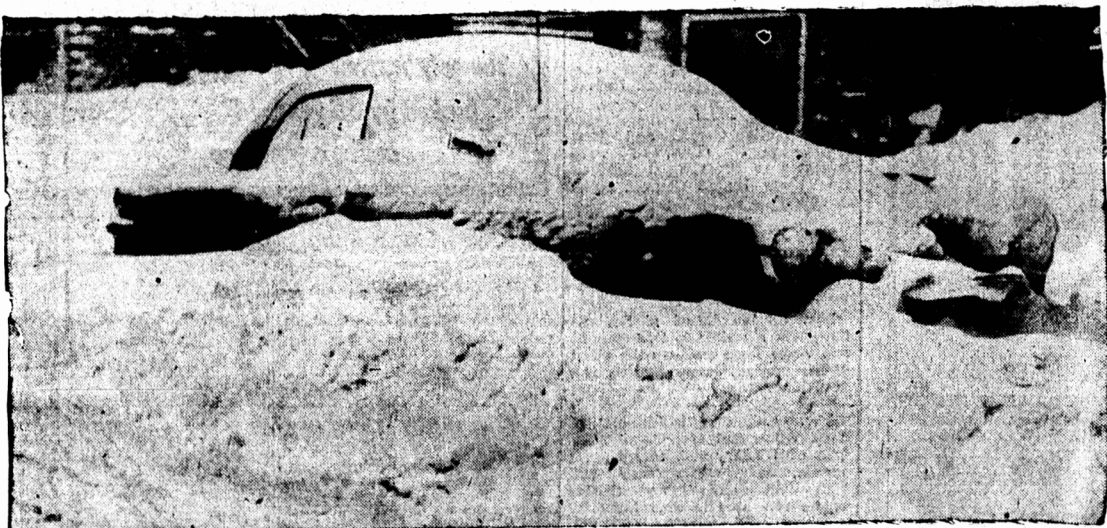
A huge ice jam, which piled up in the east end of St. Lawrence River, caused it to overflow its bank in the suburban town of Longueuil, across from Montreal Island, forcing hundreds of people from their homes. Millions of gallons of icy water and ice cakes were sent swirling into half of the town's streets, causing thousands of dollars' damage. For a time the communities' docks were threatened with destruction, but water receded before it could cause any extensive damage.



Pinned beneath his overturned light delivery truck after it collided with another vehicle on the Queen Elizabeth Way and toppled over, Fred Stothard, 40, of St. Catharines, was instantly killed. George More of St. Catharines, passenger in the truck, sustained a skull fracture. He is in critical condition. Police said the accident occurred one mile west of Bronte when Stothard swerved his truck to avoid another truck which was making a left turn into a bypass, and collided with a Bell Telephone Co. truck, parked on the roadside. The impact caused Stothard's truck to roll over.



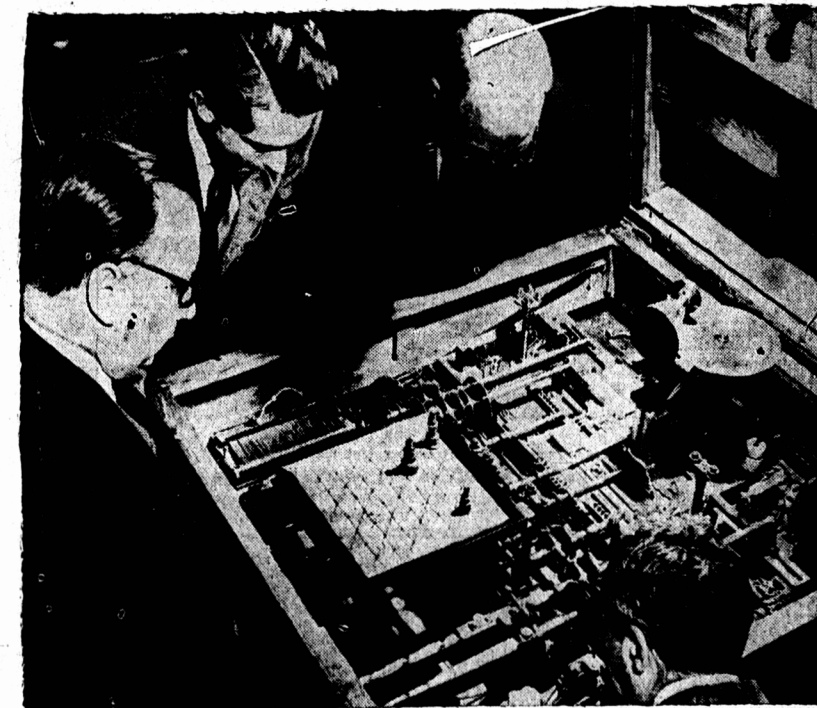
U.S. infantry scouts enter a deserted Korean village, to find pockets of enemy resistance. They move past a barb wire entanglement as they reach the village limits.

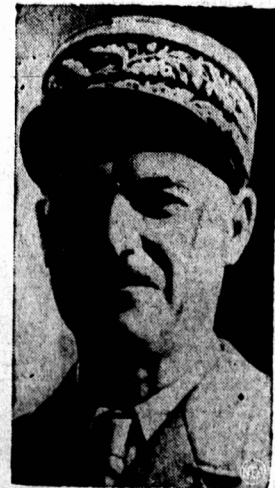
