HUNTER'S SEASON

Old Picture Brings Back Memories Of Fraser's Dam

Quite recently I came across an enlargement of a snapshot taken on September 20th, 1938. At the bottom of the picture was printed "Game Bag Check" and "Fraser's Dam, Sept. 20th, 1938". It was taken by Don Hutchinson, Canal Zone, Panama, who was visiting in the province and came along for the evening morning duck hunt. The place was Fraser's Beaver Dam. Huteh is married to my niece and they were here on a "wild" Fraser's Beaver Dam flooded swampy valley and covered several hundred acres of prime duck terrain. A heavy storm of black spruce grew on its borders and it was close to a million. At the time the picture was taken I was picking a boat that came ashore after the shoot. In it were three hunters and the hired man of Wes Dennis, who went along for the ride. In the boat along with Dennis were Eve Ferguson and Hal Spiller with 26 ducks, 45 per cent of the ducks were blacks with the odd teal and ring-necked duck mixed in with the blacks. The limit was 12 ducks per day. The boat was loaded to the gunnels when it came ashore and was riding low in the water. In the snapshot you can see the ducks stacked up in the middle. In the picture was myself, brother Earl and Jack, our Irish Water spaniel. Earl and I each had our daily limit. At one time it was 15 per day and we filled our limit as easily as we did the 12. It was what is known as a candid picture and all the more so on that account. I had our first opening morning hunt at Fraser's Beaver Dam in 1932. The dam then was 15 then but securing our limit was mere child's play and we were generally through shooting between 8:30 and 9:00 a.m. Incidentally in 1938 was the last year there was any hunting north of the name at Fraser's. The dam pulled out and the dam broke away. But ... we had evening morning shoots that were simply out of the line with the early morning flight from Pisano and the thousands of ducks that spent the night in its wild rice beds moved out in a continuous stream as soon as the pre-dawn darkness showed signs of dissipating. They came in their thousands, battalions, ter battalions a scant hundred apart. Thousands greeted us to drop off at Fraser's dam and themselves in the quiet pools, hummocks and flats and on the small, grassy islands, grassy and smooth that dotted its surface. Others continued on to the salt water flats off Irving's Bar and St. Peter's Island.
