

report says that she is very unwilling to part with them. Lord Melville referred Mr. Hensley to his Agent on the Island, J. R. Bourke, Esq. Mr. Bourke, with the least possible delay, gave Mr. Hensley the information he required. From Mr. Bourke's reply we learn that the yearly rental on Lot 29 is £587, and that there were due on the 31st December, 1866, arrears to the amount of £3613.—that is to say there are more than six years' back-rent due on that Estate. On Lot 33 the rental is £68, and the arrears \$281—more than four years rent. In view of these facts we think that his Lordship would be money in pocket by selling his Estate on the Island at a very low figure. Lady Georgina Fane would listen to no proposals. Nothing definite was done with Sir Graham Montgomery, but it appears that he is not so averse to selling as many of the other proprietors appear to be. Mr. Hensley did not see the Messrs. Thompson, they not being in the country at the time of his visit. Our own impression is that Mr. Hensley found the proprietors rather difficult people to deal with. They appear to set a high value upon their Estates, and no doubt think their tenants very unreasonable and very dishonest not to bear the yoke of landlordism with becoming patience. Many of them, no doubt, know very little of the real circumstances of the Island, and not having felt a tenant's hardships, nor undergone a tenant's toils, they have of necessity a very inadequate idea of a tenant's rights. Besides, it is but natural that men and women should hold most tenaciously by their legal rights, without enquiring very particularly whether the law or the legal act that gave them those rights is just and equitable or not. However, the tenantry need not despair. We are not very old, yet in our day we have witnessed a great mitigation in the hard lot of the Island tenantry, and we have by no means lost hope of seeing their condition still further relieved, and that too without their having recourse to violent or illegal means.

With regard to the Loan Mr. Hensley found it very up-hill work. Those who have read the papers know that owing to a state of things in the great commercial world of Britain—very much like that which now obtains in our very small commercial world here—confidence was in a great measure destroyed; and though money was by no means scarce, yet people were afraid of letting it out of their hands. Tasmania had just attempted to raise a loan, and had failed, and so had Russia. Mr. Hensley very wisely sought the advice of experienced business men in England, and with equal wisdom was guided by the advice which he received. From what he could learn from the most reliable sources he found he had brought his hens to market on a rainy day, and he is too shrewd a business man to offer them for sale while the wet weather lasted. It is to be hoped that in a more propitious season he will be more successful.

There are appended to the Report a number of documents which, though containing much valuable information for statesmen, and those who have money to invest, would be very dry reading to the greater number of our patrons. We must, however, except one letter—that of John Aldous, Esq., Commissioner of Public Lands. This letter affirms that the operations under the Land Pur. Bill of this Island have financially as well as politically and socially successful:—

OFFICE OF PUBLIC LANDS, PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, 23 June, 1867. The Hon. Joseph Hensley, Attorney General, Sir, I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of date 1st inst., requesting a return of the amount of Securities in this Office for the Balances due on Public Lands, and their real or positive value; also, a return of the area of unsold Lands, and their value.

I beg to state that in the Schedule A, annexed, are set forth the Balances due from the purchasers of Government Lands on the Worrel and Lot 11 Estates, Selkirk Estate, Winchester Estate, and Montgomery Estate, as submitted to the House of Assembly in the Detailed Accounts of this Office. The balances due from the purchasers of Lands on the Cunard Estate, being incomplete at the time of submitting such Detailed Accounts, have since been prepared, and are the amounts due 1st June, 1867.

The sum of £78,894 8s 10d currency, (£52,596 5s 4d sterling), is the amount due this Office, and is secured by the 23rd section of the Land Purchase Act, and is thereby declared to be a specific lien and charge on the Land sold, having priority over every other lien or charge. No better security can possibly be held, and after 10 years' management of this Office, I feel fully justified in ascertaining that the amount represented as due to the Land Office is a real and positive asset of the Colony, every fraction of which can and may be recovered.

The quantity of Lands, the property of the Government, remaining unsold, amounts to 143,775 acres, as described in the Schedule B, annexed, and are valued at £34,344 3s 0d currency, (£22,896 2s 0d sterling).

In accordance with instructions in your communication, rather to under-estimate than over-estimate the worth of the Lands in question, as will appear in Schedule B, 54,797 acres are classed as of inferior quality, and may possibly remain some time unsold; I have, therefore, omitted them from any valuation in forming the estimate of the worth of the Public Lands of the Colony.

I beg here to be allowed to state, that the Accounts of the Public Lands Office, ending 31st January, 1867, show that the operations of the Land Purchase Act, not only morally and politically, but also financially, have been highly advantageous to the Colony, there having accrued a positive gain of over £3,000 (£2,000 sterling), by the purchase of Estates.
