THE "Princess of Wales" succeeded in towing Mr. R. F. Quirk's ship "Midas" out of the ice at China Point Wharf, yesterday. The work done by the steamer in the ice is highly spoken of by the owners, and Captain Cameron deserves to be complimented for it.

VALUABLE CARGO.—The "Ethel Blanche," owned by Peake Bros. & Co., cleared for London to-day with a cargo consisting of 13,000 boxes of lobsters and preserved meats, valued at \$65,000, shipped by John Hughes. She had also 9,000 bushels of oats, valued at \$3,780; 250 pieces deal, valued at \$56; and 1 case books valued at \$150, shipped by the owners.

ASSAULT.—On Thursday evening Mr. Francis Panting, of Pinnette, was assaulted on King Street. At seven o'clock he left his boarding house to do some business in the city. After leaving the house he was struck on the left temple with a brick. He ran back, and as he entered the door he was struck again with a missile which inflicted an ugly wound in his face. Mr. Panting says his assailants had an evident intention of robbing him. No provocation was given for the assault.

HARDSHIPS OF THE SEA.—By telegram, received by Peake Bros. & Co., to-day, we learn that the barque "Moselle," D. Carrow, master, which left Montreal for Bremen on the 19th inst., with grain, put into North Sydney, C. B., in distress. She lost foremast, main-top mast, tegallant-mast, mizen-top-mast, sails and boats. Her deck was swept, and six feet of water is in hold. The crew were badly frozen and one man died.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Despatch to Examiner.
 LONDON, Nov. 26.
 The Times says the Cabinet will not summon Parliament before Christmas, unless some unexpected emergency arises. Further prorogation to early in January will be declared. The News says: "It may be safely assumed that Parliament will meet early in January, the Ministers carefully considering an Irish Land Bill."

NEW YORK, Nov. 26.
 A London despatch says: "Forster maintained his policy of immediate coercion so stoutly, and raised such a storm of opposition, that Gladstone became thoroughly alarmed at the prospect of going before Parliament with a weakening Ministry at his heels, and, to avoid a split, an adjournment of the Cabinet was taken."

THE Irish Land Commission appointed by Parliament to consider the relations between landlord and tenant, will report in favor of fixity of tenure.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.
 To a delegation representing the independent republican association who visited General Garfield to-day and advocated his adoption of a thorough reform in the Civil Service. Garfield said he hoped to have the co-operation of Congress in that direction.
