THE CZAR'S HEALTH FAR FROM GOOD

His Condition is Considered Serious

ALONG THREATENED MALADY HAS ATTACKED HIM

Is Debarred From Active Exercise of His Powers.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—The Copenhagen correspondent of the Daily Mail says that well-informed persons here assure me that the health of Emperor Nicholas is far from good and that his condition excites the gravest solicitude.

A long-threatened ailment assumed a critical form soon after the issuance of the manifesto in behalf of the limitation of armaments, and the Czar is now prostrated.

The malady is of such character as to forbid all intellectual exercise, and his participation in the Government is merely formal, and confined to signing documents of whose contents he is ignorant.

The Grand Duke Michael possesses the executive power, and all government decisions are arrived at without the Czar's co-operation or knowledge.

LOCAL COUNCIL

The annual meeting of the L. C. W. was held on Saturday afternoon at P. W. College, Mrs. Anderson, President, in the chair. There was a very large attendance and much interest was manifested in the proceedings.

After prayer and roll call, the minutes of the first regular meeting of the Society were read, after which a minute of condolence passed at a meeting held on Monday 13th inst., and ordered to be transmitted to Mrs. Daniel Davies as representing the surviving relatives of Miss Rosa Stewart late corresponding secretary, was read and confirmed by a standing vote, showing the deep regret for their loss and the high esteem in which Miss Stewart was held by all.

In her opening remarks, the President expressed herself as much gratified in having such a large number present and hoped that it augured well for the coming year. She impressed upon the ladies present the necessity of all affiliated societies being represented at every meeting; and in case of presidents of societies not being able to attend the meetings of the executive, said that it would be advisable to send substitutes.

The length of time to be occupied at each meeting was defined, one hour and a half being considered long enough except on special occasions, when the extra time required will be decided by a vote of those present.

Explanation was given in regard to contributions for address and pendant given to Lady Aberdeen on her departure from Canada. All monies given for the above purpose, are understood to be voluntary contributions by members of affiliated societies, thus testifying the regard in which the President of the N. C. W. C. is held by those who compose the Local Council.

The appointment of officers was next taken up. The President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer were unanimously reappointed, and as Corresponding Secretary Mrs. C. C. Gardner was elected by acclamation. The following ladies were elected as Vice-Presidents—Lady Davies, Mrs. Sullivan, Mrs. Richard Goff, Mrs. Dr. Conroy, Mrs. E. Bayfield, Mrs. B. Rogers, Mrs. A. A. McDonald, Mrs. Geo. E. Full.

The annual report was then read and approved. The Treasurer's report was also read, but on account of some small bills not yet having been received it will again be brought before the Council.

The following is a summary of Agenda read Resolutions passed by the Executive of the Council and approved of by the affiliated societies:

1. That the establishment of a board of associated charities be promoted by the Local Council.
2. That continued effort be put forth in order to have women rendered eligible as members of the School Board of Charlottetown.
3. That means be taken to make the Labor Bureau more widely known.

RESOLUTIONS SENT IN BY SOCIETIES.

1. That merchant's in Charlottetown be requested to provide proper toilet accommodation for the young ladies in their employment.
2. That the Legislature of this Province be urged to pass an act compelling the boy's and girl's of school age, who pass their time on the streets during school hours, to attend school.
3. That the L. C. W. suggest to the school board of this city, the propriety of finding out why so many boy's and girl's are found on the streets during school hours, and request the board to find means to compel those children to attend school.
4. That the L. C. W. take means whereby the comfort of the sick and aged poor of this city may be increased.

The only resolution considered on Saturday was that referring to the labour bureau, a short but lively discussion took place, which resulted in a committee being appointed to consider some means whereby the labor bureau may become of practical assistance to those for whom it is intended, and to report their deliberations at next meeting of Council.

All the above propositions will be carefully considered by the Council; and such work as seems possible of accomplishment, will be taken in hand.

MUCH FIGHTING IS LOOKED FOR

Between the Americans and the Philipinos

A SERIOUS CONDITION OF AFFAIRS AT MANILLA

Foreign Warships are Landing Troops to Protect their Subjects.

MADRID, Feb. 27.—An official despatch from Manila says that the situation here is very severe.

Foreign warships are disembarking troops General Rios, will leave Manila and go to Seembonga island Mindanao.

The Government has received along despatch from General Riva at Manila but refuses to import its contents.

El Imparcial, which asserts that it is in a position to know the truth of the situation at Manila, says there is constant fighting between the Americans and the Tagalos.

The courage and the stubbornness of the latter have caused great anxiety to the Americans who do not conceal their belief that the war will be a long and desperate one.

There is the greatest alarm among foreigners in Manila, and the commanders of foreign warships have decided to land forces to protect their subjects.
