The Island Grill, Modern
New Restaurant Opens Today

One of the most modern and
beautifully equipped restaurants
to open in this city for a long time
will begin business (to-day) Sat-
urday.
It is The Island Grill situated in
the Brace Block on Queen St.,
under the management of Mr.
Raymond Wong who for the past
twenty years has been operating a
restaurant in Yarmouth, N. S.
The color scheme is pale green
and gray, with the woodwork in
light birch. Arborite is used in the
wainscoting and the floor is
done in matching tile squares.
There are both single and double
seats covered with light grey
leatherette over foam rubber
cushions. Total seating capacity
is 90.
The lighting is something new in
this city. It consists of cold cathode
double tubes running around the
entire ceiling, giving the place a
soft peaceful appearance over all.
A large neon sign on the outside
of the building advertises "The
Island Grill" and another neon
sign in the window calls attention
to the soda bar and Chinese dishes.
There are two roomy washrooms
done in tile and arborite and the
kitchen is the first word in design
and practicability. Spacious refrig-
erators, deep fryers, and a large
