

# Millionaires Defeat Islanders 8-5 To Break Jinx On Sydney Ice

SYDNEY, (CP)—Sydney Millionaires whipped Charlottetown Islanders 8-5 Tuesday for their first home victory in a month of play in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

With forward Chuck Holdaway replacing the suspended Al Millar in the Islanders' goal, the Millionaires broke into an early goal-scoring stride that never faltered.

Freddy Hildebrand riddled in two goals late in the third period after the Islanders tied the score at 5-5.

Eddie Marneau also was a two-goal scorer. Alex Brinkow, Lonnie Pirie, Ronnie Rowe, and Dunc McIntyre got the others.

Hub Beaudry led the Islanders' attack with two goals and singles went to Walt Pawlyshyn, Marcel Clements and Steve Brklacich.

Buck Whitlock failed to score his 300th goal in six years of Maritime hockey but picked up two assists.

The win was Sydney's third over Charlottetown this season.

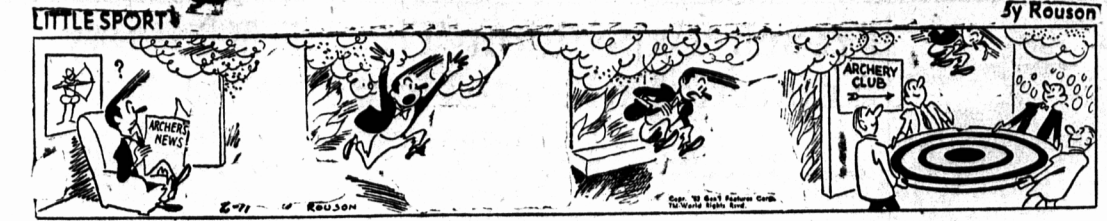

# Weak-Hitting Eddie Yost Is Senators Holdout

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Washington Senators face an unusual situation: One of their 233 hitters threatens to become a holdout. But Eddie Yost is an unusual baseball player.

Although most 233 hitters would be eager to sign, Yost can present statistics to show why he thinks he's entitled to more of the Senators' cash.

He's the most walked man in the American League; he's the club's leading home-run hitter with 12, and defensively he's about as good a third-baseman as you'll find anywhere.

So Yost has sent back his contract and is asking for more than the reported \$16,000 he made last year.

As leadoff man for the Senators last year, Yost was on base with 137 hits and 129 bases on balls plus eight times when he was hit by the pitcher.

The American League's leading hitter, Ferris Fain, batted .327 for Philadelphia Athletics last year.

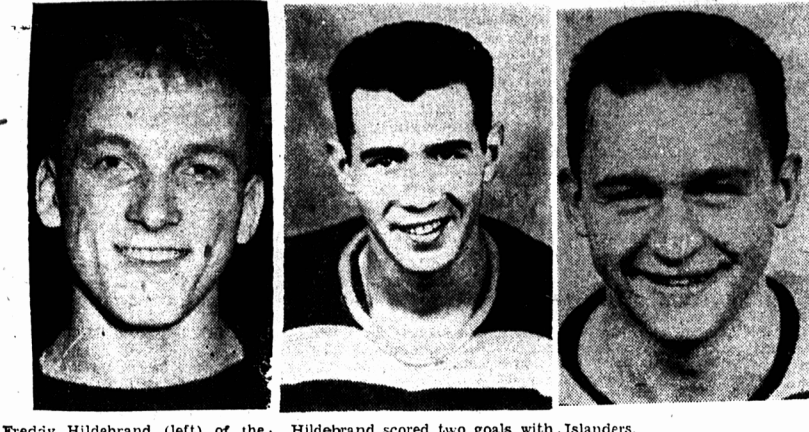
Yet, Yost points out in his arguments with the Senators, Fain was on base only eight times more than he was Fain's 176 hits, 105 walks and the one time he was hit by a pitcher add up to 282 to Yost's 274.

No one knows why Yost draws so many walks.

Usually the league leader in walks gets them because the pitcher is afraid to let him hit. Babe Ruth, for example, led the American League 11 times on bases on balls. In 1923 he was given 170 free passes.

By crowding the plate, by hitting hard when he does connect and by having an excellent eye, Yost twice has led the league in walks, in 1940 with 141 and last year with 129.

# Gavilan 12-5 Favorite To Retain Title

 CHICAGO, (AP)—A wave of TV-inspired support backs college-bred Chuck Davey in his welter title bid Wednesday night but cash-on-the-line realists make champion Kid Gavilan a solid 12-to-5 favorite to hold his 147-pound title.

This is the fight that TV made Davey, a handsome 26-year-old Michigan State grad, has wowed them on living room screens. His southpaw style, dazzling speed and convincing performances against Chico Vejar and Rocky Graziano moved him up past other more experienced contenders.

That is why the living-room fans are shocked by the odds making Davey an underdog. They have seen Davey and most were convinced.

About 20,000 fans are expected to desert their free seat at the fireside to pay \$25 for a ringside spot as their contribution to an expected gross gate of about \$275,000. There is a rematch contract, calling for a return bout within 90 days if Davey wins.

There are sharp contrasts between the 27-year-old champion and challenger in Gavilan's fifth defence of the crown: he won from Mt. # National League Announces 1953 Schedule

NEW YORK, (AP)—The National League Tuesday announced a 1953 baseball schedule with a total of 217 night games, three below last year's all-time record.

St. Louis Cardinals again qualify as the circuit's night owls, playing 56 of their 77 home games under the lights and 32 of those away from home after sundown.

The only team that approaches the Cardinals in moonlight activity is Philadelphia, which has scheduled 42 home games at night. Pittsburgh has 29 night contests at home, Boston and Cincinnati 28 each, Brooklyn 24 and New York 16. Chicago Cubs, unequipped with electrical lighting, play all home games in daylight.

Pittsburgh Pirates and Cincinnati Reds get the jump on the rest of the league, opening their campaigns at Cincinnati April 13. The other openers are April 14, as follows: Boston at Brooklyn Cincinnati at Chicago New York at Philadelphia St. Louis at Pittsburgh.
