LEADER AND POLICY ENDORSED

The following uncompromising endorsement of the progressive and patriotic policy of Sir Charles Tupper and the Liberal-Conservative party was proposed and accepted unanimously by the recent convention at Amherst:

"The Liberal-Conservative association of the county of Cumberland now in convention assembled having in view the fact that a high standard of honor in its public men is the first importance to a country's welfare desire to record its condemnation of the action of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, his government and supporters, toward the people of Canada in the cynical repudiation of every principle professed and the wanton breach of every promise made when in opposition, upon the faith of which Sir Wilfrid and his party obtained power in 1896.

"That this convention views with alarm the rapid and continuous increase of the country's annual expenditure and public debt, that while large expenditures will always be approved by the people of Canada when necessary to the vital interests of the country, the reckless extravagance of the present government is to be condemned.

"The rapid growth of bribery, ballot stuffing and other forms of fraud and corruption at elections in Canada as particularly instanced in West Huron and Brockville is a menace to the right of the electorate to give free and untrammelled expression at the polls to its opinions and wishes upon questions touching the welfare and government of the country, and in the opinion of the convention the action of the government in burrowing a full and thorough investigation into these fraudulent and corrupt practices is calculated to invite a repetition of the same at future elections.

"The refusal of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the government to introduce legislation in accordance with the majority vote cast on the taking of the plebiscite in favor of prohibiting the importation into or the manufacture, or the sale, of intoxicating liquors in Canada is a flagrant betrayal of those of the electorate, who, on account of the promises of Sir Wilfrid and the Liberal party on that question set forth in 1896, and of those believing in the good faith of the government, successfully devoted their time and energy to obtain from the people of Canada the opinion in favor of prohibition expressed in that vote.

"That this convention heartily endorses the patriotic course taken by Sir Charles Tupper in voicing the loud and indignant demand of the people of Canada upon the government that they should be allowed to aid the mother country in the war in the Transvaal, and recognizes that had it not been for the efforts of our honored chief, backed up by the imperious voice of a loyal people, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his government would have stood aloof from England in her need, and have shamed Canada before the world.

"That this convention, while rejoicing at the continued prosperity of the country recognizes that that prosperity is the legitimate outcome of the foundation of the national stability and success so deeply and so wisely laid by the Liberal-Conservative party during the eighteen years of its power, between 1878 and 1896. That this convention approves of the policy of mutual preferential trade within the empire advocated by Sir Charles Tupper and the Conservative party, believing that nothing would so much conduce to the development, consolidation and the unity of the empire.

THE ARMENIAN SERVICE.

Held at the Church of the Good Shepherd on Sunday Afternoon.

The Rev. E. Vartabed-vehouni, priest of the Armenian church, Lawrence, Mass., celebrated the Holy Eucharist in the Anglican Church of the Good Shepherd last Sunday at 2 p. m.

The Armenian Church generally observes this service before noon, but it may be observed later in the day if the fast preceding the reception of the Sacrament is strictly kept.

The service and sermon were both in the Armenian language. The Armenian ritual is very elaborate. The priest was vested in a green silk cope and mitre and was assisted by eight vested men and a little boy. The whole service was intoned. Two lights were kept burning on the altar and incense was frequently offered. Only two of the laity communicated. Unleavened bread was used. The consecrated water is dipped in the wine and placed in the mouths of the communicants who receive the sacrament standing.

The Armenian Rite is very ancient and it can only be distinguished from that of the Greek church by experts in ecclesiastical ritual. At the close of the service unleavened bread, not consecrated, is distributed to those not receiving communion. This is a remnant of the Agape, or love feast, of the early church. Over 60 Armenians were at the service, the greatest part being men. The congregation was very attentive and doubtless appreciated this visit from their pastor.

SIR LOUIS' ACTION.

How the Minister Shelved "Commodore" Welsh.

The more sanguine government reports from Prince Edward Island claim that Sir Louis Davies will hold three of the five seats in that province. On the other hand the Liberal-Conservatives hope to win all five seats, though they admit that Sir Louis Davies himself will be hardest to beat. This is not so much an account of the popularity of the minister as because of his fine judgment in the choice of seats. Sir Louis showed his skill in this way:

Formerly the province contained three double seats, but when it became necessary to reduce the representation to five members it was decided to make five single seats of about equal population. The province is so laid out that it was possible to make the divisions by following direct lines across the island.

Sir Louis complained bitterly of this system. He solemnly assured the house that the distribution was arranged with the deliberate view of driving him out of public life, since the county in which he lived was so divided as to create a Liberal hive at one end, while in the other, where he would have to run, a large and unfriendly Roman Catholic population was placed. Sir Louis almost wept over this conspiracy, and was so piteous in his appeal, that Prof. Weldon voted for his amendment. But the measure went through and the Prince Edward Island victim took a careful farewell of his associates, declaring that he was entering upon the fight of his life.

The next that was heard of him he had thrust "Commodore" Welsh into the constituency which he had designated as his own and was himself a candidate in the liberal hive. The other man was beaten, and Sir Louis himself succeeded in greatly reducing the liberal majority in his riding. Mr. Stewart, who was yesterday nominated to oppose the minister of marine, is expected to cut this majority down to the vanishing point. It is not certain that Sir Louis will be there when the fight comes on. He is thought to be looking for a seat on the bench. If he stays his greatest regret will be that the late government had not placed a few more greivins in his West Queen's hive. St. John Sun.

A TRAITOR MORBED.

The expression of public opinion sometimes takes an acute form and becomes mob law, when the people made temporarily insane, apparently, by some event which strongly appeals to their passions and arouses their resentment, commit acts as a body that they individually reprehend in cooler moments. Civilized countries, therefore, forbid anything approaching lynch law and legislate to punish mob violence. If every public opinion was stirred by an indignation which was righteous, it was in England when a mob gathered to express their disapprobation of one Dr. Clark, whom they had elected as a Liberal member of the House of Commons. His was an instance where liberty had in very deed become a license; where the right of a man to entertain and express any opinion he wishes was carried to the danger point.

There are no doubt some people under the British flag whose honest sympathies were and still are with the Boers, though how this is consistent with a knowledge of the facts we confess it is difficult to understand. But when that sympathy is carried so far as to lead a man, in full possession of his senses and occupying a representative position in Great Britain, to write to the ruler of a people on the point of making war against the Empire, telling him war is inevitable, and discussing the method of commencing hostilities, it requires a great stretch of toleration not to regard him and treat him as a traitor to his country. But it is fortunate that the mob who surrounded Dr. Clark's house were restrained from doing him violence. It is the pride of the British people that lynch law is almost unknown within the limits of the Empire. However, if Dr. Clark is not legally punished for his treachery there will be a widespread feeling that British tolerance goes a little too far. - Star.

The London Empire explains De Wet's unwillingness to surrender. He would have surrendered, says our exchange, soon after the capture of Cronje, but he was haunted by a terrible nightmare. "If I surrender," said he to an intimate friend, "I shall be made the subject of an Alfred Austin ode.
