### National Council Of Women Begins Sessions In Montreal

MONTREAL (CP) — The National Council of Women of Canada began two-day sessions Monday, working on its own agenda and making final preparations for the meeting here, starting Wednesday, of the triennial conference of the International Council of Women.

The international body, meeting June 5-15, is expected to bring together 450 delegates from 29 of the 36-member countries. In addition, Turkey and Japan are sending representatives as prospective member countries.

The national council's sessions began with addresses and reports of various officers and committee members. Resolutions are on the Tuesday agenda along with local provincial and national conferences. An executive meeting Tuesday night winds up the 64th annual meeting of the national council.

The international council, founded in 1888 and meeting for the first time in Canada since 1909, will hold meetings in classrooms of the physical sciences centre at McGill University. A system utilizing earphones for simultaneous translation of speeches has been arranged.

PROMOTE WELFARE  
 From the time of its founding, the aim of the ICW has been to bring together women's organizations from all parts of the world "for consultation on action to be taken to promote the welfare of mankind, of the family and of the individual."

Registration for the ICW sessions will begin Wednesday following by meetings of the ICW with conveners and vice-conveners. The heavy business agenda begins Thursday, including meetings of various standing committees and the president's address.

### Gaelic Speaking C. Bretoner Is Presbyterian Moderator

VANCOUVER (CP) — A Cape Breton Scot who is as fluent in Gaelic as he is in English is the head of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

He is Dr. Archibald Donald MacKinnon, 59, who for 30 years has been minister at Little Narrows, N.S.

Dr. MacKinnon was elected Wednesday night over four other candidates as moderator of the 33rd general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, which has 188,000 communicant members. He succeeds Dr. Finlay G. Stewart of Kitchener, Ont.

Election of the moderator and formal opening of the assembly was attended by a capacity crowd of 700 to 800 in Vancouver's Kerrisdale Presbyterian Church.

**FATHER OF SIX**  
 Dr. MacKinnon, married and the father of six children, was one of the two candidates who were not nominated by a presbytery prior to the assembly. The other was Rev. Clifton J. MacKay, minister of Knox Crescent and Kensington Church, Montreal.

Other candidates were Rev. W. Oliver Nugent, superintendent of missions for the synod of Alberta, who was dropped from the list after the first ballot; Rev. Donald MacInnes of Ridgeway, Ont., who along with Mr. MacKay was elected after the second ballot; and Dr. A. Ian Burnett of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, who was eliminated on the third ballot and thereupon moved that the

first committee meetings will be those on trades and professions, housing, laws and suffrage, migration, moral welfare, international relations and radio and television. Elizabeth Long of Winnipeg is convener of the radio and television committee, whose aim is to work for and defend freedom of speech and free comment on the air nationally and internationally.

**DEHYDRATED MEAT**  
 AUCKLAND (AP) — New Zealand scientists claim to have perfected a method of dehydrating meat which enables the unfrozen meat to be carried in the same amount of space normally carried by six refrigerated freighters. They say it is almost impossible to tell the difference between fresh and dehydrated meat.

He graduated in arts from Dalhousie University and received his divinity degree from the Presbyterian College in Montreal in 1926. He was one of two students at the college who remained in the Presbyterian fold when the United Church was founded in 1925.

In 1947 Dr. MacKinnon received an honorary doctorate of divinity from the Presbyterian College in recognition of his outstanding work for the church in the presbytery of Cape Breton.

When his name was proposed by Rev. Donald Mackay of Summerside, P.E.I., Dr. MacKinnon declined to become a candidate. However Mr. Mackay refused to withdraw it.

In a brief address following his election Dr. MacKinnon said he was not worthy of the charge but that he would strive faithfully to carry out his duties.

The first general assembly to be held in Vancouver in 54 years is being attended by some 230 commissioners from 48 presbyteries. For the first time in 10 years the Church of Scotland is represented at a Canadian assembly. Dr. A. Neville Davidson, minister of Glasgow Cathedral, brings greetings from the Scottish general assembly.

