

The Electric Light in Peril.

Mr. Hannay, of Glasgow, is the inventor of a new light, which bids fair to compete as an out of door illuminant, with electricity. It is produced by the consumption of a most intimate mixture of air and minutely divided oil particles. Lucigen, as the new illuminant is called, is already largely used in large engineering works, and for lighting large open spaces, for which it is especially adapted. All that is required for the Lucigen light is a barrel of crude oil and a condensed air engine, which transforms the oil particles into spray, and as the disintegration of the two elements is secured a continuous bright flame is the result. Three lamps on the terrace in front of Crystal Palace, at Sydenham, lit up the whole ground, and the oil consumed did not cost more than four cents per hour. Such is the immense volume and diffuse power of the flame that small print can be read a quarter of a mile away from one lamp. Two of the lamps having been extinguished, Mr. Augustus Harris, manager of the Drury Lane Theatre, was able to read down an avenue at over 530 yards from the lamp. The utility of Lucigen for outdoor purposes may be gauged by its victories. Besides being used for lighting many large engineering works, and such places as the Armstrong and Whitworth factories, it is employed in several railway stations in England; it has supplanted the electric light at the Fort Bridae works, it has been set up, along the length of the Suez Canal, it is in use in the maize fields in Egypt, and was employed in the recent mobilization of the French troops. The energetic Boulanger found out the advantage of it for disembarking horses and carrying on other military operation at night; and the French military authorities are now getting lighting apparatus which would enable them to carry out the mobilization of the army without interruption. The plant for an installation is portable, and the small air-compressor may be worked by hand. Though Lucigen is too powerful a light for using indoors, the Town Council of Glasgow is introducing it into the streets. In this case the flame would be protected by a globe. Mr. Hannay says that a town could be lighted with the waste products of its own gasworks. The oil however can be imported into England for a penny a gallon, and the supply is said to be inexhaustible.

The strongest man and the truest woman are powerless against the secret approaches of these good souls, who have as keen an eye for possible evil and as versatile a tongue for spreading abroad their surmises as if by some process of revolution they had come up from the beast of prey and added to animal destructiveness human ingenuity and the resources of civilization. Society is altogether too lenient with its evil speakers; it ought to brand them and draw a circle around them. They are far more dangerous than the classes that are avowedly and professionally criminal. Many a man keeps his credit and holds his place who deserves the whip of small cords, and many a woman holds her own in the "best circle" whose judgement of scorn ought not to be deferred for the next world to pronounce. Your neighbour's reputation is as much yours to guard from misconception and preserve from stain as your own. When you help to build it up you serve yourself no less than another. If you do not understand certain things in the house next door rest content with your own ignorance, and not go from house to house inviting others to share it, or stand on the street corners and wonder why things are as they are. They are probably vulnerable spots in your own armour into which a sharp word might be easily driven. The code of morals which permits men and women to speak ill of each other is a relic of barbarism; Christianity makes every man his brother's keeper.
