

Boston Braves Defeat New York Giants 6-3 To Snap Losing Streak

Boston Braves snapped a three-game National League losing streak and in the process beat the "lefty" Jinx Thursday when they defeated New York Giants 6-3 in 10 innings.

In the only other game of the day—three National League and two American League games were postponed because of the weather—Boston Red Sox whipped New York Yankees 3-2 in an 11-inning affair.

Giant manager Leo Durocher sent Max Lanier, another in a long line of lefthanded pitchers who have been plaguing the Braves, to the mound. For seven innings he didn't allow the Beantowners a run.

But in the eighth, Boston finally got to Lanier and tied the count at 3-3. That brought Dave Koso, another southpaw, to the scene. He was charged with the defeat when he gave up three runs in the 10th inning.

Hero of the Braves' uprising

was rookie Ed Mathews, who doubled with the bases loaded, sending home two runs. That finished Koso, and George Spencer came on. Jack Cusick sent home the third tally with a fly.

The Red Sox beat the Yanks when relief pitcher Bob Kuzava forced home the winning run by walking Billy Goodman with the bases loaded.

Ed Lopat had held the Sox to five hits in his nine-inning stint on the mound. For the Sox, Maury McDermott started and went up to the 11th, but was relieved then by rookie Ivan Delock, who got credit for the triumph.

Kuzava suffered his first loss when catcher Sammy White beat out an infield hit. Dom DiMaggio singled and Jim Piersall walked to load the bases. Then he walked Goodman for the game. White previously had homered off Lopat.

Stratford Evens Allan Cup Series With 3-0 Win

FORT WILLIAM, April 24 (CP)—Stratford Indians tonight squared the Allan Cup hockey tournament with Fort Frances Canadians 1-1, blanking the Forts 3-0 in the second game of their best-of-seven series.

The Eastern Canada champions hemmed Canadians in their own end throughout most of the game while they scored on goal each period. Stratford's defensive play, a complete reversal of Tuesday's performance when Canadians whipped them 9-5, completely baffled Fort Frances.

The Forts were powerless against close checking and hardly had a chance at the net.

Bruce Burdett scored two goals for Indians with the single goal to Jack White.

Close to 2600 fans saw the game. Third game will be played on Fort Frances on Saturday.

Indians took command from the start and then held off the reviving Fort Frances club in the third for the shut-out.

Burdett's first goal was the third in the series that Stratford had scored when short-handed. Don Heimbach was off at the time.

Hornets Get \$20,499 For Winning Cup

NEW YORK, April 24 (CP)—Pittsburgh Hornets received slightly more than one-third of a \$60,291.57 jackpot for winning the American Hockey League Calder Cup playoff championship, league headquarters announced today.

The Hornets, who defeated Providence Reds four games to two in the best-of-seven final, received a total of \$20,499.13. Providence's share was \$16,278.72.

The rest of the money was split among the teams eliminated in the preliminary rounds, with their percentage based on the regular season standing and how far they survived in the playoffs.

Hershey received \$9,043.74, Cincinnati \$7,536.45, Cleveland \$3,918.85 and Buffalo \$3,014.58.

The players shared in 50 per cent of the net receipts from the 17 minimum games necessary to decide a winner in the five-playoff series.

There were two best-of-seven series, with four required in each for a decision, and three best-of-five, with three games each for the minimum, to make the 17-game total.

The entire net for these games went into a general pool, of which the players got 50 per cent instead of just sharing in the particular series in which they played. A total of 23 games were played.

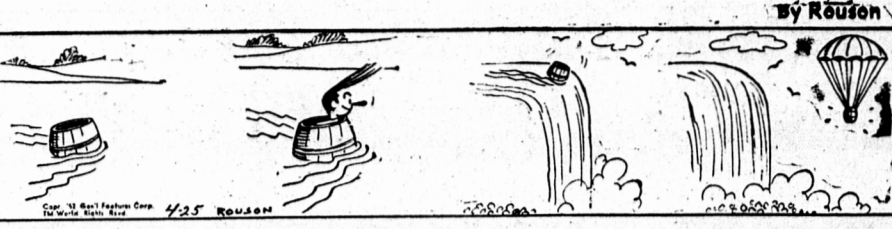
Former Boxer Pleads Guilty

MONTREAL, April 24 (CP)—Keith (Rocky) Pearson, 26, former boxer, today pleaded guilty to charges of conspiracy to commit a theft and of stealing \$10,000 from a bank messenger.

He was sentenced to two years on the first charge and three years on the second. The sentences will be run concurrently.

Pearson, whose wife was recently sentenced to two years for illegal possession of narcotics, pleaded guilty to having conspired with others to rob Alexander Laflamme of \$954 on Aug. 28, 1951 and to stealing \$10,000 from Donatien Dupuis, a bank messenger, at Laprarie on Nov. 17, 1951.

When the Quebec Aces left Saint John last week-end we couldn't help but suppress the feeling that the Aces were good enough to win in four straight games. After all the Beavers had been beaten in their own rink only three times all season and when they lost two straight games to a visiting club from Quebec it was only natural to feel that the visitors must have a lot of hockey savvy. But judging from last night's 6-0 score either the Aces were over-rated, the Beavers under-rated or the Aces didn't want to wind up the series until Saturday night.

