It is said that the Rothschilds have been authorized to place the Hungarian loan of 300,000,000 florins in the United States.

A COMMERCIAL TRAVELLERS ASSOCIATION has been formed at Halifax. Nearly all the wholesale houses of the city are represented in it.

THE water supply is not plentiful in New York, and 5,000 pounds of dynamite have been provided to blow up houses should a heavy fire break out.

AN English solicitor is at Ottawa on behalf of a number of English capitalists, who propose to purchase about one million acres of land for settlement in the North-West.

THE Committee who had charge of the arrangements for Mr. Murdoch's lecture will meet at the office of William Koughan, Esq., this evening, 22nd inst., at 8 o'clock.

A PUBLIC temperance meeting will be held in the Market Hall next Thursday evening. Several well known clergymen and delegates to the Grand Division will speak. Go early.

THE races at Somerset Driving Park have been postponed. They will take place as soon as the track is in condition. Thirty horses will take part in them, and an interesting day's sport is expected.

Mrs. Sherry's hearth rug, which took first prize at the Dominion Exhibition, was purchased by that lady and presented to Mrs. Harris, wife of the Rev. Mr. Harris, B. C. minister.

It is said the Government are distributing rewards to a number of persons for humane and gallant services in rescuing in January last from the ice at Cape Bear, P. E. I., the passengers of the Northern Light. It is also intended to present testimonials to the mate and three seamen of the "Addie H. Cann," of Yarmouth, N. S., in recognition of their having rescued the shipwreck crew of the brigantine "D. W. Henney," of Hawkebury, N. S., on the 2nd December last.

PRISONER FOR THE PENITENTIARY.—Constable Henry Seales, of Prince Edward Island, reached Moncton yesterday afternoon with Dunbar McCabe, who is on his way to Berchester to serve two years and one month for stabbing with intent to do serious bodily harm. The prisoner is 17 years of age. It is said that since he was sentenced another party has been placed under arrest for the crime, and it is thought possible the sentenced young man is innocent.—Moncton Times.

ONE of the best colleges in Canada, the McGill of Montreal, is in financial difficulties, and its friends are asked to aid it. Its invested capital is \$400,000, from which it gets \$25,000 a year interest, and it has a Government grant of \$5,500. But notwithstanding this its deficit, last year, was \$10,500, and this year it is \$4,000. President Dawson has set a good example by giving up a year or two years' salary. It costs a good deal of money, over and above the fees received from students, to run an educational institution. The fees received at McGill amount to \$4,000, while the whole expenditure is \$48,000.

THE POTATO "HEM."—The poor people of Halifax who have been in the habit of laying in their potato supplies at this season of the year at 20 cents per bushel, must stand aghast when they are confronted with 55 cents a day at Market and Humphrey's wharf, where two cargoes were retailing. They would also be informed that prices were on the advance. A few days ago, at Georgetown, P. E. I., potatoes were selling at 38 cents per bushel; let 12 cents for freight to Halifax, and even at 55 cents, the profit is small. The Island is infested with United States speculators, and it is hard for a coarser to get a load.—Halifax Recorder.

AN amusing case of violation of the Connecticut Blue Laws has occurred at Norwich, in that state, the culprits being no less important persons than ex-President Hayes, Congressman White, and Dr. Bacon, and the offense consisting in the party taking a drive on Sunday in contravention of the old but still existing Puritan regulations for the order of the commonwealth. The last-named gentleman is apparently a rigid Sabbatarian, and has distinguished himself by his efforts in putting down a certain Sunday excursion, the organizer of which now threatens to retaliate by prosecuting the doctor. Each of the offenders in this instance is liable to a fine of twenty dollars.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LATEST IRISH NEWS.

DUBLIN, Oct. 20.

The 31st Regiment left Dover for Ireland to-day and was loudly cheered.

The Land Court opened to-day, Lord Justice O'Hagan presiding. He stated the rules of procedure which had been adopted and said many tenants had already applied to have their rents fixed, but no decision could be given before ten days. The present judges would do their best to make the Act a success.

The judges' statements were received with applause.

LONDON, Oct. 17.

A despatch from Dublin to the Standard says: The Land League has been proclaimed as an illegal and criminal organization, and all its meetings will be dispersed by force.

LONDON, Oct. 20.

The prisoners in Kilmainham Jail have been informed that they can only see physicians, with the warden, at present.

The Press Association confirms the announcement from Dublin that the Land League has been proclaimed as an illegal and criminal organization. The proclamation was issued by Earl Cowper, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

DUBLIN, Oct. 20.