Dr. Stewart, moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada no longer is "a group of old people, or a church of Irish and Scottish people and their descendants."

He said: "Our is a great cosmopolitan church of every racial and national tradition, all responding to the particular doctrinal principle which is Presbyterianism, and growing into self-reliant, God-fearing Christian citizens."

Dr. Stewart emphasized that the church is not against unity, but it is against any ecumenical movement that has not an adequate theology. Unity must not be born of expediency.

#### Sally Sly Is A Sneak

She spends most of her time trying to keep out of sight while stealing about and trying to find out all about her neighbors. She is very clever about it. At other times she is happy-go-lucky and intent only on having a good time.

It is because she thinks so much about having a good time that she has become a sneak. She doesn't want the care of bringing up a family, so she does her best to force her neighbors to bring up her children. Her plan is a very simple one, but in a way it is a very clever one. She hunts for the nests of other birds smaller than herself. When she finds one with

eggs in it she watches until that nest is unguarded for a few minutes, then slips into that nest and lays an egg in it and sneaks away. In time that egg will hatch with the other eggs that belong there and Sally Sly's baby will be brought up by the father and mother of the other babies.

Farmer Brown's boy had found one of Sally Sly's eggs in the nest of Little Friend the Song Sparrow and had taken it. A day or two later Sally Sly had found a chance to slip over to that nest when it was unguarded for a few minutes. She had done this to see if the egg she had laid there was still there. It wasn't. There was no broken egg there. What had become of that egg she didn't know. But she did know that there was her chance to lay another egg. So the next day she did just this, hoping that nothing would happen to this egg.

She wasn't seen by Little Friend or Mrs. Little Friend. She sneaked in to lay the egg. She sneaked out again. There wasn't a tree in all the Old Orchard or a bush on the edge of it that Sally Sly didn't visit. Yet no one saw her. That was because she didn't visit them openly but sneaked about making sure that no one was in a tree or bush when she visited it.

In this way Sally Sly found most of the nests of other birds. She was careful when she laid one of her eggs to be sure that it was in the nests of birds smaller than herself. If one of her babies should be in a nest of birds bigger than herself it might not get the care that the babies that rightly belonged there would have. So, while Sally Sly was avoiding the responsibilities and care of bringing up her children, she was in a way looking out for them. It was a sneaky sort of way of looking out for their welfare.

Once in awhile in spite of all she could do some neighbor would catch a glimpse of her. Then right away all the neighbors around there would be warned that Sally Sly was in the neighbourhood and their nests unguarded.

Meanwhile Mr. Cowbird minded his own business and spent most of his time over in the Old Pasture following the cows about and catching the insects that were stirred up by the feet of the cows. It is from this habit that these birds have gotten their name of Cowbirds. They are on the best of terms with the Cows.

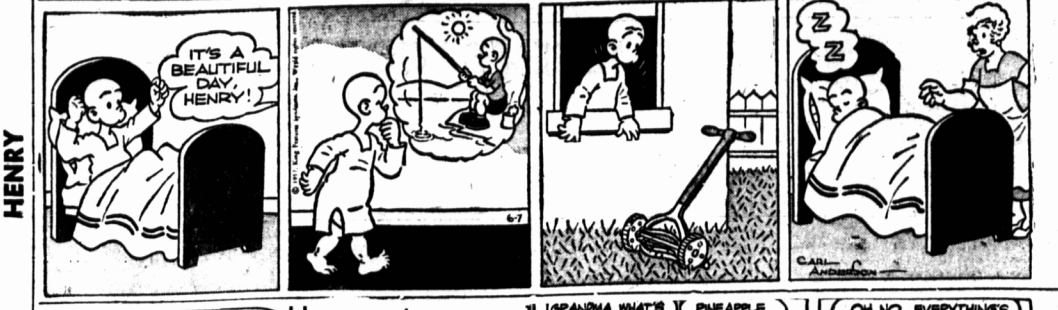