We were happily surprised to hear the one-sided score and hope there will be three more similar to it. According to the Canadian Press reports the Beavers were hot and could do nothing wrong. Actually as far as the Aces it was concerned the Beavers have had the upper hand all through the series but they couldn't seem to click when they got across the Quebec blue-line.

Jack Gelineau apparently was not up to his early series form last night. In the first three games Gelineau was reportedly playing much better hockey than he had been all season. It could have been that Jack wasn't trying too hard during the regular schedule and just turned on the pressure during the playoffs. Then too apparently Gelineau had something when he said that Gelineau was lucky on at least half a dozen shots in the first game. "The shots trickled off his pads and could have gone into the net as easily as past it," stated Peanuts.

During the regular season Gelineau shared goaltending duties with a netminder by the name of Marois. While it's a good thing to have two goaltenders we doubt very much if the practise of playing them alternate games helps either netminder a great deal. Marois played for Leo Lamoureux at Shawinigan Falls several years ago and according to Leo only had a mediocre year. Since then he has apparently improved considerably. Once this year he replaced Gelineau during a game which the Aces lost 6-1.

The Beavers have done fairly well in shacking Jean Beliveau in the Quebec Coliseum. In the two games Beliveau or le grand Bill as the Quebec fans call him has scored only one goal and picked up one assist. Doug Costello in the Saint John Telegraph Journal wrote that Beliveau had the hardest slap shot in the hockey he had seen. We would like to see if it were harder than some of the slap shots that Bob Gray got away this winter.

We would like to have seen the Beavers of two months ago play the Aces. Last night's game was number 109 for the Saint John club this season and that's a lot of hockey for any group of individuals. The Aces have played about 30 fewer games and should be considerably stronger physically as a result.

Beavers Down Aces 6-0 To Stave Off Elimination In Series

QUEBEC, April 24 (CP)—Saint John Beavers went on a scoring rampage tonight to blank Quebec Aces 6-0 and stave off elimination from Alexander Trophy final play. Quebec leads the eight-point-total series, six points to two.

The Beavers out-skated and out-passed the Aces throughout the game, piling up a 3-0 lead in the first period adding, another goal in the second and two more in the last stanza.

Goalie Hall Gordon, supported by steady checking at the blue line turned in a splendid performance for the winners before a crowd of 10,391.

Johnny Ubricco, one of the leading scorers in the Maritime Major Hockey League during the regular season, paced the Beavers with two goals, the first and the last, and single counters went to Matt Meslich, Ken Watson, Tom Smelle and Dusty Blair.

The fifth game will be played here Saturday night.

The Beavers apart from skating the Aces into the ice, could do nothing wrong inside the Quebec blue line, blasting Quebec goalie Jack Gelineau with 24 shots. Gordon handled 19.

From the first period, it became evident that Beavers would be hard to beat and they got a couple of breaks on Quebec defence lapses to pump three goals past Gelineau.

Ubricco's first marker came when he deflected Carl Smelle's 35-footer at the 11-minute mark. Beavers then struck with two goals in 34 seconds. Mesich scored on a blazing backhander from point-blank range, and Watson poked in a rebound from a shot by Bill McCracken.

Early in the second period, Smelle pushed home a rebound in a wild scramble in front of the Quebec nets.

With Beavers short-handed late in the game, Gelineau was taken off the ice for a sixth forward. Blair broke away and shot into an empty net.

Ubricco completed the scoring with less than two minutes to go on a hard, low shot that caught the corner.

Rule Maritime Athletes May Enter Olympic Trials

MONTREAL, April 24 (CP)—The Amateur Athletic Union of Canada announced today that athletes in the former Maritime branch may participate in national championships and Olympic trials if vouched for by their physical fitness director.

Meanwhile plans are under way for formation of three provincial branches in the Maritimes to replace the defunct Maritime branch.

The temporary plan to protect Maritime athletes was agreed upon by Bill Reid of Prince Edward Island, Hugh Noble of Nova Scotia, Stan Spicer of New Brunswick and Morrie Bruker, Montreal, national vice-president of the A.A.U. of C.

Officials of the national body said 10 days ago that the Maritime branch is defunct and therefore amateur cards could not be issued to Maritime athletes pending some reorganization.

Today's announcement said the individual provincial directors will shortly convene meetings in their own areas to form provincial branches. A combined meeting of the three branches, with Bruker attending, will be held in May to give official approval to changes and papers relating thereto.

The announcement said: "Reid, Noble and Spicer agreed that in the best interests of the Maritime Athletes, each province should establish its own branch. The former Maritime branch proved itself unwieldy. They agreed that it is inconsistent with good supervision for people in their provinces to be sponsored and supervised by organizations outside their provinces."

For the A.A.U. of C., Bruker said: "The union recognizes the provincial autonomy of each province to establish its branch to sponsor, supervise and promote activities for its athletes. The union feels that the three branches will assure better planning in terms of the individual needs of the provincial branches."

Johnston Jets Win U. S. Title

JOHNSTON, Pa., April 24 (AP)—Johnston Jets won the United States amateur hockey championship tonight by defeating Toledo 7-1 for their fourth victory in the best-of-seven series.

Johnston, the Eastern Hockey League champion, got off to a Cleveland lead in the first period and was never in danger. John Bobenic and Reggie Grigg scored two goals apiece to lead the attack.

Toledo, the International League title winners, scored midway in the second period on a short shot by Dick Pontarollo.