A meeting of 10,000 Land Leaguers at Ballyshannon, County of Donegal, yesterday, denounced the Government.

LONDON, Oct. 20.

Dublin is quiet this evening. The Irish Parliamentary party held a meeting to-day to arrange the details of the Hyde Park meeting on Sunday. The party denounced the British Government, and pledged all Irishmen in England to carry out the Land League principles with increased vigor.

DUBLIN, Oct. 20.

The proclamation against the Land League warns all persons that the Irish National Land League, or by whatever other name it may be called, is an unlawful and criminal association, and that all meetings to carry out or promote its designs or purposes are unlawful and criminal, and will be prevented and dispersed by force.

The proclamation warns the Queen's subjects connected with the League to disconnect themselves from it and to abstain from giving further countenance to it. All the powers and resources of the Government command, the proclamation says, will be employed to protect the Queen's subjects in the free exercise of their lawful obligations, and to save the process of law on the execution of the Queen's writs from hindrance or obstruction. It calls upon all loyal subjects to uphold the authority of law and the supremacy of the Queen in Ireland.

LONDON, Oct. 20.

The city of Derry and town of Drogheda have been proclaimed.

When the news reached the land leaguers Dublin office of the Government's proclamation, a hurried council was held, the books and documents were secured, and letters from the country were destroyed. Many books and papers were carried to a place of safety, the lights were extinguished and the doors were locked. The executive officials decamped fearing arrest.

A largely attended conference of tenant farmers was held in the Town Hall, Ballymeny, County Antrim, to-day, and passed resolutions expressing their gratitude to Mr. Gladstone and the Liberal party for their services in connexion with the Irish land legislation.

UNITED STATES.

QUINCY, Ill., Oct. 20.

A disastrous break occurred in Sny Levee, two miles above Scott's landing, last night. The water is pouring through in torrents, and the land is being rapidly inundated. Farmers were sent out to warn the people and the farmers are using superhuman efforts to save stock and household effects. The disaster at this time will be much greater than ever before, as a large area of winter wheat is sown. Corn and other crops have not been sown, and the bottoms are full of cattle.

JERSEYVILLE, Ill., Oct. 20.

Charles Cay and John Burns went into Wesley Park & Sons' Bank, at Follen, yesterday, and at the muzzle of revolvers compelled Park to give them \$3,500. The robbers then mounted horses and rode away. Park followed to the street, fired and killed one horse. The dismounted robber got on the horse of his pal, and they rode off together. The sheriff raised a posse and is scouring the country. The robbers, it is said, cannot escape.

YORKTOWN, Oct. 20.

The military review to-day was successfully carried out, and fully 45,000 men were in line from various States of the Union. They were reviewed by President Arthur, the Cabinet, Gen. Hancock, and distinguished French and German visitors.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.

Advices from Mazatlan give particulars of a terrible hurricane, Sept. 29th, causing great damage to shipping and other property. The German barque Caroline is wrecked. Most of the houses show signs of falling in. It is stated 500 lives are lost in the neighboring towns from the recent freshets.

[Mazatlan is a flourishing seaport town of Sonora, Mexico, near the mouth of the river Mazatlan. It is the port for neighboring towns, and is subject to frightful hurricanes.]

ST. PAUL, Oct. 20.

Secretary Windom was nominated for Senator in the Republican caucus to-night by acclamation.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 20.

Trickett, the Australian carman, has sent a formal challenge to Hanlan, to row a three mile race on Greve Cour Lake, near here, for \$1,000 a side and the championship of the world, on or about the 2nd of November, the date to be agreed upon when signing the articles.

OHIO.

LIMA, Sept. 28.

The Government of Garcia Caldon has ceased to exist. A decree of the Chilean commander at Callao declaring that in all parts of Peru occupied by Chilean forces no Government otherwise than municipal (except the Chilean) would be allowed to exercise Governmental authority.

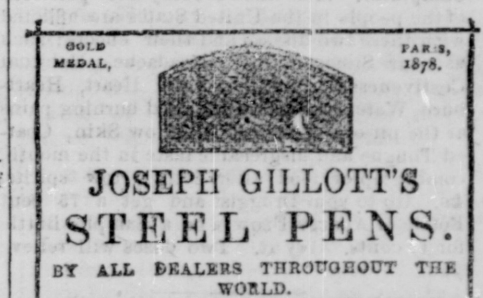
