Hospital Official Speaks At Rotary

—Mr. Philip Rickard administrator of the Prince County Hospital was guest speaker yesterday at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club, president J. C. (Bud) Mountain, presiding.

Mr. Rickard entitled his address "hospital and society", relating briefly the changing place of the hospital in relation to society from the time of St. Augustine to the present. Taking the history of British hospitals as an illustration, he told the Rotary gathering of the progress made down through the centuries in forging a closer relationship between the hospital and the public, until at the start of the Second World War the British Government set up emergency medical services to handle the anticipated 30,000 casualties daily. This was done, the guest speaker said, by dividing the country into regions for both hospital and public health services.

Mr. Rickard stated that towards the end of the war the coalition government brought out a white paper suggesting a national public health service which eventually came into effect in July 1948 at which time the Labor Party was in power. This health service, Mr. Rickard said, is under the supreme control of the Minister of Health and contains three water tight sections: hospital and specialist services, local authority services and general practitioner services. Mr. Rickard concluded saying that the framework of this plan is not perfect but it provides one of the finest health services in the world.

Guests at the luncheon meeting were Mr. Justice G. J. Tweed, Mr. Brig. W. W. Reid, both of Charlottetown.

—The November meeting of the Alberton Town Council was held last evening with Mayor H. E. Barbour presiding. Councillors Corbett, Matthews and Profit were in attendance. Minutes were read and approved and bills amounting to \$125.41 were approved and ordered paid.
