GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Calcutta, Dec. 26.—The Indian national congress opened in Madras today. Alfred Webb, M. P. for West Waterford, was elected president. He compared the situation and destinies of India with those of Ireland. He commended the Indian government and criticized sharply the course of the British military establishment as entirely beyond the limits of its wealth.

Hartford, Conn., Dec. 23.—Mrs. Emily Robbins Talcott of West Hartford, the oldest resident in this state, reached her one hundredth birthday yesterday. She was nine years old when President Washington died. She was born at Walcott Hill in Wethersfield, and was married at twenty to Ansel Talcott, who died here a few years ago. She has four children living and grand and great-grandchildren.

Paris, Dec. 24.—The report that Capt. Alfred Dreyfus, the French officer who was sentenced on Saturday last to life in a fortress, after having been convicted of betraying military secrets to a foreign country, had attempted to commit suicide, turns out to be incorrect.

Berlin, Dec. 24.—Before leaving Varzin, it transpires, Prince Bismarck paid a farewell visit to the chapel in which the remains of the princess are resting. The scene which followed made a deep impression upon all who witnessed it. He remained some time leaving the chapel, the price set beneath a fir tree, leaning up his stick and his eyes turned towards the grave of the princess. It was with great difficulty that he was able to get up the hill to leave Varzin and to give up his daily visits to the grave of his beloved wife.

CANADIAN HORSES IN LONDON.

Considerable numbers of Canadian horses have been imported into London, and some of the large omnibus and tramway companies seem to prefer them to any others. Although the trade has been a subject of discussion in some papers, the classes of horses in demand have not hitherto been sent over in any numbers. Mr. Hunting, the president of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, who acts as the Veterinary expert to the Canadian Government in London, made a report to Sir Charles Tupper last year as to the horses which would meet with the most ready market in Great Britain. Among others he specially mentioned the vanier and the omnibus horse, and it is these varieties which have been so much in favor since Mr. Hunting's report, printed by the Department of Trade and Commerce, deserves to be studied by those connected with this industry, as there is a large market for such horses. It appears that they largely go to Glasgow, but a good many also find their way to Croydon, a London suburb, and that the large London companies purchase their supplies there.

INCREASE OF FARM EXPORTS.
(St. John Sun.)

In no department of Canadian products has the increase in shipments been so large as in the produce of the farm. It is true that the export of livestock has not developed so rapidly as that of cattle and their products. But at present prices it is obviously to the advantage of the farmer to ship his produce in the shape of wool or cheese than in the form of grain. In 1878 the value of wheat, flour and other cereals of the produce of Canada, export was \$1,516,000, while the imports for some were \$1,456,000. In 1883 the exports were valued at \$16,475,000 and the imports at \$2,892,000, showing a gain of between two and three millions in the net sales. The quantity of wheat represented by a given sum of money was forty per cent. larger in 1893 than in 1878. The value of horses exported in 1878 was \$1,273,000 and in 1893 \$1,461,000, the value of cattle shipped increased from \$1,152,000 to \$7,745,000, or more than six fold. Sheep increased from \$700,000 in 1878 to \$1,847,000 in 1893. The value of pig, beef and other meats, cheese, butter and eggs exported in 1878 was only \$8,250,000, while in 1893 it was \$18,750,000. The total value of Canadian agricultural products and their products exported in 1878 was in round figures \$32,000,000. In 1892 the value was within a fraction of 55,000,000.

NEWS NOTES.

Sir Richard Cartwright, in his speech to the Young Liberals, urged them to devote their best efforts to assist to the minds of the people of Canada a determination to get rid of bootleggers, whether in municipal, provincial or national affairs. This is a plea of the enemy's platform which young Conservatives might adopt. If it were developed in the national mind a genuine detestation of bootlegging in the future, about 1 per cent. of the community would lose and 99 per cent. would profit. The greater good would come to the greatest number.

The loss of 120 lives during the recent storm on the British coast is appalling. The death toll has not been entirely lifted up from the hardy toilers of the sea, for land-men too have come to death in the stress of the gales. Like our own westerly, England has been enjoying up to this delightful temperature. Such changes as come about in Canada usually make for a little colder weather, which is always welcome here. The insular position of Britain, which preserves more equable conditions there, has the great offset of the sales from the ocean. No climate is perfect, few countries are much more blessed than ours.

Arrangements have been perfected for placing the Toronto Empire newspaper on a firm financial basis. The Empire has always been edited with ability, and while it will continue as in the past to give the Conservative party a loyal support, the staff of writers will have a freer hand in dealing with political matters, while the news and commercial department will receive a larger share of attention. The syndicate having secured a controlling interest in the Empire is one of the strongest financially on the continent, and it is needless to say that no expense will be spared to make the paper in every department what it should be as a leading daily in the largest province of the Dominion.
