated \$100,000 loss, only partially covered by insurance.

OTHER PLANTS
Pr. D. V. Blokhintsev, deputy leader of Russia's delegation, announced Soviet plans at a press briefing.

He said the new Russian reactor will be capable of generating 100,000 kilowatts compared to the 5,000 kilowatts generated by Russia's present atomic power plant.

But though the new plant would be built within a year, it was difficult to tell in advance when it actually would be in operation.

Other plants capable of generating a few hundred thousands of kilowatts were planned for completion in Russia within the next five years, Blokhintsev said.

Britain also is in the field with an atomic power plant under construction at Calder Hall, England. But it will have only about half the power of the Russian power station.

A new American reactor was described by scientists R. B. Briggs and J. A. Swarlow of the Oak Ridge, Tenn., atomic laboratory. This is a breeder reactor, unique in using as fuel a solution of uranium in water, which produces cheap electric power.

The reactor will produce all its own fuel if thorium-uranium type fuel is used as well as the uranium solution. The amount of fuel originally present in the reactor would be doubled in about four years of full operation.

The new reactor is a second experimental power reactor MacCallum.
